

Ach, a little Village belonging to this State on the Side of Stockem; they were followed the 15th by St. Maurice; the 17th by Vogné Cavalry, and the 19th Talleyrand is expected. All these Troops come from Prince Soubise's Army, and march by Diest to Ghent, from thence the Infantry will be conveyed in Boats to Ostend.

Magdebourg, Nov. 14. Colberg is revisituated, and the Bulk of the Russian Army, under the Generals Butturlin and Fermor, took the Route of Poland the 2d Instant, leaving a Detachment under General Romanzow to continue the Blockade.

On the same Day the Russian General Berg attacked General Platen between Stargard and Piritz, but was repulsed with the Loss of 500 Men.

We have received the following Advices from Prince Henry's Head Quarters at Barnitz near Meissen, dated November 9.

On the 1st of this Month Marshal Daun received a Reinforcement of seven Regiments of Infantry, and four Regiments of Cavalry, detached from Silesia by General Laudohn. The same Day Colonel Kleitz dislodged the Enemy from Gros-Schirna. On the 25th, in the Morning, all our advanced Posts, from Sibeneichen, which covers Meissen, to Roswein upon the Mulda, were attacked at the same Time. These were chiefly advanced Posts, and gave Way. The Enemy's Hussars carried off a Cannon from a Post occupied by a Free Company of Major Quintus's Battalion. The Villages of Teutsch Bohra, Eule, and Elgersdorff, which covered the Camp of Katzenhaufers, were maintained, and the Enemy's Light Troops, which were pursued, retreated with Loss. The Views of the Enemy were to have seized the Eminencies of Nossen, and to have advanced a Body of twelve Battalions behind Roswein. Our Posts on the other Side of the Mulda, retired, being nothing more than Alarm Posts. The Enemy occupied Roswein, from whence General Seidlitz dislodged them on the 7th. As we have very respectable Posts on this Side of the Mulda, the Motions, which the Enemy has just made, will not occasion any Alteration in our Position. We have taken two Officers and sixty Men in the Affair of the 5th, and our Loss does not exceed that Number. The Army of the Empire continues to keep its Position behind the Saale and the Elster.

Magdebourg, Nov. 17. The latest Accounts from Silesia are of the 11th. His Prussian Majesty was then at Strehlen, and General Laudohn continued to occupy his former Position near Freyburg, and in the Gorges of the Mountains.

Letters from Prince Henry's Army say, that on Saturday last, the 14th, the Austrians had taken Possession of Doblen upon the Freyberg Mulda; from which however, they were very soon dislodged by a Prussian Detachment.

The News of several Ships, loaded with Provisions, having got into the Harbour of Colberg, is confirmed by Letters of the 14th from Stettin; as is also the March of the Great Russian Army towards the Vistula. General Romanzow still continues before Colberg; but as, on the 8th, some Movements were observed in his Camp, which seemed to indicate an intended Retreat, it is hoped, that the Blockade of that Place will very soon be raised.

Hambourg, Nov. 17. The last Letters from Saxony mention, that Marshal Daun had made several Attempts to bring Prince Henry of Prussia to a general Action; but that hitherto they had all proved ineffectual. His Royal Highness's Head Quarters were at Barnitz near Meissen, General Seidlitz was at Nossen, and Colonel Kleitz at Dobeln, the 9th Instant.

Hague, Nov. 20. By the last Letters from Eimbeck, where Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were on the 14th, we are informed, that the French Army under Marshal Broglio had retired behind Gottingen, and was preparing to go into Winter Quarters.

The Prince of Soubize has established his Head Quarters at Dusseldorp, and was putting his Army too into Winter Quarters.

Accounts from Colberg continue to give Hopes that the Russians will be obliged to raise the Siege.

Prince Henry of Prussia had hitherto defeated the Attempts of Marshal Daun; and in Silesia nothing had happened of any Consequence.

Hague, Nov. 24. Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were on the 18th still at Eimbeck; Marshal Broglio has withdrawn all his Troops behind Gottingen, and is occupied in settling his Head Quarters, the First Line of which will extend from Mulhausen to Fritzlar.

By Letters from Magdebourg of the 17th, the Armies of His Prussian Majesty and General Laudohn continued in the same Position as on the 11th.

Eimbeck, Nov. 14. Prince Ferdinand has had the Misfortune of a Fall off his Horse, by which he has bruised his Leg, and is at present confined by that Accident.

Marshal Broglio arrived the 13th at Gottingen. The same Evening the Hereditary Prince attacked, near Katlenbourg, and routed a large Detachment of Cavalry under the Command of M. de Clofen.

This whole District is reduced to a Desert; the Farmers and Peasants have been plundered of all their Cattle, and the Household Goods, and Wearing Apparel of the Inhabitants of the Country Towns and Villages, have, by Order of the French General, been sold by Auction, to supply the Deficiency of the exorbitant and unprecedented Contributions imposed upon them.

Whitehall, November 28.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Élire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Lincoln, for electing a Bishop of that See, the same being now void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God, John, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Salisbury; and also a Letter, recommending to the said Dean and Chapter, Thomas Green, Doctor in Divinity, one of His Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, and Dean of the Cathedral Church of Sarum, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Lincoln.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Élire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Bristol, for electing a Bishop of that See, the same being now void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God, Philip, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Norwich; and also a Letter, recommending to the said Dean and Chapter, Thomas Newton, Doctor in Divinity, one of His Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, and Prebendary of the Collegiate Church of St. Peter Westminster, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Bristol.

Admiralty Office, November 27.

His Majesty's Ship Richmond, commanded by Captain Elphinstone, being on her Way from the Downes to Spithead, on the 24th Instant in the Morning, off Fairleigh, fell in with and took l'Épaveir, a French Lug-sail Cutter Privateer, with Six Swivel Guns and Twenty Men, commanded by François Berthe, belonging to Calais. She had been out but Three Days, and had had no Success.
