AT the Court at St. James's, the 2d Day of April, 1762,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Second Day of February last, to Promise and Declare (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of March last, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for Raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy; and that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of March last, in like Manner, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person, who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards expired on the Thirty-first of March last; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued to be paid from the said 31st of March, to the 31st of May next; and that some Alterations should be made in the Manner of Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards—His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore Order; and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the aforementioned Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for Raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Navy; And also, that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings be continued to be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And that each respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen

and Landmen immediately upon their Entering, by the Officers, employed in Raising Men for His Majesty's Fleet, with whom such Seamen and Landmen shall respectively enter; and where there is not any Regulating Officer, by the Clerk of the Cheque or Naval Officer of any of His Majesty's Dock-yards—And His Majesty doth hereby further Order, That the aforementioned Rewards of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for His Majesty's said Service on or before the said 31st Day of May next, by any Sea Officers employed for raising Men, or be brought to any of the said Officers, or to the Clerks of the Cheque or Naval Officer at any of His Majesty's Dock-yards: The said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and at the Out-Ports, by the Naval Officers where there are any; and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Officers employed in Raising Men; or, in Case of there not being any such Officer or Officers, by the Collectors of His Majesty's Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, Naval Officers, Officers employed in procuring Men, or Collectors of His Majesty's Customs respectively, by the Person or Persons who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for His Majesty's Service—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Marriage with a Princess of Illustrious Birth and most amiable Qualities. Attached to your Majesty by Affection as well as Duty, we rejoice in every Circumstance which can add to your Satisfaction. Sensible of the Felicity which we ourselves have enjoyed under your Majesty's gracious Government, we could form no better Wish for our Posterity, than that the same Blessings might be transmitted to them, and that they too might live under Kings, who fear God and love their People. To your Majesty's tender Concern for the Welfare of your Subjects, we are now indebted for the Prospect of having this Wish compleated; and distant Ages, we trust, shall enjoy Liberty and Happiness under the mild Administration of your Descendants.

While we express our own Gratitude and Joy, permit us to add, that the same dutiful and loyal Sentiments animate all the Members of this National Church. Our daily Intercourse with our People affords us the best Opportunity of knowing their Sense of the Blessings which they enjoy. It is with peculiar Satisfaction we assure your Majesty, that as they participate of the same Advantages with the Rest of your Subjects, they yield to none of them in Attachment to their gracious Sovereign, and in Veneration for that wise Constitution, from which they derive their present Happiness; and if your Majesty, in the Course of this War, which your Enemies, blinded with Envy and Ambition, have prolonged and extended, shall find it proper to call your Subjects, in this Part of the united Kingdom, to defend your Sacred Person, their Religion, and Liberties, they will embrace the Opportunity with Ardour, and will act, we doubt not, with the Spirit becoming a free and loyal People.

That Almighty God may take you under His gracious Tuition; that He may give Prosperity to your Administration, and Success to your Arms; that He may bless you with Domestic Comfort to sooth and alleviate the Cares of Government; and that our most gracious King and Queen may be long preferred to bless the People, and to serve as Patterns and Protectors of Piety and Virtue, are the sincere and fervent Prayers of,

*I Thank you for this very affectionate Address: The Congratulations you offer Me in the Name of the Church of Scotland, on the happy Occasion of My Marriage, and the Assurances you give Me of their Zeal and Loyalty in Support of My Government, are very acceptable to Me, and they may always depend on My Care and Protection.*

Petersbourg, March 11. Baron Goltz, Colonel, Aid de Camp, and Chambellan to the King of Prussia, having arrived here the 4th Instant, with his Prussian Majesty's Compliments to their Imperial

Majesties, was presented on Sunday Morning both to the Emperor and Empress, and met with a most gracious Reception. He had the Honour afterwards to dine in Publick with their Imperial Majesties.

Yesterday Mr. Keith, Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of Great Britain, had the Honour of Entertaining his Imperial Majesty at Dinner at his House, with the two Dukes of Holstein, and several other Persons of the first Distinction.

Warsaw, March 17. The King of Poland is quite recovered of his late Indisposition, and appears again in Publick, as usual.

The Emperor of Russia has given Three-Hundred Thousand Roubles to the Inhabitants of Pomerania, who have suffered most in this War, and ordered the Magazines, that were formed in that Part, to be distributed amongst them.

Hamburgh, March 30. The Danish Troops, which broke up the 20th and 21st Instant from their Quarters of Cantonment in this Neighbourhood, have drawn a Cordon from Brantstedt near to Neustadt, a Town situated upon the Frontiers of Ducal Holstein, and their Head Quarters were Yesterday at Arensböcke.

Hague, March 30. The Archduchess Josepha was brought to Bed of a Princess on the 20th of this Month at Vienna. The Generals were then not yet set out for the Army.

*Extract of a Letter from Lieutenant Nash, of His Majesty's Ship the Milford, to Mr. Cleveland. Dated at Sea the 10th of March, 1762, and since arrived at Plymouth.*

I beg you will be pleased to acquaint their Lordships of our seeing a Sail on Sunday the 7th Instant, at Ten in the Morning, which we came up with at Ten at Night, and engaged in Latitude  $34^{\circ} 15' N.$  and Longitude  $15^{\circ} 7' W.$  from the Meridian of London. We had the Misfortune to have Capt. Man shot through the Right Thigh, at the Beginning of the Engagement, with a Six Pound Ball: He expired about Three on Monday Morning. Mr. Day, First Lieutenant, received a Musquet Ball in the Middle of his Forehead, about Half past Eleven, which he died of on Wednesday Morning, being most of the Time delirious. I received some slight Wounds, about Half past Two on Monday Morning, thwart my Eyes, Face, and Hands, by a Wad and Splinters. Half an Hour after, the Enemy struck, with the Loss of her Main and Mizzen-Masts, and Fore-Top-mast. She proved to be the Glory, a Letter of Marque, Jean Raboteau, Master, from Passage near St. Sebastian, to St. Domingo, belonging to Bourdeaux, 16 Six Pounds, 10 Swivels, and 94 Men, 86 French Feet Keel, and 23 Feet Beam, pierced for 20 Guns, loaded with Wine, Flour, Brandy, Bale Goods, &c. and had been a Privatier of Bayonne. She sails very fast, and left Passage the 26th ult. had six Men killed, and Eighteen wounded, some dangerously. We had one private Man and a Boy killed; and thirteen wounded, Petty Officers and Seamen, all likely to do well. Immediately after the struck, we lost our Main and Mizzen Masts close by the Board, with all thereto belonging, our Stays and Rigging being shot away.

*Whereas the Post Boy bringing the Mail between Newcastle and Durham, on Friday the 26th of February last, had the Misfortune to overturn his Mail Carriage in Birtley Lane, between the Hours of Ten and*

and Eleven o'Clock at Night; and during the Time of his Absence in seeking Assistance to get up the said Carriage, he found upon his Return to the Place, where the Accident happened, that the Newcastle Bag (containing the Berwick, Belford, Alnwick and Morpeth Bags, with the Bye-Bag from the North for Burrough-bridge) was taken away from the said Carriage, by a Person or Persons unknown; and notwithstanding all possible Search and Inquiry has been made after the said Bag, and a Reward offered for restoring it to either the Post-master of Newcastle or Durham, the same is still missing; This is therefore to give Notice, that whoever will discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, the Person or Persons who stole and carried off the said large Leathern Bag, containing the several Bags before mentioned; such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party or Parties, be intitled to a Reward of Fifty Pounds.
