*Petersburg, Nov. 17.* The Russian Fleet is at last returned to Cronstadt, but with the Loss of a 64 Gun Ship, which was wrecked upon Dago, at the Entrance of the Gulph of Finland; but the Crew were saved. We hear likewise, that Admiral Polansky, with the Revel Squadron, was arrived at that Port.

*Stockholm, Nov. 24.* The King was pleased to make Yesterday 150 Knights of the Order of the Sword, and of the North Star.

*Hague, Dec. 18.* We have nothing particular by the last Letters from Pomerania; but some Hopes seemed to be entertained, that the Communication between Stettin and Colberg might be soon opened again.

Prince Henry continued to keep his Ground in Saxony. Some Letters from Paris say, that Marshal Broglie was expected to be at Versailles the 23d Instant.

This Day Omar Effendi, Ambassador from Algiers, had an Audience of Leave of her Royal Highness Princess Augusta.

*Admiralty Office, December 21.*

His Majesty's Sloop the Scorpion, commanded by Captain Thomas Hallum, being on a Cruise off Scilly, on the 12th Instant, fell in with, and, after a Chace of Eighteen Hours, took the Boscawen, a Snow Privateer, belonging to St. Malo, of Ten Carriage Guns, 4 Pounders, Six Swivels, and Eighty Men. The Privateer had been out on a Cruise Six Weeks, but had not taken any Thing.
