AT the Court of St. James's, the 19th Day of October, 1761,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty Second Day of July last, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twelfth Day of September last, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the said Twelfth Day of September, in like Manner voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every able, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service. And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been extended to the Thirty First Day of this Instant October; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, as it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty First Day of this Instant October, to the Twelfth Day of December next inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 30th of April last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this

Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant October — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this Instant October, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Wesel, October 17. All the Troops in Garrison here (except one Battalion of Vierzet, and about one Squadron of Horse that are Prisoners) are marched hence to join Prince Soubise's Army; it is thought they will continue to keep the Field till such Time as the Prince sees what will be the Issue of Marshal Broglie's Attempt on Brunswick and Hanover.

Liege, October 20. The Regiment of Damas Cavalry, having greatly suffered by the Glanders and continual Fatigues, received Orders to return to France. They arrived here To day from Prince Soubise's Army, in very bad Order, and very weak.

Tongres, October 21. This Day the first Company of Mousquetaires arrived here in their Way to Paris; though they have been very sickly since they took the Field, five Men have only died in the Hospitals; but they have lost a great Number of Horses for Want of Forage.

Hamburgh, October 20. We have no Advices yet of the Russians having raised the Siege of Colberg. In the mean While we learn, that their Fleet is retired from before that Place, and that several of their Ships have been obliged to take Shelter in the Danish Island of Bornholm, and in other Ports in the Baltick, having by Storms lost most of their Masts, &c. That General Romanzow was yet near Colberg, in order to cover the Reimbarkation of his heavy Artillery.

Since the Loss of Schweidnitz nothing has passed in Silesia between the Prussian and Austrian Armies; and according to our last Letters from Magdeburgh, the King of Prussia was on the 10th Instant at Strehlen, and General Laudohn at Freyberg.

The French evacuated Wolfenbuttel the 15th Instant.

Hague, October 23. Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were on the 19th at Ohr not far from Hamelen: The Hereditary Prince was marching against Prince Xavier, who had stopped at Gandersheim, in his Retreat from Wolfenbuttel, but had been obliged to abandon, as is said, the greatest Part of the Artillery he was conveying from that Town.

Letters from Magdebourg of the 17th Instant say, that his Prussian Majesty was the 9th Instant incamped at Strehlen, and that he had posted great Part of his Cavalry in the Plain of Canth before Breslaw. And that General Laudohn had as yet made no Movement from his old Camp of Freyburg. The same Letters add, that there are Accounts of General Romanzow's being employed in embarking his Artillery, from whence it was hoped that the Siege of Colberg would soon be raised: And that Prince Henry had detached General Seydlitz with a small Corps against the Army of the Empire, which had thereupon in great Haste evacuated Halle, and retreated to Naumberg upon the Saal.
