THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for more effectually preventing the excessive Use of Spirituous Liquors; for Home Consumption, by laying Additional Duties upon Spirits, made in Great Britain, or imported into the same, and for better regulating and encouraging the Exportation of British made Spirits, and for securing the Payment of the Duties upon Spirituous Liquors.

An Act for the Importation of Salted Beef, Pork, and Butter, into this Kingdom from Ireland, for a limited Time, for the Supply of His Majesty's Ships, Transport, and other Ships, and Vessels, in His Majesty's immediate Service and Pay.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from Mullen's Pond, in the County of Southampton, to the Eighteen Mile Stone, from the City of Salisbury near Willoughby Hedge; and from West Amesbury, to Anslow Hill; and from Amesbury to Fiddilton; and from the New Inn, in Amesbury, to the End of the Parishes leading to Durrington; and from Wilt, to Cook's House, and Landsford; and from Beacon Hill, to the Nag's Head; and from thence, One Mile of the Road leading to Straxton, in the County of Wilts.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty Second Day of July last, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twelfth Day of September last, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years,

who should, on or before the said Twelfth Day of September, in like Manner voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every able, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should desert themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service. And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been extended to the Twelfth Day of this Instant December; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Twelfth Day of this Instant December, to the Thirty First Day of January next inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Whitehall, December 26.

On Thursday Night arrived one of His Majesty's Messengers, with Letters of the 11th Instant, from the Earl of Bristol, His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary at the Court of Madrid, by which it appears, That his Excellency having, by His Majesty's Orders, asked a Categorical Answer, with regard to certain Engage-

ments, offensive to Great Britain, supposed to have been contracted between the Courts of Madrid and Versailles; and Monsieur Wall having, by his Catholick Majesty's Order, refused giving any Satisfaction on that Head, the Earl of Bristol was preparing, in Obedience to His Majesty's Commands, to come away from that Court.

Berlin, Dec. 12. Prince Henry still continues at Barnitz; but as the Season is become extremely rigorous, he has put Part of his Army into Quarters of Cantonment in the Villages behind his Line, and it is said he has sent for the Shops or Booths, used by the Merchants of Leipzig in the Time of their Fairs, which are to serve as Guard Rooms for the Shelter of the Troops whilst on Duty.

The Elbe is now quite frozen over; and it is thought that if the Frost continues, it may produce new Operations between the Armies, as the free Passages of the River will greatly facilitate them.

Letters of the 9th from Stettin, just come in, inform us, that the Fortress of Colberg still continued to make a brave Defence; that the Russians lately made a new Attempt to take the Place by Storm, but were repulsed with Loss; and that the Duke of Wurtemberg had entrenched himself near Treptow, with an Intention to throw Provisions, &c. into Colberg.

Berlin, Dec. 15. It is said the King of Prussia entered Breslaw the 9th, and that his Majesty had put his Troops into Winter Quarters.

The Season being extremely rigorous, Prince Henry has put his Army into Quarters of Cantonment, the Left at Meissen, and the Right at Katzenhausen, in such a Manner, that they can quickly be assembled in Case of Need; and that his Highness continues still his Quarters at Barnitz.

The Army of the Empire, which is reckoned to be about Eight or Ten Thousand strong, is likewise gone into Quarters of Cantonment; their Left at Naumburg upon the Saal, the Right at Zwickau; and Marshal Serbelloni has his Quarter in the Center at Weida near Gerä.

Hamburg, Dec. 15. Colberg continues to defend itself with great Vigour; and, according to Letters from Stettin of the 9th Instant, the Russians have been repulsed at a second Assault which they lately made upon that Place.

The Prince of Wurtemberg marched on the 8th from Greiffenberg to Treptow, where he arrived the 10th; and there there were now some Hopes, as the Prince was reinforced by Generals Platen and Schenkendorff, that he would be able to succour the Town in Provisions.

The Diet in Sweden has been prorogued to the 22d of January next.

Cologne, Dec. 19. Orders arrived here the 14th in the Morning, for three thousand Men of this Garrison to hold themselves in Readiness to march on the first Notice. It is supposed the Allied Troops are in Motion.

Liege, Dec. 19. The Regiment of Lockman arrived, the 16th, on the Territories of this State, in their Way to the Lower Rhine. They march by the Campine, instead of coming to take their Quarters here. They are to be followed by the Regiments of Arbonniere and Anhalt.

Maastricht, Dec. 21. This Morning, about five Minutes past Two, the Magazine of Powder near the Brussel's Gate blew up with a most terrible Noise: The Guard of the Magazine, consisting of Eleven Soldiers, were all killed. The House of the Princess of Hesse Philistal was very much shattered; and her Highness buried under the Ruins. The House of Baron Salis, that was nearer the Magazine, was quite destroyed, and not one of the Family escaped except the Coachman. About Eighteen Persons perished by this Disaster, which was occasioned by a Cannonier plundering the Magazine in the Night.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, about a Month ago, the Bones of a Man were dug up in a Garden, in Ashby de la Zouch, in the County of Leicestershire, late in the Possession of Richard Springthorpe, which appeared to have been those of a middle-sized Young Man, from the Admeasurement of them, and from the Teeth being all perfectly sound, and not one missing in the Skull; that, from some Flesh appearing on the said Bones, it is imagined the Man had been buried but a few Years; and, as no Person was missing in the Neighbourhood, it is supposed to have been a Stranger that was murdered: His Majesty, therefore, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice, any Person or Persons, concerned in the said Murder, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person, who actually committed the said Murder) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice, or Accomplices, in the said Crime, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
