The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Second Day of February last, to Promise and Declare (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of March last, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for Raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy; and that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of March last, in like Manner, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person, who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards expired on the Thirty-first of March last; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued to be paid from the said 31st of March, to the 31st of May next; and that some Alterations should be made in the Manner of Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards—His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore Order; and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the aforementioned Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for Raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Navy; And also, that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings be continued to be paid to every Able-bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And that such respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen and Landmen immediately upon their Entering, by the Officers, employed in Raising Men for His Majesty's Fleet, with whom such Seamen and Landmen shall respectively enter; and where there is not any Regulating Officer, by the Clerk of the Cheque or Naval Officer of any of His Majesty's Dock-

yards—And His Majesty doth hereby further Order, That the aforementioned Rewards of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for His Majesty's said Service on or before the said 31st Day of May next, by any Sea Officers employed for raising Men, or be brought to any of the said Officers, or to the Clerks of the Cheque or Naval Officer at any of His Majesty's Dock-yards: The said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and at the Out-Ports, by the Naval Officers where there are any; and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Officers employed in Raising Men; or, in Case of there not being any such Officer or Officers, by the Collectors of His Majesty's Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, Naval Officers, Officers employed in procuring Men, or Collectors of His Majesty's Customs respectively, by the Person or Persons who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for His Majesty's Service—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Copenhagen, April 6. The King and Queen of Denmark, together with the young Princesses, and the Princess Charlotte, set out this Morning for Friedenbourg. The Queen Dowager is still indisposed.

Hambourg, April 9. We hear from Mecklenberg, that the Swedish General Ehrenschwerd has proposed to the Prince of Wurtemberg, who commands the Prussian Troops in that Dutchy, a Cessation of Arms for Two Months.

Hanover, April 9. General Luckner having detached 500 Hussars to Heiligenstadt, the Marquis de Lortange marched out of Gottingen with 1800 Horse, and 2000 Foot, to intercept them, of which the Former having Notice, he put himself at the Head of 1600 Horse; and having come up with the French General the 6th Instant, as he was recreating in great Hast towards Gottingen, he fell upon his Rear, killed him 30 Men, and took Fourscore Prisoners, besides 100 Horses. Major Wintzingerode, who commands the Hessian Hussars, has taken an Officer, with 50 French Hussars, in the Country of Eichsfeld. M. de Vaux, Commandant at Gottingen, has, on a sudden, set at Liberty the Town's People, whom he had imprisoned, by Order, as is supposed, of his Court, in Consequence of Representations made there by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick. of the tyrannical Conduct of that Officer.

Hague, April 13. The-French Troops are in Motion from the Lahn towards Cassel; and another Corps

Corps is assembling at Frankenberg; but we do not see any Thing tending to an immediate Opening of the Campaign. The Prince of Soubise's Equipages were arrived at Marbourg; and he was to set out himself from Paris the 11th Instant; and his Colleague, the Marshal d'Étrées, to follow towards the End of the Month.

Admiralty Office, April 14.

His Majesty's Sloop the Diligence, commanded by Capt. Osborne, is arrived at Plymouth, with a Privatier Brigantine called the Malouen, from St. Malo's, mounting Six Carriage and Four Swivel Guns, and mann'd with 34 Men, which she took on the 8th Instant off the Edystone, having been out but four Days.
