AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 28th of *May*, 1762,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should on or before the 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board His Majesty's Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bold Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, no under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is near expiring; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this Instant May, to the 31st Day of July next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable George Grenville, Esq; to be one of His Principal Secretaries of State, he was this

Day, by His Majesty's Command, sworn one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint his Grace George Duke of Manchester to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Huntingdon, his Grace this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Br. Jarow May 9. On the 5th Instant His Prussian Majesty, accompanied by the Prince Royal, went to Lissa, to meet the Troops that were marched from Saxony, and from Lusatia, into Silesia, and they returned thither the next Day.

Lieutenant General Krokow was detached from Prince Henry's Army, with the Corps for early commanded by General Platen, and passed through the Lower Lusatia, where he was joined by the Body of Troops which had wintered in that Country, under the Command of Major General Shenckerdorff, the whole making together about Ten thousand Men. They arrived here on the 6th Instant, and immediately took possession of a Fortified Camp which was prepared for them, distant about one English Mile from this Place, and upon the Road to Schweidnitz.

Dantz, May 20. They are hard at Work in turning this Village into a Fortification, and have already made strong Redoubts of Turf, with Ditches through pallisades.

Cologne, May 22. The Epidemical Distemper, that reigns here, fills all our Hospitals. It is observed, that the Soldiers, who are on Duty at Night, are almost all carried next Day to the Hospital, which proves the Contagion is in the Air; it is computed above One Quarter of the Inhabitants are attacked with this Distemper.

The Troops, it is said, are to camp the 24th, though they are not yet ready to take the Field.

Liège, May 25. The Spaniards were still inactive, the 6th Instant, upon the Frontiers of Portugal, notwithstanding their frequent Assurances, that they should immediately begin their Operations. At that Time every Thing was still quiet, which is attributed to the Want of Subsistence.

The Account of Prince Henry of Prussia's Expedition, against the Austrians in Saxony, is fully confirmed, with this further Addition, That his Royal Highness had made himself Master of Freyberg, where he found a considerable Magazine; and that the Austrians had retired to Dippoldswalda.

St. James's, May 27.

A Chapter of the most Noble Order of the Garter having been summoned to meet this Day, the Knights Companions, with the Officers of the Order hereafter-mentioned, all in their Mantles, attended the Sovereign in his own Apartment, and being

being called over by Garter, a Proceſſion was made from thence to the Great Council Chamber in the following Order :

THE SOVEREIGN.

The Sovereign and Knights Companions being ſeated, Garter acquainted His Maſtey, that Sir Septimus Robinſon attended at the Door, and humbly prayed Admittance, to take the Oath of Office as Gentleman Uſher of the Black Rod of that moſt Noble Order ; who being in his Mantle, was conducted to the Sovereign by Garter carrying the Enſigns of Black Rod's Office, and kneeling down, the Oath was adminiſtered to him by the Deputy Register ; after which, Garter preſenting the Chain with the Badge, the Sovereign was pleaſed to put it about his Neck, and then to deliver the Black Rod to him, and having kiſſed His Maſtey's Hand he withdrew to his Place.

The Deputy Register then acquainted the Sovereign, that the Biſhop of Wincheſter, Prelate of the Order, attended to be admitted and ſworn, whereupon being introduced in his Mantle, by Garter carrying his Chain and Badge, and Black Rod, he was ſworn by the Deputy Register, Black Rod holding the Book ; and afterwards the Sovereign put the Gold Chain with the Badge about his Neck.

Then the Deputy Register ſignified to the Chapter the Sovereign's Pleaſure for filling up the two vacant Stalls ; and as by the Statutes, none but a Knight can be elected, Garter and Black Rod were ſent to introduce his Royal Highneſs Prince William, who being knighted by the Sovereign with the Sword of State, withdrew.

The Knights Companions then proceeded to the Election, and the Suffrages being collected by the Deputy Register, and preſented to the Sovereign, his Royal Highneſs Prince William was declared duly elected. His Royal Highneſs was thereupon received at the Door of the Chapter Room by the two Junior Knights, and conducted between them to the Sovereign, being preceeded by Garter with the Enſigns on a Cuſhion, and Black Rod : Garter preſenting the Garter to the Sovereign, His Maſtey delivered it to his Royal Highneſs the Duke of Cumberland, and his Royal Highneſs the Duke of York, the two Senior Knights, who buckled it on the Prince's Left Leg, the Deputy Register reading the Admonition : Garter then preſented the Ribbon with the George, and the Prince kneeling down, the Sovereign, with the Aſſiſtance of their Royal Highneſſes, put it over his Shoulder, the Deputy Register pronouncing the Admonition, and having kiſſed his Maſtey's Hand, and ſeverally ſaluted all the Knights preſent, his Royal Highneſs withdrew.

The Chapter then proceeded to the other Election, and John Earl of Bute being declared duly elected, was introduced and inveſted with the Enſigns of the Order, in the ſame Manner as the Prince had been.

Garter then calling over the Knights, a Proceſſion was made back in the ſame Order as before, except that the Prelate now went in his Place, immediately

before the Sovereign, and Black Rod in his Place on the Left Hand of the Deputy Register, Garter going on the Right Hand.
