The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty Second Day of July last, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twelfth Day of September last, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships; or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the said Twelfth Day of September, in like Manner voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every able, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should desert themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service. And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been extended to the Twelfth Day of this Instant December; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Twelfth Day of this Instant December, to the Thirty First Day of January next inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Petersbourg, Dec. 8.* The Empress having caught Cold at the Opera, has been indisposed for some Days, and obliged to keep her Room; so that the Anniversary of her Imperial Majesty's Accession to the Throne, which was on Sunday last, was not solemnized with the usual Ceremonies. But the Day before, being the Grand Dutchess's Name-Day, the Foreign Ministers had the Honour to make their Court to her Imperial Highness in the Morning; and in the Evening there was a Ball and Supper at Court.

*Tibonville, Dec. 22.* The last Division of the Fish Regiments, coming from our Army on the Upper Rhine, are arrived here, where they wait for further Orders.

*Magdebourg, Dec. 29.* General Platen's Corps was expected to arrive at Berlin on the 28th, and to make some Halt there for Refreshment. Prince Henry having thought proper to extend his Quarters of Cantonment, General Seydlitz has been sent to Leipzig; but the Head Quarters continue still at Barnitz.

*Liege, Dec. 30.* The French King having named M. Lupcourt de Rouville, his Minister Plenipotentiary to our Cardinal Prince, that Gentleman arrived last Tuesday Evening.

*Hambourg, Jan. 1.* We have received Advice here, that the Commandant of Colberg, Colonel Heyden, has, at last, been obliged to surrender the Town, by Capitulation, to the Russians on the 17th past, after having defended himself near Six Months.

The Russians, from being Masters of this Fortress, have since spread themselves in Pomerania, to take up their Winter Quarters; and General Berg has established his at Stargard.

The Prussian General Platen had reached Berlin, in his Way, as is supposed, to join Prince Henry in Saxony; as had the Prince of Wurtemberg, Stettin, on his March into the Dutchy of Mecklenbourg Schwerin.

*Admiralty Office, January 11.*

His Majesty's Ship the Richmond, commanded by Captain Elphinston, being on a Cruize, on the Coast of Spain, fell in with and took on the 4th Instant, seven Leagues from Cape Pinas, the Bearnoise, a French Snow Privateer, belonging and bound to Bayonne, of 14 Carriage and 12 Swivel Guns, and 82 Men. She came from Corunna that Morning.

The Taruffe Cutter has taken and brought to Portsmouth a small French Privateer.

His Majesty's Ship the Brune, commanded by Captain Tonyn, in her Way to Lisbon, with Dispatches, on the 28th of November last, fell in with a French Privateer Snow of 14 or 16 Guns, off Cape Finisterre, which mistaking the Brune for a Merchant Ship, came along Side of her, and obliged Captain Tonyn to fire a Broadside into her before she would surrender. The Wind blowing very hard with a great Sea, Captain Tonyn found it impossible to take Possession of the Privateer; and as she was too much disabled to follow him, he therefore proceeded on his Voyage without her, chusing rather to quit his Prize than lose a favourable Wind, by lying by till the Weather might become moderate.

*Admiralty Office, January 12.*

His Majesty's Ship the Tweed, commanded by Captain Passon, being on a Cruize, fell in with a French Snow Privateer, on the 5th Instant, in the Night, off Scilly, and took her on the 6th at Noon about 17 Leagues S. S. W. from the Ram Head. She proved to be the Duke d'Ayen of 16 Six Pounder Guns, and 120 Men, belonging to Dunkirk, commanded by M. Jean Duchefne.
