Falmenth, October 31.

He 29 of this month there went out of this Harbor 2 Oftenders, 3 Swedes, and one Hamburgher, all of them bound for France, for the new Vintage. Several Velicls came in hither the same day from the Isle of Wight, laden with Timber and Coale, they met with no Pickaroons, nor have any of late been feen upon thefe Coafts.

Hull, November 2. Yesterday by a Billander here arriving from Oftend, but belonging to Bruges, we are insomed of a Dutch Man of Warr, of ten or twelve guns, riding to the Southward of Humber, who on Wednelday hit surprized two light Colliers, putting two others a fteare.

Portsmouth, November .. On Thursday last a Sweder Veffel called the Tager of Wifmar, laden with Clap-board, and bound for Bourdeaux, was by ill weather driven on shoire near this place, and in much danger to be loft.

Gennua, Octob. 23. The Spaniards and Milanois are grown very jealous of the Venetians, upon the magnifick Reception of the Infanta, in the City of Breffe, where the was complemented by their Ambaffedor Extraordinary, followed by a Train of 150 Coaches, 1000 Gentlemen, 2000 Curi. silers, 50 Pages, and 150 Lucquies in very rich Liveries. All which Train were to attend her, during all the time fire continued in their Territories

The Empress continues her Voyage, attended by the Duke of Albuquerque, who intends at Trens to give his charge into the hands of the Emperors Ministers, who there wait her arrival; which performed, he is to return for this place, and to Emberque in two Gilliet of the Sicilian Squadron, that are to wait for him in this Port, to transport him to his Vice-Royalty; though 'cis discoursed, that he has some eye upon the Government of Milan, for which be has a great inclination, and 'tis faid likewife, that Don Louis Ponce de Leon, is as willing to quit it to him.

The Countel's d'Evill accompanied with her Sons and Daughers, and a Train of 80 persons is arrived at Milan, and hastning after the Empress towards Trens.

Venice, Octob. 24. Our late Letters from Adrianople inform us that the Visier Azem, as 'tie faid, has received full power from the Grand Signior to conclude a Peace with this Republique, on what termes he shall think reasons-ble, and Signior Ballarino our Ambassador is by the Vifiers defire making his applications accordingly, who by the affiltance of Pavayotti a Greek, Interpreter to the Grand Signier, and of some interest in that Court, is in great hopes of bringing that affair to a good issue. The Visier has already effered some termes for an Agreement, Fig. That the Republique hould quit Suda, and dismantle it, and that the Grand Signior should do the same to New-Candis, and give it up with a Territory about it of twenty miles compais : but Suda is thought too confiderable a Port, and the Fortress too great a Brength to be easily parted with, which termes not pleasing the Ambassador, the business is at refent in suspence, but yet we are not out of hope of polfelling both Candia and suda, especially since the Visier is not over nealous in going for that I dand, as he will be obliged to doe, if the Treaty take no eft. Et.

The French Ambaffador at Adrianople hath lately demuided 64 new Articles to be added to their former Capituations, but the Chimacham there has selected out of that large number about eight or ten which he has sent away to the Visier Agem, to consider of them. The same Letters advise us that the Grand Signior has lately given order for the cutting off the head of the New King of Tartary, which is supposed to proceed from the Address and inflance of the Sin of the Old King, who is at present at his Court, and in much efteem and favor with the Grand Signioc.

Great preparations are making by the Tutks, for supply of the Fleet, and leavies going on for Men to be sent into Candia, in case the Treaty take not the designed effect, and great numbers of boats and small barques, fitting up for the Transportations both of Men and Previsions. The Grand Visier intends speedily for Negropont to encourage that service, and from thence for Lariffa, where he tesolves to pals the Winter.

The Squedron designed for the recruit of our Fleet is failed kence, carrying with them 200000 Ducates, and 2000 Men. Our Letters from Zante inform us, that the Atmada lies at present about the Streights of Scio, but that the Tunks have so inconsiderable a force at Sea, that we stand not in any apprehension of their sudden attempts. The Genoua Convoy is past by them, and were visited by our Armada, but with no other damage to them, then only the feifing of some Counterband goods that were found aboard

Paris, Nevemb. 10. We discourse much here of 18 new Adicts which are to be called the Codes containing general Rules to be observed by all the Justices of France, which 'ris faid) are to be authorised and confirmed by the Courts Soversign at the beginning of the Parliament.

The Chamber for the General Government of the City se closes, and have made so fair progress, that Montieur Puffors giving the other day an account of it to the Council, affured That in three weeks time there would fuch effectual Orders be taken, that all the streets in Park should be as secure by night as by day; to which purpole, command is given for fetting up great Lights in every corner of each street, with a prohibition to all forts of persons, from walking the freets after eight at night, without a light with them ; with Orders to the Captain of the Guards, to make Rop of all that shall presume to go without.

In profecution of which defign, the Swiffere are ordered to quarret in the leveral divilions of the City; and 200 Muskettiers to lodge in the Rue St. Honore, it being judged convenient at present for the better security of the place, and desired by the Chancellor and Lieutenant-Criminal, who are to be responsible for all Rabberies, or Assassinates that shall be

The Body of Tradesimen that deal in Points of Venice and other Laces, have lately presented a Perision to his Majeily, in which, they beg the liberty of continuing their Trades as heretofore, in those kindes of Manufactures, which they will oblige to make much better and cheaper then those of the new Manufactory of Monfieur Colbert, and will engage their lives not to make sale of any, but what shall be made within the Kingdom.

Letters from Flanders inform us, that the Marquels de Castel Rodrigo, Governor of the Low-Countrieys, has by Order from the Council of Spain, publisht through all the places of his Government, a Prohibition, that no Merchandises shall for the future be transported into France, nor any Wines or Provisions be brought from France: Which we suppose to be an effect of the late establishment of our Manufactury for Lace here, by which the Flemings are debarred from a great profit they were used to make in that Commo-

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The Council Lere has ordered for the Regulation of Corporations, That the Masters of Companies of all Trades shall continue as they are in all Corporations; but for the future, no man shall be made free by producing his Masterpiece, but by Letters which they shall be bound to take from his M jesty, without any Obligation to the Corporation or Ancient Masters of the Trade, or payment of any Fees to the Town where they live.

Some late Letters make mention of a Treaty fer on foot between the Duke of Savoy, and the City of Geneva; and that there is fair hopes of putting a good end to the affair. We are also advised by other Letters, of the Arrival of the Cardinal de Retz at his own Countrey of Commercy in Lor-

fain.
