**7HEREAS** His Majefty was gracioufly pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Second Day of February last, to Promife and Declare (amongft other Things) That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, fhould be paid to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who fhould, on or before the Thirty-first Day of March last, enter themfelves to ferve in His Majefty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majetty's Ships, or the Chief. Officers on Board fuch Tenders as should be employed for Raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy ; and that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the faid Thirty-first Day of March last, in like Manner, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Perfon, who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen thould be taken for His Majefty's faid Service-And whereas the Time limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards expired on the Thirtyfirst of March last; and it being judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, that the fame should be continued to be paid from the faid 31st of March, to the 31st of May next; and that fome Alterations should be made in the Manner of Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewards-His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore Order; and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the aforementioned Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majeity's Ship:, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Fenders as shall be employed for Raising Men for the Service of His Majelty's Navy; And alfo, that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings be continued to be raid to every Able-bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the faid 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And that fuch respective Sums be paid to all fuch Seamen and Landmen immediately upon their Entring, by the Officers, employed in Raifing Men for His Majefty's Fleet, with whom fuch Seatnen and Landmen shall respectively enter ; and where there is not any Regulating Officer, by the Clerk of the Cheque or Naval Officer of any of His Majefty's Dock-
