**T**HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

*An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Sinking Fund; and for applying certain Monies, remaining in the Exchequer, for the Service of the Year 1762; and for settling and securing a certain Annuity for the Use of the Right Honourable Arthur Onslow, Speaker of the House of Commons in the last Three Parliaments.*

*An Act for enabling His Majesty to raise the Sum of One Million, for the Use and Purposes therein mentioned; and for further appropriating the Sum granted in this Session of Parliament; and for allowing Time for the Payment of the Stamp Duties, omitted to be paid, upon Admissions into Corporations or Companies, and Appointments to Offices therein; and for the Relief of William Earl, in respect of a Quantity of White Salt lost by the Wreck of a Ship, near the Harbour of Dublin.*

*An Act for better securing the Payment of the Sums of Money, directed by an Act, made in the Thirty-second Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, to be applied in Augmentation of the Salaries of the puisne Judges in the Court of King's Bench, the Judges in the Court of Common Pleas, the Barons of the Coif in the Court of Exchequer, at Westminster, and the Justices of Chester, and the Great Sessions for the Counties in Wales, for the Time being.*

*An Act for applying the Money, granted in this Session of Parliament, towards defraying the Charge of the Pay of the Militia of that Part of Great Britain called England, when unembodied, and of the Cloathing of the Part of the said Militia now unembodied, for one Year, beginning the Twenty-fifth Day of March One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-two.*

*An Act for vesting certain Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, upon the Sea Coasts, in the Counties of Kent, Sussex, and Southampton, on which Forts and Batteries have been erected for the Defence of the said Coasts, in Trustees, for certain Uses, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act for importing Salt, from Europe, into the Colony of Nova Scotia, in America.*

*An Act for making perpetual an Act for the better Regulation and Government of Seamen in the Merchants Service, and for extending the Provisions thereof to His Majesty's Colonies in America.*

*An Act for naturalizing such Foreign Protestants as have served, or shall serve, for the Time therein mentioned, as Officers or Soldiers, in His Majesty's Royal American Regiment, or as Engineers in America.*

*An Act to amend so much of an Act, made in the First Year of the Reign of King James the First, in-*

*tituled, An Act for the better Execution of the Intent and Meaning of former Statutes, made against shooting in Guns, and for the Preservation of the Game of Pheasants and Partridges, and against the destroying of Hares with Hare Pipes, and tracing Hares in the Snow, as relates to the Preservation of House Doves, and Pidgeons, by making the Manner of convicting such Person or Persons as shall offend therein more easy and expeditious.*

*An Act to prevent the committing of Thefts and Frauds by Persons navigating Bum Boats, and other Boats upon the River Thames.*

*An Act for the keeping regular, uniform, and annual Registers, of all Parish poor Infants, under a certain Age, within the Bills of Mortality.*

*An Act for allowing further Time for Inrolments of Deeds and Wills made by Papists, and for Relief of Protestant Purchasers.*

*An Act to indemnify such as have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments; and to indemnify Justices of the Peace, Deputy Lieutenants, and Officers of the Militia, or others, who have omitted to register, or deliver in their Qualifications, within the Time limited by Law; and for giving further Time for those Purposes; and for the making and filing of Affidavits of Articles of Clerkship.*

*An Act for enabling the Judges of the Court of Session, in Scotland, to make an Adjournment of the said Court, for such Time, betwixt the Twentieth Day of December and the Fifteenth Day of January yearly, as they shall judge most convenient, not exceeding Twenty Days.*

*An Act for paving, cleansing, and lighting the Squares, Streets, and Lanes, within the City and Liberty of Westminster, the Parishes of St. Giles in the Fields, St. George the Martyr, St. George Bloomsbury, that Part of the Parish of St. Andrew's Holbourn; which lies in the County of Middlesex, the several Liberties of the Rolls and Savoy, and that Part of the Duchy of Lancaster, which lies in the County of Middlesex, and for preventing Annoyances therein; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act for draining and preserving certain low Lands called The Fens, lying on both Sides of the River Witham, in the County of Lincoln; and for restoring and maintaining the Navigation of the said River, from the High Bridge, in the City of Lincoln, through the Borough of Boston, to the Sea.*

