Westminster, April 8.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act to explain, amend, and reduce into one Act of Parliament, the several Laws now in being, relating to the raising and training the Militia, within that Part of Great Britain called England.

An Act for the Encouragement of Seamen, and the more speedy and effectual Manning His Majesty's Navy.

An Act for the better supplying the Cities of London and Westminster with Fish; and to reduce the present exorbitant Price thereof; and to protect and encourage Fishermen.

An Act for rendering more effectual an Act, made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, intituled, An Act for providing a public Reward for such Person or Persons as shall discover the Longitude at Sea, with regard to the making Experiments of Proposals made for discovering the Longitude.

An Act for the better Preservation of the Game, in that Part of Great Britain, called England.

An Act for Relief of the Vassals of the several Estates, which are, or may be, annexed to the Crown, by Virtue of an Act, passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, and for carrying the Purposes of the said Act more effectually into Execution, and for enforcing, and carrying into Execution, so much of an Act, passed in the First Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, as relates to the paying, and discharging, the Warrants affecting the Estate of Lord Lovat.

An Act for repairing and widening the high Road, leading from Ashborne, in the County of Derby, to the Town of Leek, in the County of Stafford, and from Ryecroft Gate, upon Rushton Common, to Congleton, in the County of Chester; and also the Road, leading from Blyth Marsh, in the County of Stafford, through Cheadle, Oakmoor, and Blore, to the Turnpike Road, from Ashborne to Buxton, near Thorp, in the County of Derby.

An Act for repairing, widening, turning, and shortening, the Road leading from the Turnpike Road on Farwards Common, in the Parish of Bradford, through Holt, and Melksham, to Homans Stile, in the Parish of Laycock, in the County of Wilts.

An Act for amending, widening, altering, and keeping in Repair, the Road, from the South End of Sparrows Herne, on Bushey Heath, through the Market Towns of Watford, Berkhamstead, Saint Peters, and Fring, in the County of Hertford, by Pettipbers Elms, to the Turnpike Road at Walton, near Aylesbury, in the County of Bucks.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Turnpike Road at Weyhill, in the County of Southampton, to the Turnpike Road at Lyde Way, in the County of Wilts.

An Act for altering, widening, and amending, the Road, from the North Gate of the City of Winchester, over Worthy Cow Down, through Whitechurch and other Places, to Newtown River, and also the Road, from Worthy Cow Down aforesaid, through Wberwell, to the present Turnpike Road at Andover, in the County of Southampton.

An Act for continuing, enlarging, and rendering more effectual, so much of an Act, made in the Fourteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for enlarging the Terms and Powers, granted by two Acts of Parliament, for repairing the Roads, leading from Seven Oaks, to Woodsgate and Tonbridge Wells; and from Woodsgate, to Kippings Cross, in the County of Kent; and also for repairing the Roads from Kippings Cross aforesaid, to Lamberhurst Pound, and Pullens Hill, in the said County; and to Flimwell Vent, in the County of Sussex, as relates to the amending, repairing, and keeping in Repair, the said Roads, leading from Kippings Cross aforesaid, to Lamberhurst Pound, Pullens Hill, and Flimwell Vent aforesaid.

An Act to amend an Act, made in the Thirty-second Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing and widening several Roads, therein mentioned, in the Counties of Southampton and Dorset; and for amending and widening the Road, between Ringwood Gate, in the County of Southampton to Woolfbridge; and from thence, to the Great Western Road, between a Place called Twick Thorn and Cashmore Inn.

An Act for repairing the Road, from the Turnpike Road, on the Top of Whitesheet Hill, to a Place called the Hare Warren; and from thence, to the Index Post, standing near the Blandford Turnpike Road, on the Side of Harnbam Hill; and also for repairing and widening the Road, from the said Index Post, to a House called Master Baker's Farm House, in the County of Wilts.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from the White Post, on Haselden's Wood, in the Parish of Cranbrooke, to Appledore Heath; and from Milk House Street, in the same Parish, to Castleden's Oak, in the Parish of Biddenden; and from Goldford Green, in the said Parish of Cranbrooke, to Tanners Vent in the Parish of Benenden, all in the County of Kent.

