GEORGE R HEREAS for the fpeedy Manning Our Fleet, We did, by Our Royal Proclamation bearing Date the zzd Day of July last, Promise and Declare, amongst other Things, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fhould be paid to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who fhould, on or before the 12th Day of September then following, enter themfelves to ferve in Our Royal Navy, eitner with the Captains or Lieutenents of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as should be employed for Raifing Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy ; and that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every Abic bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thiry-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who head to nor before the taid 12th Day of September. In like Mannor, voluntarily enter themtelves to ferve in Our Royal Navy; and that a Reward of I vo Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Oldinary Seaman, fhould be paid to any Perfon, who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who should secret themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Sermen should be taken for Our faid Service : Which faid Bounties and Rewards have been continued by Our Orders in Council from the faid 12th Day of September to the 31ft Day of last Month. And whereas many. Men are ftill wanting to compleat the Complements of Our Ships now fitting out for Sea, We do therefore hereby Promise and Declare, That, for the better Encouragement of all fuch Seamer, Seafaring Men, and Ablebodied Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themfelves into Our Service, the Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, be paid to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the 31ft Day of March next, voluniarily enter themfelves to ferve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as shall be employed for Raifing Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy ; And also that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings be paid to every Able-bodied Landman not shore the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the faid 31ft Day of March next, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in Our Royal Navy; And that fuch respective Sums be paid to all fuch Scamen and Landmen immediately upon their Entring, by the Officers, employed in Raifing Men for Our Fleet, with whom fuch Seamen and Landmen fhall infpectively enter. And we do further Promife and Declare, That a Reward of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman fliall be paid to any Perfon who hall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, fo that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our faid Service on or before the faid