*An Act for enlarging and improving the North East Avenue of London Bridge.*

*An Act for the more easy and speedy Recovery of small Debts within the Town and County of the Town of Kingston upon Hull.*

*An Act to empower the Commissioners and Trustees (named and appointed by, and in Pursuance of, an Act of Parliament made in the Tenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the First, for making more effectual, an Act made in the Ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, an Act for completing the Repairs of the Harbour of Dover, in the County of Kent; and for restoring the Harbour of Rye, in the County of Sussex, to its ancient Goodness, so far as the same relates to the Harbour of Rye) to let the Sea and Tides into a new Cut or Channel, made, in Pursuance*



of the said Act, of the Tenth Year of his said late Majesty's Reign, as far as a Wall, called Winchelsea Wall.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers granted by an Act, passed in the Eleventh Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for continuing several Acts relating to the Harbour of Liverpool, and for enlarging the said Harbour, by making an additional Dock, and building a Pier in the open Harbour there, and for enlightening the said Dock; and for making another Dock with proper Piers in the said Harbour, and for erecting Lighthouses, and other proper Lights, in or near the Port of Liverpool.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of several Acts of Parliament, relating to the Harbour of Whitehaven, in the County of Cumberland, and to the Roads leading to the said Harbour and Town of Whitehaven; and for further enlarging the said Harbour; and for lighting the said Town, and supplying the same with Water; and for regulating the Carmen there; and for repealing so much of an Act of the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, as relates to the Road from Calder Bridge, to Egremont, and directing how the said Road shall be repaired, and for repairing several other Roads therein mentioned, in the said County.

An Act to amend, and render more effectual, several Acts, made for cleansing and enlightening the Streets of the Town of Kingston upon Hull, and for preventing Annoyances therein.

An Act for continuing the Term and Powers of an Act, made in the Fourteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, intituled, An Act for repairing the Road from Doncaster, through the Parishes of Penifson, in the County of York, to Salter's Brook in the County of Chester; and also the Road from Rotherham, in the said County of York, to Hartcliffe Hill, in the said Parish of Penifson; and for making the said Act more effectual, so far as the same relates to the said Road between Doncaster and Salter's Brook.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, from Plimwell Vent, in the County of Sussex, through Highgate, in the County of Kent, and the Parishes of Sandhurst, Newenden, and Northiam, to Rye, in the said County of Sussex, and from Highgate aforesaid, to Coopers Corner, in the said County of Sussex, to Tubbs Lake, in the said County of Kent.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads, from a certain Bridge, called James Deeping Stone Bridge, to Peter's Gate, in Stamford, in the County of Lincoln, and from thence, to the South End of the Town of Marcot, in the County of Rutland.

An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, intituled, An Act for amending and keeping in Repair the Roads leading from Meadbrook, which divides the Parishes of Pucklechurch and Mangotsfield, in the County of Gloucester, to Christian Malsford Bridge, in the County of Wilts, and also from Pucklechurch aforesaid, to certain Coal Mines in the said Parish.

An Act for repairing and widening the High Road, leading from the North End of Ballingdan Bridge, in Sudbury, in the County of Suffolk, to the South Gate, in Bury Saint Edmunds in the said County.

An Act for amending and widening the Road, leading from the High Post Road, near the Town of Faversham, by Bacon's Water, through Aylesford, to the Town and Port of Hythe, in the County of Kent, and from Bacon's Water, to a certain Lane, called Holy Lane, in Wincheap, near the City of Canterbury.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers, and also to render more effectual, an Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, the several Roads, from the Town of Pool, in the County of Montgomery, to Wrexham, in the County of Denbigh, and also the Road, from Knockin, in the County of Salop, to Llanrhader, in Mochmant, in the County of Denbigh, and to repair and widen several other Roads therein mentioned.

An Act for amending and widening the Road, from the Market House in Skourbridge, to Colly Gate in Crad

gate, and from Pedmore, to Holly Hall, and from Colly Gate, to Halefowen, and from the Turnpike Road, on Dudley Wood, to Rednall Green, in the Parish of King's Norton, and from Carter's Lane, to the Bell Inn, at Northfield, in the Counties of Worcester, Stafford, and Salop.

