The following Address of the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Carnarvon, has been presented to the Queen by Sir John Wynne, Bart. Representative in Parliament for the Borough of Carnarvon: Which Address Her Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the Queen,

The humble Address of the Gentlemen, Clergy and Freeholders of the County of Carnarvon.

Madam,

WE beg Leave to express, in your Royal Presence, how much we felicitate your Majesty's Alliance and Coronation with the greatest and best of Sovereigns.

His Majesty's wife Choice of a Royal Consort, adorned with every Virtue, with every Attainment, good, and amiable, plainly testifies His great Care, not only to preserve to us, but to transmit unfaded to Posterity, the Laurels and Triumphs of His Reign.

We wish, with the honest Ardour and Sincerity of Old Britons, that your Majesty may ever be a Stranger to the Anxieties that often encircle a Crown, and that you may be the happy Mother of a Race of Princes, formed from Parental Examples, to be the Guardians of our Liberties, and the Fathers of their Country.

Magdebourg, Jan. 9. General Platen was expected at Leipzig as this Day, with the Corps under his Command.

Magdebourg, Jan. 12. Prince Henry came to Leipzig on the 8th Instant; and after settling with General Platen the Quarters assigned to the Corps, which that General led into Saxony, the Prince returned, on the 11th, to Hoff, where the Head Quarter is established.

M. Vereist, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General, arrived here last Night from Berlin, in his Way to Holland.

Cologne, Jan. 11. The three Military Hospitals, fixed here last Summer, still subsist; and though we have at present very few sick, yet we have a great Number of Physicians and Surgeons, who have been this Month, for the first Time, paid in Paper Money called Obligations current as Money. The Money formerly sent to the Treasurers of the French Army was Louis, d'Ors and Crowns; but they now send only twenty-five, twelve and a half, eight, and four Sol's Pieces.

Cologne, Jan. 15. All the Foreign Troops in the French Service have received Orders to compleat their Regiments by the first of April; but the Scarcity of Men, and the Trifle they offer for engaging

Soldiers, make the Recruiting in these Countries very slow and unsuccessful.

Liege, Jan. 10. On the Arrival of a Courier from Stockem, with the News that they had withdrawn the Bridge to the Right of the Maese, on hearing the Corps of M. Donceel was advanced to Wert, our Commandant immediately ordered twelve Men per Company of Roial Roussillon to march from Houssiel; the Regiment of Roial Contabres from Ruremond, and detached an hundred Militia from hence, to assist in driving out M. Donceel; but, on Examination, it proved a false Alarm, and none but the Militia marched on this Expedition.

Bonn, Jan. 11. His Electoral Highness has just now published an Order in regard to the bad Money that appears in these Countries; by which that of Wirtemberg, Anspach, Nassau Weilbourg, Oetting, Bavaria, Weid, Deux Ponts, Saltzbourg, and Nuremberg, are reduced to one Half of their former Value. The Town of Cologne has also reduced the Money of the King of Prussia.

Homburgh, Jan. 12. By Advices from Saxony we learn, that his Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia has changed his former Position, and is now at Hoff near Oschatz.

We are informed, that upon the Prince of Wurtemberg's having entered the Duchy of Mecklenbourg Schwerin, the Duke is returned to Lubeck, and has ordered his Mint to be transported to Eutin in Ducal Holstein. The Prince of Wurtemberg's Head Quarters were to be, as to Day, at Rostock, and those of Colonel Belling are already at Gustrow.

Ruremond, Jan. 6. The Regiment of Roial Cantabres, that marched hence last Week, as well as the Cavalry from Munster Bissen, and the Militia from Liege, have received Orders to return to their respective Quarters, as the Report spread of a Body of Hanoverians appearing in the Campine, proves false.
