The Dislocation of Prince Soubise's Army being quite finished, and the Troops in March on all Sides to their several Destinations, that Prince arrived here this Day at Noon, where the Head Quarters will remain this Winter; but it is thought he will set out for Versailles as soon as he has made the necessary Dispositions for the Safety of the several Garrisons, &c.

Liege, Nov. 17. Four Squadrons of the Gendarmerie marched into this City last Monday, in their Way to the Winter Quarters assigned them in this State between the Sambre and the Maese; their Horses were small, and very much fatigued; but the Men made a fine Appearance.

The Regiment of Flanders arrived the 13th at
