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Rome, July 20.

He differences which have been fo often fpoken of, between the Court, and the Ambaffadors of the Crowns at prefent refiding here, have been finally composed, the Edict which was the first occasion of them, for that it laid a new imposition on all imported Goods, not exgepting those belonging to forreign Ministers being revoked; and to perfect the reconciliation, visits have palfed between the Cardinal Patron and the Ambassadors

of the Emperor and Spain. Legorn, July 21. We have now certain advice; that on the 19 inflant, three Gallies of our Grand Duke commanded by the Chevalier Camillo Guidi, upon advice of three Turkifs Gallies being abroad, and that they had plundered the neighbouring Ifles, directed their courfe towards them, and being come up with them engaged fo fmartly, that after two hours diffure the chief of thole 3 Gallies was taken, the other two taking their opportunity to fland away; and fo efcaped, though two

of our Gallies purfued them a good way; on board of that taken was 150 Turks, and 300 Christian flaves, and Amet Cerif once General of the Corfairs of Tunis, who now commanded these three Gallies.

Ditto, fuly 22. This day is brought in here the abovementioned *Turkish* Galley. And this day likewife the Sieur de Ruyter is failed from hence towards the Levant.

Warfaw, July 23. Our Leiters from the Court at Jawarow of the 13 inflant, give us little caufe to hope for a good a Peace with the Turks, who feem positively to declare that they will not part with Caminice, or any other the Conquest they have of late years made upon this Crown; and, its faid, that the Polifb Commissioners have farther acquainted the King, that the Turks demand, that the whole Ukraine shall be put into the hands of Dorofensko, and that the Poles continue to pay the yearly tribute, stipulated by the Treaty between our late King and the Port; fo that after all, there feems but small appearance of a Peace, to which the Turks are without doubt the lefs inclined, for that they know the ill condition the affairs of this Kingdom are in. It is still reported, that the Grand Duke of Moscowy will join his Forces with those of this Crown, to act against the common Enemy, but with what certainty we know not.

Kenice, July 27. From Messina we have advice; that the 20 inflant the Duke de Vivenne parted from thence with the French Gallies and Men of War that were there on his return to France, having taken with him the principal Authors of the defection of that City. On Saturday laft happened here and in the neighbouring parts a most terrible from of Wind, which hath done much michief. The Chevalier Zorzi is parted hence to go and take pofferfion of his command of General of Dalmatia.

From the Brandenburgh Camp at Swan, Aug. 2. The Brandenburgh Army continues ftill here, in expectation of the conjunction of the Imperial Troops under the command of General Cops, who are now within four hours march of us Yefferday arrived an Envoy from the King of Denmark, among other matters to acquaint his Electoral Highness, that his Majesty will within few days be with his Army again in Holftein.

Hansuer, Aug. 2. Our Duke is at prefent lodged in the Cattle of Reehelingen, and his Army lies encamped about a League and half from hence; we cannot yet certainlylearn what his Highneffes intentions are, though its faid, that in cafe the Munfler or other Troops fall into Bremen, he will march to the affiftance of the Suedes there, according to the Treaty between them.

Suedes there, according to the Treaty between them, Straelfond, Aug. 3. The Suedifh Army continues in our Neighborhood, feveral Troops are arrived from Livonia, to reinforce them, but not all that were expecied : Our General Wrangel has befet all the paffages which the Enemy might make use of to enter into this Province, so that at present we do not much fear them. We are affured that very confiderable fupplies will fuddenly arrive from Sueden ; and for that the better tranfporting them from time to time into these parts, the Fleet is fitting out at Stockholme with all poffible diligence. Here is a report this day of a great defign upon sterin that hath been discovered ; several perfons having been corrupted to fet fire to the Town in three feveral places, while the Enemy attacked it from abroad. The Major-General Gotze, who was taken Prisoner near Wilftock remains ftill here.

Beilegarde, Aug. 3. The 15 paft, the Duke of Scomberg invefted this place, the 21 the Trenches were opened, and the Siege carried on with fo much vigor, that on the 27 the Governor began to capitulate, and the next day furrendred the Town to the French. The 12 inflant is to be made an exchange of Prifoners that have been taken this Campagne on one and the other fide.

Hamburgh, Ang. 9. Our Magistrates have at last caufed the Imperial Avocatoria to be published here, and have intimated to the French and Suedish Ministers refiding here, that they defire they would depart this City, bu for the reft they would fain maintain a Neutrality. It is certain that the Duke of Hanouer has caufed a Fore to be caft up upon the River Wefer, at a Village called Ro/amb, hath planted five pieces of Cannon and put 300 Men in it, to prevent the paffage of the Munfter Troops, who, its faid, intend to pais down that River in Boats to Bremen. Deputies have been lately fent on the part of this City, to the Elector of Brandenburgh, to pray, as we are told, his Electoral Highness mediation, for the removing any diffatisfaction the King of Denmark may have conceived against us; and in the mean time we are not wanting to make all neceffary provisions for our defence, for that we cannot rid ous felves of the apprehenfions we at prefent have, till we fee his Majefty engage his Forces in fome defign which unconcerns us.

Luxemburgh, Aug. 9. The City of Treves is now formally befieged by the Confederate Troops, yefferday the Trenches were to be opened, and the Attacks to be begun. Monfieur de Louvigny, who at prefent commands in this Province, parted hence yefferday with 1200 Men, Horfe and Foor, drawn out of this Garifon, with feveral pieces of Cannon, to affift at the faid Siege. The Marefchal de Crequi, we hear, marches to the relief of the befieged; yefferday he lodged at Rémich, and this day he marched again. Cologne,
