Ach, a little Village belonging to this State on the Side of Stockem; they were followed the 15th by St. Maurice; the 17th by Vogué Cavalry, and the 19th Talleyrand is expected. All these Troops come from Prince Soubife's Army, and march by Dieft to Ghent, from thence the Infantry will be conveyed in Boats to Oftend.

Magdebourg, Now. 14. Colberg is revictualled, and the Bulk of the Ruffian Army, under the Generals Butturlin and Fermor, took the Route of Poland the 2d Inflant, leaving a Detachment under General Romanzow to continue the Blockade.

On the fame Day the Rullian General Berg attacked General Platen between Stargard and Piritz, but was repulsed with the Loss of 500 Men.

We have received the following Advices from Prince Henry's Head Quarters at Barnitz near Me-issien, dated November 9.

On the 1st of this Mouth Marshal Daun received a Reinforcement of feven Regiments of Infantry, and four Regiments of Cavalry, detached from Si-lefia by General Laudohn. The fame Day Colonel Kleift diflodged the Enemy from Gros-Schirna. On the 25th, in the Morning, all our advanced Pofts, from Sibeneichen, which covers Meissen, to Roswein upon the Mulda, were attacked at the fame Time. These were chiefly advanced Posts, and gave Way. The Enemy's Huffars carried off a Cannon from a Post occupied by a Free Company of Major Quin-tus's Battalion. The Villages of Teutsch Bohra, Eule, and Elgersdorff, which covered the Camp of Katzenhausers, were maintained, and the Enemy's Light Troops, which were purfued, retreated with Lois. The Views of the Enemy were to have feized the Eminencies of Nossen, and to have advanced a Body of twelve Battalions behind Roswein. Our Pofts on the other Side of the Mulda, retired, be-ing nothing more than Alarm Pofts. The Enemy occupied Rolwein, from whence General Seidlitz diflodged them on the 7th. As we have very re-spectable Posts on this Side of the Mulda, the Motions, which the Enemy has just made, will not oc-casion any Alteration in our Polition. We have ta-ken two Officers and fixty Men in the Affair of the 5th, and our Lois does not exceed that Number. The Army of the Empire continues to keep its Polition behind the Saale and the Elfter.

Magdebourg, Nov. 17. The latest Accounts from Silelia are of the 11th. His Pruffian Majesty was then at Strehlen, and General Laudohn continued to occupy his former Polition near Freyburg, and in the Gorges of the Mountains.

Letters from Prince Henry's Army fay, that on Saturday last, the 14th, the Austrians had taken Poffeffion of Doblen upon the Freyberg Muldau; from which however, they were very foon diflodged by a Pruffian Detachment.

The News of feveral Ships, loaded with Provifions, having got into the Harbour of Colberg, is confirmed by Letters of the 14th from Stettin; as is also the March of the Great Russian Army towards the Vistula. General Romanzow still continues be-fore Colberg ; but as, on the 8th, some Movements were observed in his Camp, which feemed to indi-cate an intended Retreat, it is hoped, that the Blockade of that Place will very foon be raifed. Hambaurg, Nov. 17. The last Letters from Sax-

ony mention, that Marshal Daun had made feveral Attempts to bring Prince Henry of Prussia to a general Action ; but that hitherto they had all proved ineffectual. His Royal Highnefs's Head Quarters were at Barnitz near Meiffen, General Seidlitz was at Noffen, and Colonel Kleitz at Dobeln, the oth Inftant.

Hague, Nov. 20. By the last Letters from Eimbeck, where Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were on the 14th, we are informed, that the French Army under Marshal Broglio had retired behind Gottingen,

and was preparing to go into Winter Quarters: The Prince of Soubize has established his Head Quarters at Duffeldorp, and was putting his Army

too into Winter Quarters. Accounts from Colberg continue to give Hopes that the Ruffians will be obliged to raife the Siege.

Prince Henry of Pruffia had hitherto defeated the Attempts of Marshal Daun ; and in Silesia nothing had happened of any Confequence.

Hague, Nov. 24. Prince Ferdinand's Head Quar-ters were on the 18th full at Eimbeck; Marthal Broglio has withdrawn all his Troops behind Gottingen, and is occupied in fettling his Head Quar-ters, the First Line of which will entend from Mulhausen to Fritzlar.

By Letters from Magdeburg of the 17th, the Armies of His Pruffian Majefty and General Laudoha continued in the fame Polition as on the 11th.

Eimbeck, Nov. 14. Prince Ferdinand has had the Misfortune of a Fall off his Horfe, by which he has bruifed his Leg, and is at prefent confined by that Accident.

Marshal Broglio arrived the 13th at Gottingen. The fame Evening the Hereditary Prince attacked, near Katlenbourg, and routed a large Detachment of Cavalry under the Command of M. de Clofen,

This whole District is reduced to a Defert ; the Farmers and Peafants have been plundered of all their Cattle, and the Household Goods, and Wearing Apparel of the Inhabitants of the Country Towns and Villages, have, by Order of the French Gene-ral, been fold by Auction, to fupply the Deficiency of the exorbitant and unprecedented Contributions imposed upon them.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'E. lire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Lincoln, for electing a Bishop of that See, the fame being now void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God, John, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Salisbury; and alfo a Letter, recommending to the faid Dean and Chapter, Tho-mas Green, Doctor in Divinity, one of His Ma-jefty's Chaplains in Ordinary, and Dean of the Cathedral Church of Sarum, to be by them elected Bishop of the faid See of Lincoln.

The King has been pleafed to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Briftol, for electing a Bifhop of that See, the fame being now void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God, Philip, late Bishop thereof, verend rather in God, rhinp, late binop thereor, to the See of Norwich; and alfo a Letter, recom-mending to the faid Dean and Chapter, Thomas Newton, Doctor in Divinity, one of His Majefly's Chaplains in Ordinary, and Prebendary of the Col-legiate Church of St. Peter Wefminfter, to be by them elected Bishop of the faid See of Bristol.