An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads leading from Cleobury Mortimer, the Cross Houses, Glazeley, and the Turnpike Gate on Abberley Hill, in the Counties of Salop and Worcester.

An Act for explaining and amending so much of two Acts of the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth Years of His late Majesty, for repairing several Roads therein mentioned, in the Counties of Leicester and Warwick, as relates to the Road between Hinckley and Coventry.

An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads therein mentioned, lying in the Counties of Leicester and Warwick, and in the County of the City of Coventry.

An Act for widening, repairing, and amending, the Road from Hesketh, by Yarnes Bridge, to Cockermouth, and from thence by Lorton, over Whinlatter, to Keswick, in the County of Cumberland; and from Keswick, by Dummail Rays, and Ambleside, to Kirby in Kendall, in the County of Westmorland; and from Plumbgarths Cross, near Kirby in Kendall aforesaid, to the Lake, called Windermere, in the County of Westmorland; and from Keswick aforesaid, to the Town of Penrith, in the County of Cumberland.

An Act to continue, and render more effectual, an Act passed in the Thirtieth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road leading from Burleigh Bridge, in the Town of Loughborough, to Afsby de la Zouch, in the County of Leicester; and for repairing and widening the Road, branching out of the said Road, at Coleorton Church, over Coleorton Moor, and through Wortington, and Sutton Bonington, to Rempsion, in the Counties of Leicester and Nottingham.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from Kirkby-Stephen High Lane Head, in the County of Westmorland, through Sedberg, to Greeta Bridge, in the County Palatine of Lancaster; and from Bracken Bar Gate, near Afsrigg, in the County of York, through Sedberg, to Kirkby Kendal; and also the Road from the Four Lane Ends in Marthwaite, to the Turnpike Road on Grayrigg House, leading from Appieby, to Kirkby Kendal, in the said County of Westmorland.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, from Costam, in the County of Southampton, to the City of Chichester.

And to Thirty Private Bills.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

THE Publick Business, for which you were assembled, being now happily concluded, the advanced Season of the Year calls upon Me to put an End to this Session of Parliament; which I cannot do, without expressing the highest Approbation of the Zeal, Unanimity, and Dispatch, which have so signally appeared in the Course of your Proceedings.

At the Opening of this Session I informed you, that it had been my earnest Wish to restore the Blessings of Peace to My People; but that it was My fixt Resolution, with your Concurrence and Support, to carry on the War in the most effectual Manner, till that desirable Object could be obtained upon equitable and honourable Conditions. My Sentiments in both these Respects continue invariably the same; and I have the Satisfaction to find them confirmed by the unanimous Voice of My Parliament.

The Declaration, which Motives of Humanity have engaged the Emperor of Russia to make to all the Courts in that Alliance, and the great and happy Change in the Situation of My Ally, the King

King of Prussia, give Us just Reason, to hope, that the other Belligerent Powers may be induced to entertain the same pacifick Dispositions. On the other Hand, Our Rupture with Spain, notwithstanding My utmost Endeavours to prevent it, and the violent and unprovoked Attack with which the Dominions of My ancient Ally, the King of Portugal, are threatened, sufficiently evince the Wisdom and Necessity of that Firmness and Resolution in My Parliament, which have enabled Me to continue Our Military Operations without the least Interruption or Delay; and considerably to augment My Fleets and Armies in those Parts, in which Our Enemies can be most sensibly distressed. The signal Success of My Arms in the Conquest of Martinico, and the Acquisition of many other valuable Settlements in the West Indies, have, under the Blessing of God, been the happy Consequences of these Measures. I trust in the Divine Providence that they will be attended with still farther Advantages, until the Powers at War with Us shall be disposed to such Terms of Accommodation, as the Dignity and just Rights of My Crown, the future Security and commercial Interests of My Subjects, will permit Me to accept.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

When I consider the ample Supplies which you have granted, I cannot but lament the heavy Burdens, which the Necessities of the Publick Service have obliged you to impose upon My People. From this Consideration, I have endeavoured, in every Instance, to restrain My Demands within as narrow Bounds, as the Difficulties, in which I found Myself involved, would allow. From the same Motive, My utmost Care shall be employed to exert the most exact Oeconomy, consistent with the Safety of My Kingdoms, and the good Faith and Honour of My Crown.

