And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been extended to the Thirty First Day of this Instant October; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer I ime; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, as it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Boanties and Rewards, he prolonged and extended from the faid Thirty Firil Day of this Instant October, to the Twelfth Day of December next inclu-Whereof all Perions concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly

All the Troops in Garrison here (except one Battalion of Vierfet, and about one Squadron of Horse that are Prisoners) are marched hence to join Prince Soubife's Army; it is thought they will continue to keep the Field till fuch Time as the Prince sees what will be the Issue of Marshal Broglio's Attempt on Brunswick and Hanover.

Liege, Odober 20. The Regiment of Damas Ca-valry, having greatly suffered by the Glanders and continual Fatigues, received Orders to return to France. They arrived here To day from Prince Soubile's Army, in very bad Order, and very weak.

Tongres, October 21. This Day the first Com-

pany of Mousquetaires arrived here in their Way to Paris; though they have been very fickly fince they took the Field, five Men have only died in the Hoipitals; but they have lost a great Number of Horses for Want of Forage.

Hamburgh, Oslober 20. We have no Advices yes of the Russians having raised the Siege of Colberg. In the mean While we learn, that their Fleet is retired from before that Place, and that several of their Ships have been obliged to take Shelter in the Danish Island of Bornholm, and in other Ports in the Baltick, having by Storms loft most of their Masts, &c. That General Romanzow was yet near Colberg, in order to cover the Reimbarkation of his heavy Artillery

Since the Lofs of Schweidnitz nothing has paffed in Silesia between the Prussian and Austrian Armies; and according to our last Letters from Magdeburgh, the King of Prussia was on the 16th Instant at Strehlen, and General Laudohn at Freyberg.

The French evacuated Wolfenbuttel the 15th

Hague, October 23. Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were on the 10th at Ohr not far from Hamelen: The Hereditary Prince was marching against Prince Xavier, who had stopped at Gandersheim, in his Retreat from Wolfenbuttel, but had been obliged to abandon, as is faid, the greatest Part of the Artillery he was convoying from that Town.

Letters from Magdebourg of the 17th Instant say, that his Pruffian Majesty was the oth Instant in-camped at Strehlen, and that he had posted great Part of his Cavalry in the Plain of Canth before Breflaw. And that General Laudohn had as yet made no Movement from his old Camp of Freyburg. The fame Letters add, that there are Accounts of General Romanzow's being employed in embarking his Artillery, from whence it was hoped that the Siege of Colberg would foon be raifed: And that Prince Henry had detached General Seydlitz with a small Corps against the Army of the Empire, which had thereupon in great Haste evacuated Halle, and re-
