AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 9th of *April*, 1762,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 19th of October last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant April— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this Instant April, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, " An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for impowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Second Day of February last, to Promise and Declare (amongst other Things) That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of March last, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or

Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for Raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy; and that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of March last, in like Manner, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person, who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards expired on the Thirty-first of March last; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued to be paid from the said 31st of March, to the 31st of May next; and that some Alterations should be made in the Manner of Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards—His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore Order; and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the aforementioned Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for Raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Navy; And also, that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings be continued to be paid to every Able-bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And that such respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen and Landmen immediately upon their Entering, by the Officers, employed in Raising Men for His Majesty's Fleet, with whom such Seamen and Landmen shall respectively enter; and where there is not any Regulating Officer, by the Clerk of the Cheque or Naval Officer of any of His Majesty's Dockyards—And His Majesty doth hereby further Order, That the aforementioned Rewards of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for His Majesty's said Service on or before the said 31st Day of May next, by any Sea Officers employed for raising Men, or be brought to any of the said Officers, or to the Clerks of the Cheque or Naval Officer at any of His Majesty's Dock-yards: The said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and at the Out-Ports, by the Naval Officers where there are any; and where there are no Naval Officers, by the

the Officers employed in Raising Men; or, in Case of there not being any such Officer or Officers, by the Collectors of His Majesty's Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, Naval Officers, Officers employed in procuring Men, or Collectors of His Majesty's Customs respectively, by the Person or Persons who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for His Majesty's Service — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Petersburg, April 20.* On Saturday last the Emperor entered into his new Palace, where he proposes to reside; and the next Day, being Easter Sunday, there was a very numerous and splendid Court to compliment his Imperial Majesty upon the Occasion. The Foreign Ministers were of the Number, and had the Honour to dine with the Emperor at a Table of near 150 Covers, where the Places were drawn for by Lot, as usual.

Count Mercy made his Visit Yesterday to Prince George of Holstein.

The Chancellor, who has been very ill of a Quinsey, is now so well recovered, that he sees Company.

Last Night, about Ten o'Clock, a Fire broke out near the Canal called the Marka, and burnt down a new Wooden House of Count Henrikow's, the Reformed Church, and a good many small Houses. The Emperor was present from the Beginning, and continued till the Fire was over, giving his Orders, and going from Place to Place, as the Danger seemed to require.

*Warsaw, April 28.* Prince Charles of Saxony set out on Monday last for Vienna, where he will stay a few Days, and then pursue his Journey for Carlsbad.

Prince Albert sets out To-morrow for the Austrian Army.

*Dusseldorf, May 9.* The Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, being determined to raise the Contributions he had demanded of the Duchy of Berg, marched near Twenty Leagues in two Days, and thereby appeared at Elberfeld, when he was least expected. The Corps of Conflans, and the other Troops that were there, retreated with great Precipitation, though not without some Loss. From Elberfeld his Serene Highness advanced to Solingen, and from there, having fulfilled the Object he had in View, by taking Hostages for the Payment of the Contributions, retired without any Loss.

On this Movement the Prince de Conde assembled such Troops as were nearest at Hand, and marched

to Medman; but on Advice that the Hereditary Prince was retired, he sent back the Troops to the Garrisons from which they had been drawn:

Hasselt, May 11. Since the Arrival of the Swifs Guards at St. Trone, there has been such a Deserion, that the two Battalions have lost near two hundred Men.
