Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That the following anonymous threatening Letter, directed as hereunder, has been received, by the Post; by William Clark, Esq; one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Surry, who lives at Loman's Pond, in the Parish of St. Saviour, Southwark, viz.

"Villian I am to acquaint You That I am coming to Town to be revenged on You That is if You will not grant a little Money on Demand it is no more than £ 50. if not Villian Your Life is at a Stake by me or some of my Gang Put the Money in a Place where I shall mark for You, or any One You shall debetise to serue You and That You may observe by a Letter B : that I shall put near the Place be shwre to put the Money under the Corner of the great Stone the Bottom of Your Yard put no Watch on or You may be shure You Sounderl to have Your Brains blowed out be me or some of mine in a short Time after so do not fail You Villian or else it will be worse for You damed Scouderl I care not much whether Your Life or Your Money."

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing and Sending the said anonymous threatening Letter to the said William Clark, as aforesaid, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote and sent the same) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a farther Encouragement, William Clark, Esq; of Loman's Pond, in the Parish of St. Saviour Southwark, does hereby promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds, to any Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as before excepted) to be paid by him, upon the Conviction of one or more of the Offenders.