I return you My particular Thanks, for the Proof which you have given of your Regard to Me and to My Family, in the ample Provision you have made for the Queen; whose Virtues, and Affection to this Country, will, I am confident, be found to deserve it.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

I have the fullest Persuasion, that you will continue to diffuse in your several Counties that Spirit of Concord, which you have yourselves so steadily exerted in Parliament: And you may be assured, that I will, on My Part, return your Zeal and Affection for My Person and Government, by a constant Attention to whatever may contribute to the Ease of My Subjects; and that it is My ardent Wish, to found the Glories of My Reign on the Union of My People, and on the Welfare and Prosperity of these My Kingdoms.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said;

*It is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Thursday the Fifteenth Day of July next, to be then here held. And this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday the Fifteenth Day of July next.*

## A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

*Declaring His Majesty's Pleasure for continuing Officers, not already removed or discharged, in Great Britain, Ireland, and the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark.*

**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of Our late Royal Predecessor Queen Anne (intituled, An Act for the Security of Her Majesty's Person and Govern-

ment, and of the Succession to the Crown of Great Britain in the Protestant Line) it was enacted (amongst other Things) That no Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark, should become void by Reason of the Demise of Her said late Majesty, Her Heirs, or Successors, Kings or Queens of this Realm, but that all and every Person and Persons, in any of the Offices, Places, and Employments aforesaid, should continue in their respective Offices, Places, and Employments, for the Space of Six Months next after such Death or Demise, unless sooner removed or discharged by the next in Succession, to whom the Imperial Crown of this Realm, was limited and appointed to remain and descend: And whereas the Space of Six Months from the Demise of Our Royal Grandfather, of Glorious Memory, was found not sufficient for passing and compleating new Grants, Commissions, and Appointments, for all the said Offices, Places, and Employments; We, for preventing the Inconveniencies that might have happened by the same becoming void, out of Our Royal Wisdom and Care of the State (reserving to Our Judgement thereafter, the Reformation and Redress of any Misbehaviours or Abuses, upon due Knowledge and Examination thereof) were pleased, and did, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twentieth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and sixty one, Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Persons who, at the Time of the Demise of Our said Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in, any Office, Place, or Eminent, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, or Sark, and had not been removed or discharged from such their Offices, Places, or Employments, should be adjudged and taken to be continued in, and hold and execute, such their respective Offices, Places, and Employments, in like Manner as, at the Time of the Demise of Our said Royal Grandfather, they held, enjoyed, and executed the same, for the Space of Four Months from the Date of Our said Royal Proclamation, unless sooner removed and discharged by Us: And whereas by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-fifth Day of June last, We were pleased to Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Persons who, at the Time of the Demise of Our said Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in, any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, or Sark, and had not been removed or discharged from such their Offices, Places, or Employments, should be adjudged and taken to be continued in, and hold and execute such their respective Offices, Places, or Employments, in like Manner as, at the Time of the Demise of Our said Royal Grandfather, they held, enjoyed, and executed the same, for the Space of Four Months from the said Twenty-fifth Day of June last, unless sooner removed and discharged by Us: And whereas by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of October last, We did in like Manner Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Persons who, at the Time of the said Demise of Our Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in, any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, or Sark, and had not been removed or discharged, should be adjudged and taken to be continued in, and hold and execute such their respective Offices, Places,

