WTHEREAS His Majelty was graciously pleased by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty Second Day of July laft, to promife and declare, (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every fuch able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who fhould, on or before the Twelfth Day of September last, enter themselves to serve in His Majefty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieute-nants of His Majefty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as fhould be employed for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy : And that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings fhould be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the said Twelfth Day of September, in like Manner voluntarily enter themfelves to ferve in His Majefly's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every able, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, fhould be paid to any Perfon who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who fhould fecret themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen fhould be taken for His Majefty's faid Service. And whereas the Time limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards hath been extended to the Thirty Firft Day of this Infant October; And it being judged ex-pedient for His Majefty's Service, that the fame should be continued for fome longer Time; His Ma. jefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, as it is hereby accordingly or-dered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take five.
