The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing
Date the Second Day of February last, to Promise
and Declare (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of March last, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for Raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy; and that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of March last, in like Manner, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Perfon, who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards expired on the Thirtyfirst of March last; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued to be paid from the faid 31st of March, to the 31st of May next; and that some Alterations should be made in the Manner of Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewards-His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore Order; and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the aforementioned Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majefty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for Raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Navy; And also, that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings be continued to be paid to every Able-bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And that sch respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen

Majesty's Fleet, with whom such Seamen and Land+ men shall respectively enter; and where there is not any Regulating Officer, by the Clerk of the Cheque or Naval Officer of any of His Majesty's Dockyards—And His Majesty doth hereby further Order. That the aforementioned Rewards of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret chemselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for His Majesty's faid Service on or before the faid 31st Day of May next, by any Sea Officers employed for raising Men, or be brought to any of the faid Officers, or to the Clerks of the Cheque or Naval Officer at any of His Majesty's Dock-yards: The said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and at the Out-Ports, by the Naval Officers where there are any; and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Officers employed in Raifing Men; or, in Cafe of there not being any such Officer or Officers, by the Collectors of His Majesty's Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the faid Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, Naval Officers, Officers employed in procuring Men, or Collectors of His Majesty's Customs respectively, by the Person or Persons who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by fuch Officer as may take fuch Seaman or Seamen for His Majesty's Service - Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

I Thank you for this very affectionate Address: The Congratulations you offer Me in the Name of the Church of Scotland, on the happy Occasion of My Marriage, and the Assurances you give Me of their Zeal and Loyalty in Support of My Government, are very acceptable to Me, and they may always depend on My Care and Protection.

Petersbourg, March 11. Baron Goltz, Colonel, Majesties, was presented on Sunday Morning both to the Emperor and Empress, and niet with a most gracious Reception. He had the Honour afterwards to dine in Publick with their Imperial Majesties.

Yesterday Mr. Keith, Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of Great Britain, had the Honour of Entertaining his Imperial Majesty at Dinner at his House, with the two Dukes of Holstein, and several other Persons of the first Distinction.

Warfaw, March 17. The King of Poland is quite recovered of his late Indisposition, and appears

again in Publick, as usual.

The Emperor of Russia has given Three Hundred Thousand Roubles to the Inhabitants of Pomerania, who have suffered most in this War, and ordered the Magazines, that were formed in that Part, to be distributed amongst them.

The Danish Troops, Hamburgh, March 30. which broke up the 20th and 21st Instant from their Quarters of Cantonment in this Neighbourhood, have drawn a Cordon from Bransledt near to Neustadt, a Town situated upon the Frontiers of Ducal Holstein, and their Head Quarters were Yesterday at Arensbocke.

Hague, March 30. The Archduchess Josepha was brought to Bed of a Princess on the 20th of this Month at Vienna. The Generals were then not yet

set out for the Army.

Extract of a Letter from Lieutenant Nash, of His Majesty's Ship the Milford, to Mr. Clevland. Dated at Sea the 10th of March, 1762, and fince

arrived at Plymouth.

I beg you will be pleased to acquaint their Lordships of our seeing a Sail on Sunday the 7th Instant, at Ten in the Morning, which we came up with at Ten at Night, and engaged in Latitude 34° 15' N. and Longitude 15° 7' W. from the Meridian of London. We had the Misfortune to have Capt. Man shot through the Right Thigh, at the Beginning of the Engagement, with a Six Pound Ball: He expired about Three on Monday Morning. Mr. Day, First Lieutenant, received a Musquet Ball in the Middle of his Forehead, about Half past Eleven, which he died of on Wednesday Morning, being most of the Time delirious. I received some slight Wounds, about Half past Two on Monday Morning, thwart my Eyes, Face, and Hands, by a Wad and Half an Hour after, the Enemy struck, Splinters. with the Lofs of her Main and Mizen Masts, and Fore Top-mast. She proved to be the Glory, a Letter of Marque, Jean Raboteau, Master, from Passage near St. Sebastian, to St. Domingo, belonging to Bourdeaux, 16 Six Pounders, 10 Swivels, and 94 Men, 86 French Feet Keel, and 23 Feet Beam, pierced for 20 Guns, loaded with Wine, Flour, Brandy, Bale Goods, &c. and had been a Privatier of Bayonne. She fails very fast, and left Passage the 26th ult. had six Men killed, and Eighteen wounded, fome dangerously. We had one private Man and a Boy killed; and thirteen wounded, Petty Officers and Seamen, all likely to do well. Immediately after the struck, we lost our Main and Mizen Masts close by the Board, with all thereto belonging, our Stays and Rigging being shot away.

Newcastle and Durhem, on Friday the 26th of Fe-bruary last, had the Mitsfortune to overturn his Mail.
