A PROCLAMATION,

For giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.

WHEREAS for the speedy Manning Our Fleet, We did, by Our Royal Proclamation bearing Date the 22d Day of July last, Promise and Declare, amongst other Things, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the 12th Day of September then following, enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for Raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy; and that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the said 12th Day of September, in like Manner, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person, who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for Our said Service: Which said Bounties and Rewards have been continued by Our Orders in Council from the said 12th Day of September to the 31st Day of last Month. And whereas many Men are still wanting to compleat the Complements of Our Ships now fitting out for Sea, We do therefore hereby Promise and Declare, That, for the better Encouragement of all such Seamen, Seafaring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves into Our Service, the Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for Raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy; And also that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings be paid to every Able-bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of March next, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in Our Royal Navy; And that such respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen and Landmen immediately upon their Entering, by the Officers, employed in Raising Men for Our

Fleet, with whom such Seamen and Landmen shall respectively enter. And we do further Promise and Declare, That a Reward of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman shall be paid to any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service on or before the said 31st Day of March next, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men; the said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of our Navy; and at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers where there are any, and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Collectors of Our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors of Our Customs respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

GOD Save the KING.

Lisbon, Feb. 20. The Thunderer, Anfon, and Montague, arrived here the 11th Instant, from Sir Charles Saunders's Squadron, to take in Provisions. The Atrethufa Frigate, in her Way from Gibraltar, having lost her Main Mast, put into this Port to rest. Capt. Vane, who commands her, has taken two Prizes, one of which is sent to Gibraltar; the other is the Guerrier, of 500 Tons, and 24 Guns, laden with Provisions, and bound from Bourdeaux to Martinico: She is come into this Port.

Signior Joseph de Sáa Perreira, who is appointed Minister Plenipotentiary from this Court to the States General, goes over with the Packet.

The King has been pleased to present James Trail, Doctor in Divinity, to the Vicarage of West Ham in the County of Essex, and Diocese of London, void by the Death of Hugh Wyatt, the last Incumbent.

Admiralty Office, March 15.

His Majesty's Ship the Essex, commanded by Captain Schomberg, being upon a Cruize, on the 9th Instant, took off Ushant the Romain of Dunkirk, a French Privateer of 20 Cardage Guns, mostly Six Pounders, besides Swivels, with 130 Men, commanded by M. de Cock, and has sent her into Portsmouth.

His Majesty's Ship the Tartar, commanded by Capt. John Knight, being also upon a Cruize, on



the 7th Instant fell in with, and took the Cerberus Privateer of St. Maloes, of 12 Carriage and 10 Swivel Guns, and 105 Men; and on the 10th, after a Chace of Eleven Hours, took the Augustin Privateer of the same Place, having 10 Carriage Guns and 80 Men, and is arrived at Plymouth with both the Prizes.