An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads, leading from Bridge Town Pomeroy, and from Teign Bridge, in the County of Devon.

An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, made in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, for making navigable Sankey Brook, in the County of Lancaster, and for the extending and improving the said Navigation.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor, and for cleansing the Streets, Lanes, and other Passages and Places, in the Parish of St. James, within the Liberty of Westminster, and for enlarging the Church-yard belonging to the said Parish.

An Act for building two new Churches, and providing Burial Places within the Town of Liverpool, in the County Palatine of Lancaster; and for the better preserving the Pavements of the Streets in the said Town; and for ascertaining the Fares and Prices to be paid to Carters, Carmen, Hackney Coachmen, and Chairmen; and for regulating their Behaviour within the said Town.

An Act for continuing and rendering more effectual an Act, passed in the Tenth Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act, for continuing an Act, passed in the Third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the First, for laying a Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or one-sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, on every Pint of Ale or Beer, that shall be vended, or sold, within the Town of Dumfries, and Privileges thereof, for paying the Debts of the said Town, and for building a Church, and making a Harbour there; and for laying a Duty on the Tonnage of Shipping, and a Duty on Goods imported and exported, into, and out of, the Port of the said Town, for the better repairing of the said Harbour.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Second Day of February last, to Promise and Declare (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of March last, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for Raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy; and that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of March last, in like Manner, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person, who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards expired on the Thirty-first of March last; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued to be paid from the said 31st of March, to the 31st of May next; and that some Alterations should be made in the Manner of Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards—His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore Order; and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the aforementioned Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for Raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Navy; And also, that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings be continued to be paid to every Able-bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And that such respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen and Landmen immediately upon their Entering, by the Officers, employed in Raising Men for His Majesty's Fleet, with whom such Seamen and Landmen shall respectively enter; and where there is not any Regulating Officer, by the Clerk of the Cheque or Naval Officer of any of His Majesty's Dock-yards—And His Majesty doth hereby further Order, That the aforementioned Rewards of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for His Majesty's said Service on or before the said 31st Day of May next, by any Sea Officers employed for raising Men, or be brought to any of the said Officers, or to the Clerks of the Cheque or Naval Officer at any of His Majesty's Dock-yards: The said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and at the Out-Ports, by the Naval Officers where there are any; and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Officers employed in Raising Men; or, in Case of there not being any such Officer or Officers, by

the Collectors of His Majesty's Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, Naval Officers, Officers employed in procuring Men, or Collectors of His Majesty's Customs respectively, by the Person or Persons who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for His Majesty's Service—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

May it please your Majesty,

Graciously to accept the humble Congratulations of your ever dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of your City of London, in Common Council assembled, upon the Glorious and Important Conquest of the Strong, Fertile and Opulent Island of Martinico, and the Consequential Surrender of Sainte Lucie; Acquisitions doubly valuable, as they considerably diminish the Naval and Commercial Strength of France, and proportionably extend and secure the Commerce and Navigation of Great Britain and her Colonies.

The amazing Rapidity of this Conquest reflects a Lustre upon our former Triumphs, as well as the highest Honour upon the Royal Wisdom that planned and directed, the Skill, Unanimity and Activity that conducted, and the heroic Valour of the Fleet and Army that effected it with so little Loss, and leaves your Majesty at full Liberty to turn your victorious Arms to other Places, where the Enemies of your Majesty, and your Kingdoms, are no less vulnerable, and will most sensibly feel the Necessity of dissolving their late dangerous Compact, and of submitting to Terms of Peace, adequate to our Successes, and the Expences of this just and necessary War; Your Majesty, undazzled by the Splendour of repeated Victories, having no other View than to vindicate the Honour of your Crown, and to establish and secure the just Rights and Possessions of your Subjects.

In so laudable a Pursuit, so becoming the Father of His People, your Majesty may firmly rely on the strongest and most chearful Efforts of the grateful Citizens of London, united in Duty and Affection to your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, and in Zeal for the Glory and Prosperity of their Country.

Stockholm, March 23. The 7th of next Month the Prince Royal is to take his Oath as Senator, with great Solemnity, before the States of the Kingdom, after having been confirmed the Day before in the Church.