Places, and Employments, in like Manner as, at the Time of the said Demise, for the Space of Four Months from the said Twelfth Day of October last, unless sooner removed and discharged by Us: And whereas by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Eleventh Day of February last, We were also pleased to Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Persons who, at the Time of the said Demise of Our Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in, any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, or Sark, and had not been removed or discharged, should be adjudged and taken to be continued in, and hold and execute such their respective Offices, Places, and Employments, in like Manner as, at the Time of the said Demise, for the Space of Four Months from the said Eleventh Day of February last, unless sooner removed and discharged by Us: And, in regard that the said further Space of Four Months, by Our said last-mentioned Royal Proclamation granted, hath been found not sufficient for passing and compleating new Grants, Commissions, and Appointments, for all the said Offices, Places, and Employments; We, for preventing the Inconveniencies that might happen by the same becoming void, out of Our Royal Wisdom and Care of the State (reserving to Our Judgement hereafter, the Reformation and Redress of any Misbehaviours or Abuses, upon due Knowledge and Examination thereof) are pleased, and do hereby, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Persons who, at the Time of the Demise of Our said Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in, any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, or Sark, and have not since been removed or discharged from such their Offices, Places, or Employments, shall be, and shall be adjudged and taken to be, continued in, and hold and execute such their respective Offices, Places, and Employments, in the like Manner as, at the Time of the Demise of Our said Royal Grandfather, they held, enjoyed, and executed the same, for the Space of Four Months from the Date hereof, unless sooner removed and discharged by Us: And in the mean Time, for the Preservation of the Peace, and necessary Proceedings in Matters of Justice, and for the Safety and Welfare of the State, We do hereby strictly Command all the said Persons, of whatsoever Degree or Condition, That they do not fail, every One severally, according to his Place, Office, and Charge, to proceed in the Performance and Execution of all Duties thereunto belonging, as formerly appertained unto them, and every One of them, while Our said Royal Grandfather was living. And further, We do hereby Will and Command all and singular Our loving Subjects, of what Estate or Degree they, or any of them, be, to be aiding and assisting, at the Commandment of the said Officers, in the Performance and Execution of the said Offices, Places, and Employments, as they tender Our Displeasure, and will answer the Contrary at their utmost Perils.

Given at Our Court at *Saint James's*, the Twentieth Day of *May*, One thousand seven hundred and sixty two, in the Second Year of Our Reign.

**A** Like Proclamation was issued for continuing Officers in Scotland for the further Space of Four Months; which Proclamation is to be passed under the Seal appointed by the Treaty of Union to be kept and made Use of, in the Place of the Great Seal of Scotland.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is near expiring; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this Instant *May*, to the 31st Day of *July* next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Petersbourg, May 8.* On Wednesday last the Treaty of Peace, between the Emperor of Russia and his Prussian Majesty, was signed by the Chancellor and Baron Goltze, Plenipotentiaries named by the two Courts for that Purpose.

*Venice, May 21.* On the 19th Instant died, after a long Illness, in the 77th Year of his Age, the most Serene Prince Francesco Lauredano, Doge of Venice, much regretted by this Republic for his Virtues and good Qualities. As his Death was not publickly declared in Form, the annual Solemnity on Ascension Day of going out to Sea in the great Vessel, called the Bucentoro, to espouse the Adriatick, in Token of perpetual Dominion, was performed by the Vice Doge Yesterday, with the usual Attendance of Senators and other Nobles, who, after the Ceremony, were entertained with a publick Dinner in the Ducal Palace, according to ancient Custom.

A few Days ago the Duke of Wurtemberg arrived here, under the Title of Count of Aurlach, with a numerous Retinue.

*Hamburg, May 28.* We hear that the Prince of Bevern is by this Time on his March from Stettin, with the Corps of Troops under his Command, in order to join the King of Prussia in Silesia, leaving only a small Garrison to guard the Austrian Prisoners.

*Dusseldorff, May 28.* The Regiment of Alsace quitted Cologne the 26th, and were followed Yesterday by Royal Suedois and Orleans: They have Orders to march to Marbourg by Sybourg, Anhalt, Royal Bavaria, and the Rest of the German Regiments in the French Service, are to take the same Road: 'Tis said they will be replaced by Five French Regiments that are in March from Hesse.

It is said that it will be the 15th of June before the Gendarmerie can march forward, as there is a Want of Forage on the Lower Rhine.

The Regiment of Berry Cavalry, now at Dillenburg, are to march to the Maese to cover the Boats that carry Flour, Oats, &c. from Liege to Urmund.

*Ruremonde, May 28.* In consequence of the Orders received here and at Stockem, the Pontons have been sent up the River as high as Liege to put them in Safety, fearing the Allies should burn them as they did last Year.

*Liege, May 29.* Orders have been received, and Contracts made by the French with Undertakers for forming Magazines here, which has already considerably raised the Price of Oats and Rye.

*Hague, June 1.* The Marquess of Granby arrived here this Afternoon, in his Way to the Army.
