P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty Second Day of July last, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twelfth Day of September last, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the said Twelfth Day of September, in like Manner voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every able, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service. And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been extended to the Thirty First Day of this Instant *October*; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, as it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty First Day of this Instant *October*, to the Twelfth Day of *December* next inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

**Hamburg, Dec. 4.** The Advices we had received from Pomerania, of General Romanzow's Retreat, are now contradicted; and we are assured, that the Russians made themselves Masters, on the 15th past, of a small Fort called Munde, situated at a Quarter of a German Mile from Colberg, at the Entrance of the River Peisante; the Loss of which, cuts off all Communication by Water between Stetin and Colberg.

The Prince of Wurtemberg has passed the River Rega, and has repulsed a Russian Corps commanded by General Berck, as far as Lepin.

From Berlin we learn, that the Inhabitants have been under very great Apprehensions at the Appearance of an Austrian Corps under General Laschi, at about seven German Miles from that Capital; but Prince Henry having detached General Bandemer in Pursuit of the Enemy, it was hoped they would again pass the Elbe.

The King of Prussia was still, the 27th of last Month, at Strehlen.

**Cologne, Dec. 4.** This Day the Elector of Cologne honoured Count Blankenheim with a Visit, and dined there. His Electoral Highness was received, by the Commandant and Garrison of this Town, with all the Ceremonies and Honours that are due to an Elector of the Empire. Much about the same Time arrived here the Prince of Soubize from Dusseldorf, who also dined at Count Blankenheim's. After Dinner the Elector returned to Bonn; and the Prince of Soubize continued his Journey to Versailles.

**Liege, Dec. 6.** The Prince of Soubize arrived here incognito this Morning. He alighted at Count d'Andlau's, the French Commandant in this City, where he breakfasted, and then set out for Versailles.

We expect To-morrow the Regiment of Royal Bavaria from Ostend: They are destined to reinforce the Garrison of Wesel, which at present consists only of five Battalions.
