A PROCLAMATION,

*For giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.*

**W**HEREAS for the speedy Manning Our Fleet, We did, by Our Royal Proclamation bearing Date the 22d Day of July last, Promise and Declare, amongst other Things, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the 12th Day of September then following, enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for Raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy; and that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the said 12th Day of September, in like Manner, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person, who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for Our said Service: Which said Bounties and Rewards have been continued by Our Orders in Council from the said 12th Day of September to the 31st Day of last Month. And whereas many Men are still wanting to compleat the Complements of Our Ships now fitting out for Sea, We do therefore hereby Promise and Declare, That, for the better Encouragement of all such Seamen, Seafaring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves into Our Service, the Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for Raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy; And also that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings be paid to every Able-bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of March next, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in Our Royal Navy; And that such respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen and Landmen immediately upon their Entering, by the Officers, employed in Raising Men for Our Fleet, with whom such Seamen and Landmen shall respectively enter. And we do further Promise and Declare, That a Reward of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman shall be paid to any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service on or before the said

31st Day of March next, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men; the said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of our Navy; and at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers where there are any, and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Collectors of Our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors of Our Customs respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen so secured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

The following Address of the Ministers of the Confociated Churches of the Colony of Connecticut, having been transmitted to the Earl of Egremont, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been presented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Ministers of the Confociated Churches of the Colony of Connecticut, convened in General Association at Hartford, June 16, 1761.

Most gracious Sovereign,

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers of the Confociated Churches of the Colony of Connecticut in New England, most humbly beg Leave to take this Opportunity, at our first General Convention since your Majesty's Accession to the Throne, to express our deep Sense of the unpeackable Loss your Majesty, your Kingdoms, and these remote Parts of your Dominions, have sustained by the Death of His late Majesty your Royal Grandfather; and with the sincerest Joy to congratulate your Majesty's happy and peaceable Accession to the Throne of your Ancestors.

The Happiness of His late Majesty's wife and auspicious Government, so sensibly felt in every Part of His Dominions, and the critical Situation of Affairs of Europe, made all good Men, among His Subjects, solicitous for the Continuance of the important Life of your Royal Grandfather; and His sudden Removal would have filled His faithful Subjects with much greater Anxiety, had not your Majesty's Succession to the Crown dispelled their Fears, and opened the most pleasing Prospect of the Continuance of all the Blessings that can be expected from the Government of the best of Kings.

Your Majesty ascends the Throne amidst the Difficulties and Uncertainties of War. We thankfully adore the good Providence of God, which has crowned it with signal Success, in various Parts of the World, and especially in America, where the Designs of your Majesty's Enemies have been utterly defeated, important Acquisitions made to your Majesty's Territories, (which we humbly hope to see united

united to the Crown) and the British Colonies delivered from those Distresses and Devastations to which they were frequently exposed.

Your Majesty's Royal Virtues, Regard to Religion and Virtue, and the true Interest of your Kingdoms, for which you are so much the Delight of your People, give us the most pleasing Hopes of the greatest Security and Happiness under your Majesty's Government.

As the Churches, under our Care, have always distinguished themselves by their Loyalty and Obedience, we humbly recommend them and ourselves to your Majesty's Favour and Protection; and we shall make it our constant Care to inculcate among them Submission to your Majesty's Government and Authority, which we shall endeavour to enforce by our own Example.

And having our Hearts animated with Zeal for your Majesty's Service, we shall not cease to offer up our fervent Supplications to Almighty God, that He would multiply His Blessings upon your Royal Person, that He would render your Majesty's Reign long, happy, and glorious, and that He would maintain the Protestant Succession, in your Majesty's Royal House, to the latest Generations.

*Petersbourg, Jan. 5.* Her Imperial Majesty, of whose Recovery we had before great Hopes, was taken, on Saturday last in the Evening, with a violent Effusion of Blood, and died this Afternoon about Two o'Clock. She retained her Senses to the last; took her Leave of the Great Duke and Dutchess in a very tender Manner; and shewed great Presence of Mind, and Resignation.

Immediately after her Imperial Majesty's Decease, the Senate, and the other Supreme Colleges of the Empire, who were assembled in the Palace for that Purpose, took the Oaths to his present Majesty the Emperor Peter the Third; and then the Regiments of Guards, according to their Rank, who were drawn up before the Windows, had the Oath of Fidelity administered to them; and every Thing passed with the greatest Order and Tranquility.

*Leipzig, Jan. 14.* The 6th Instant his Royal Highness Prince Henry arrived here, accompanied by four or five Generals. The same Afternoon, a Body of Troops, under the Command of the Generals Platen and Wunch, passed through this Town. The 7th they were followed by six Regiments of Prince Henry's Army. The 8th they had taken several Places: And the 12th were within a League of Naumbourg, which the Army of the Empire had quitted, being retired towards Weimar, though not without Loss, as we see daily a Number of Prisoners brought in here, as well as a great deal of Baggage.

*Eisnach, Jan. 18.* The Saxon Troops quartered here, and in the Neighbourhood of this Town, have been greatly alarmed by the unexpected March of a great Body of Prussians, who have obliged the Army of the Empire to quit their Quarters with great Precipitation. The 16th a Camp was traced near Langensaltz. The Saxons, that are here, received Today Orders to hold themselves ready to march; and they are to be joined at Langensaltz by a great Corps of French Troops.

*Berlin, Jan. 21.* By a Letter dated at Petersburgh, the 29th of December N<sup>o</sup>. S. we are informed, that the Empress had been taken ill on the 23d of that Month; that in the Night, between Friday and Saturday the 26th, her Life was thought to be in great Danger; that a great Bleeding at her Nose had been stop'd by the Remedies applied, but the Fever still continued; that on the 29th her Imperial Majesty was better, but it was thought her Recovery would be an Affair of Time. Yesterday Letters from Konigsberg, in the New Marche of Brandenburg, of the 18th Instant, give an Account, that it was publicly known in the Russian Army, that the Empress was dead.

This is confirmed by an Express from the Duke of Bevern, of the 18th, from Stettin, with these farther Particulars, that the Great Duke had been immediately proclaimed Emperor; and that upon the Arrival of the Russian Courier at Stargart, on the 17th, General Berge had received the Compliments of the Russian Officers on that Occasion, and had proclaimed the new Emperor Peter the Third.

*Berlin, Jan. 25.* Upon the Junction of Count Platen's Corps, Prince Henry has made some Motions for enlarging his Quarters, and has driven the Troops of the Empire out of Naumbourg, Zeitz, Altembourg, and Gera.

*Magdebourg, Jan. 21.* The Officers, that have been sent to recruit in the different Cantons of Silesia, and in Saxony, and Westphalia, have succeeded better than could have been expected in the present State of those Countries.

Marshal Daun went some Time ago to Vienna; and General O'Donnel has the Command of the Austrian Army in Saxony in his Absence.

A great Number of Waggons, loaded with Provisions and Forage, set out almost daily from this Place, for the Subsistence of the Prussian Army in Saxony.
