AT the Court of St. James's, the 19th Day of October, 1761,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty Second Day of July last, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twelfth Day of September last, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the said Twelfth Day of September, in like Manner voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every able, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service. And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been extended to the Thirty First Day of this Instant October; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, as it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty First Day of this Instant October, to the Twelfth Day of December next inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 30th of April last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant October — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever

(except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this Instant October, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled, " An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

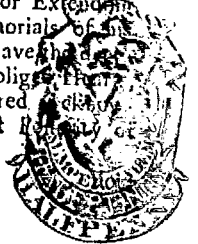

Copenhagen,

Copenhagen, October 13. By a Ship just arrived from the Baltick, we learn, that Eleven Russian Men of War, and Three Transports, from before Colberg, were lying last Wednesday at Anchor under the Island of Bernholm; and that Three more were met by it under Sail, beating between that Place and the Island of Moen.

Aix la Chapelle, October 11. Yesterday in the Afternoon, Prince Clement of Saxony set out for Maestricht in his Way to Paris, where his Highness will spend great Part of the Winter.

Aix la Chapelle, October 16. Last Monday the King's Household began their March, from their Quarters of Cantonment near Wesel, to return to France. The Horse Grenadiers will arrive at Liege the 19th; the first Company of Musquetaires, with the Gendarmes de la Garde, at Tongres the 20th: The rest will follow, with one Day's Interval between the March of each Corps. The French and Swiss Guards are likewise to return to France, as well as the Regiments of Damas and Conti Cavalry: The first has been ruined by the Glanders, the latter by three long Campaigns. The rest of Prince Soubise's Army will march towards the End of this Month into the Winter Quarters assigned them, on the Lower Rhine, the Bishoprick of Liege, the Duchy of Limbourg, and in the adjacent Countries.

Hague, October 16. There are no direct Accounts from the Army in Westphalia; but Letters from Hamburg of the 13th Instant say, that Wolfenbittel capitulated to a Corps of French Troops under Prince Xavier of Saxony, on the 10th Instant, after Five Days Siege. It is added, that Prince Frederick and General Luckner were upon their March to throw themselves into Brunswick. In the mean Time, the Reigning Duke had, upon the Approach of the Enemy, quitted that Place, and retired to Luncbourg, from whence his Serene Highness was expected at Hamburg on the 14th.

There are Reports, that several Detachments of Prince Ferdinand's Army, were in March towards Brunswick.

We are assured, that the Accounts which have been published, with so much Affectation, of the Destruction of several Magazines belonging to the Allied Army in Westphalia, are void of Foundation, the making of Any upon the Ems having been forbidden ever since the Month of April; and there having been nothing found by the French in Osnabrug, but a Quantity of bad Hay of little or no Value.

Letters from Magdeburg say, that the King of Prussia's Head Quarters were at Gross Nossen, behind Munsterburg; and that it did not appear that his Majesty was then informed of what had happened to Schweidnitz in the Night of the 30th past. The same Letters add, that General Platen did not join the Duke of Wirtemberg till the 3d Instant, having been harrassed and retarded in his March by several Russian Detachments: It was hoped, however, that by this Junction, Colberg might be saved. Part of the Russian Army, under General Fermor, was at Drieffen, raising Contributions in the New Marche of Brandenburg.

On the 8th Instant, Part of the Army of the Empire took Possession of Halle.

Hague, October 20. The Letters, received from the Army in Westphalia, are of the 14th Instant; Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were then at Marien Munster; but the Army was on the Point of marching; and we have since heard, that his Serene Highness has established his Head Quarters at Falckenbagen, in the Bailiwick of Polle. Marshal Broglio's Head Quarters were at Escherhausen, on the opposite Side of the Weser.

The sudden Surrender of the Town of Wolfenbittel, on the 10th, which the French had set Fire to in several Places, having prevented the Succour sent for the Relief of it, from arriving in Time, Prince Xavier of Saxony immediately invested Brunswick, and opened Trenches before it; but he has not had the same Success there. In order to cover the Siege, he had taken Possession of Londerff, and the import-

ant Pass of Olper, and had intrenched a Body of Troops there. General Luckner, joined to Prince Frederick of Brunfwick, arrived by forced Marches in the Neighbourhood; and whilst the General marched with his Cavalry towards Peine, Prince Frederick attacked the French in their Intrenchments, and, after an obstinate Defence, forced them, with a considerable Loss on their Side, and took above 200 Prisoners, with several Officers, one Piece of Cannon, and a Major General. The young Prince proceeded, without Loss of Time, to Brunswick, where he entered the 13th in the Evening, with six Battalions, and was received with the greatest Joy by the Garrison and the Inhabitants. Their Arrival was notified to the Besiegers by a general Volley from the Ramparts, which made them abandon their Trenches with great Precipitation. They have since abandoned Wolfenbittel, after levying exorbitant Contributions, as they have done every where, and retired to Scesen. Several Reinforcements having since marched by Hanover that Way, it is thought that Prince Xavier's Corps may have suffered in its Retreat, especially as he has a pretty large Quantity of Artillery with him.

The Prince of Soubise's Army is going into Quarters. His Head Quarters were a few Days ago at Borken, within six Leagues of Wesel, at which last Place he is soon expected. The French Household Troops, Horse and Foot, have repassed the Rhine, and are marching back to France. The French are going to throw a Bridge over the Rhine at Emmerick.

The Count of Choiseul is declared Minister of the Department of Foreign Affairs in France, in the Room of the Duke of Choiseul his Brother, who keeps the War Office, and unites to it the Military Part of the Marine: The Commercial Part of the Marine is put under the Direction of the Comptroller General. M. Berryer, late Minister of the Marine, is appointed Keeper of the Great Seal.
