AT the Council Chamber *Whitehall*, the 7th Day of November, 1761,

P R E S E N T,

The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS Information hath been given to the Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, that a great Number of Journeymen, in the Cabinet and Chair Branches, have lately entered into a Combination to lessen the Hours of their daily Work, and to raise the Price of their Piece Work; and that on Monday the 14th of September last, at Nine of the Clock in the Morning, the Journeymen, in several of the Shops of the principal Cabinet and Chair-makers in London and Westminster, came in Bodies to their respective Masters, and demanded the Lessening their daily Hours of Work, and Raising the Prices of their Piece Work; which being refused, they immediately quitted their Services. That the said Masters have, by all Means, endeavoured to prevail on the said Journeymen to return to their Business, and offered them Protection and Encouragement according to their Merit; notwithstanding which, they hold frequent Meetings at Publick Houses, and raise Subscriptions among themselves for supporting such Journeymen as are unemployed, and for carrying their Demands into Execution; which, if complied with, would increase the Prices of Work, and greatly affect not only the Foreign Trade of those Commodities, but also those that are provided for Home Consumption. — And whereas it hath been further represented, That the said Journeymen Cabinet and Chair-makers, so in Combination, deter and hinder others from working as usual, and threaten them with Death or Maiming, if they do not come into, and assist them in their Demands—In order to put a Stop to such unlawful Combinations and riotous Proceedings—It is hereby Ordered in Council, That all and every His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Under Sheriffs, and all other Civil Magistrates whatsoever, do cause the Laws against such Offenders to be immediately put into Execution, and use their utmost Endeavours to put an immediate Stop to such unlawful Meetings and Combinations; and that, in order to prevent the same, they do particularly enquire into the Behaviour of all Masters of Publick Houses, where the said Journeymen assemble and resort, in order to carry on their illegal Practices, to the End that such Prosecutions may be carried on against them, as may be thought just and reasonable, to prevent this great Evil: And their Lordships do hereby Command the respective Justices of the Peace, and other Magistrates, that they do, from Time to Time, transmit an exact Account of what they shall do, pursuant to this their Lordships Order, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Stockholm, Oct. 16. We have received the News of our Fleet's being arrived in the Harbour at Carlscroon, after having suffered a good Deal by the bad Weather. And we hear several of the Russian Men of War had been obliged to take Refuge in Carlshamn, upon the Coast of Blekin: The others were a few Days ago in Dantzick Road.

Magdebourg, Nov. 3. The Letters from Pomerania mention, that General Platen had penetrated with a Body of Six Thousand Men as far as Gollnow; where his Van Guard, consisting of two Free Battalions, commanded by Colonel Corbiere, was surrounded, and made Prisoners, by a very superior Corps of Russians.

We hear from Stettin, that the Garrison, and that Part of the Prussian Army, which remained before Colberg, under the Command of the Duke of Wirtemberg, were in no Want of Necessaries of any Kind.

On the 28th past the King of Prussia still continued at Strehlen: His Cavalry, as well as that of General Laudohn near Freybourg, were cantoned, there having been, in those Parts, a considerable Fall of Snow. The Corps under General Beck, which marched to Fridenberg upon the Queis, is expected to join Marshal Daun's Army in Saxony, who, it is believed, will then begin to act. In the mean Time, Prince Henry keeps his Position at Schlettau; and the Army of the Empire are plundering and raising Contributions, where they can with Impunity.

Last Sunday Morning Princess Ferdinand of Prussia was brought to Bed of a Princess, and continues in a fair Way of Recovery.

Hambourg, Nov. 6. Letters from Pomerania say, that the Russian General Romanzow had ordered some Battalions and Squadrons to invest Treptow; and that General Knoblock, who had thrown himself, with his Corps, into the Town, having refused to surrender the Place, it was bombarded; and several Houses having taken Fire, the said General found himself obliged to capitulate on the 24th past. The Loss which the Prussians have sustained in Prisoners is considerable; besides ten Pieces of Cannon and six Colours taken by the Russians.

Dusseldorff, Nov. 6. Prince Soubize's Army, that for this ten Days past have been cantoned about Essen, will next Week enter into the Winter Quarters assigned them in the Towns on the Left of the Rhine, except some Squadrons of Cavalry, that will be quartered in the Bishoprick of Liege.

Liege, Nov. 7. It is determined that the eight Squadrons of the Gendarmerie shall have their Winter Quarters in this State, between the Sambre and the Maes; but the Etat-Major will be lodged in this City.

City. We shall also have six other French Squadrons quartered in our Territories.

It is strongly reported here, that Campfort's Corps will be incorporated in the Regiment of Vierfet, to serve as Light Troops in that Regiment; and that the Whole will be commanded by Brigadier Vierfet. It is also said, that Horation's Regiment will be incorporated in Bouillon's, to make it four Battalions.

Hague, Nov. 13. Prince Ferdinand decamped from Olm, on the 4th Instant, and crossed the Weser. His Serene Highness established his Head Quarters at Hagenhofen that Night: The Army encamped between Hattenbeeck and Tundern, but were to march from thence immediately. The heavy Baggage was sent to Hameln. Marshal Broglio was on the same Day at Eschershausen: His Troops were foraging, whilst the Allied Army crossed the Weser; which had the accidental Inconvenience of discovering Prince Ferdinand's Motions, whilst it obliged the French to retire with Precipitation.

The Hereditary Prince marched the Day before the Army, on the 3d Instant, crossed the Leine, and marched to Eltz; and on the 5th, had a Cannonade of some Hours with a Body of the Enemy, upon the Mountain of la Huve above Eimbeck.

Major General Freytag, with his Body of Light Troops, marched forward the same Day, on which the Army crossed the Weser to Lutter; and, on the 5th, attacked and carried a Post of the French, between that Place and Ahausen: He was proceeding to Seesen, but learned on his March, that Lieutenant General de Stainville had abandoned that Place with Precipitation, and instead of turning to Eimbeck, had retired to Northheim. General Freytag pursued, and came up with the Rear Guard, and took several Prisoners.

Lieutenant General Wangenheim and General Luckner marched, on the 4th, to Bodenburg and Grossen Elve towards Gandesheim, where Prince Xavier of Saxony was with his Reserve.

The Consequence of these Motions is said to have been the dislodging Marshal Broglio from Eschershausen; and it is thought a general Action between the two Armies may ensue.

Marshal Soubise continues to have his Head Quarters at Essen, whilst his Troops are chiefly cantoned between the Emser and the Roer. His Motions seem to depend entirely upon those of Marshal Broglio's Army; but his Operations have been confined of late to sending Patroles as far as Werle. Both Armies had expected to separate for their Winter Quarters about the 15th.

Colberg held out still on the 2d of this Month, and it was hoped that Means had been found to send them a Supply of Provisions. The Russian Army is still in Pomerania.

Dublin, November 5.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Birth of the late King William the Third, of glorious Memory, the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys of Small Arms from the Regiments of Foot on Duty, drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon there was a very splendid Appearance of Nobility and Gentry at the Castle, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant. After which, his Excellency, attended by the Nobility and Gentry, and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, went in Procession round the Statue of King William, and Stephens Green. In the Evening there was a Play, given by his Excellency for the Entertainment of the Ladies. And the Night concluded with ringing of Bells, Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
