My Lords, and Gentlemen,

T HE Publick Business, for which you were affembled, being now happily concluded, the advanced Season of the Year calls upon Me to put an End to this Session of Parliament; which I cannot do, without expressing the highest Approbation of the Zeal, Unanimity, and Dispatch, which have fo fignally appeared in the Course of your Proceedings.

At the Opening of this Seffion I informed you, that it had been my earneft Wish to reftore the Bleffings of Peace to My People; but that it was My fixt Refolution, with your Concurrence and Support, to carry on the War in the most effectual Manner, till that defirable Object could be obtained upon equitable and honourable Conditions. My Sentiments in both these Respects continue invariably the fame; and I have the Satisfaction to find them confirmed by the unanimous Voice of My Parliament.

The Declaration, which Motives of Humanity have engaged the Emperor of Russia to make to all the Courts in that Alliance, and the great and happy Change in the Situation of My Ally, the King

King of Pruffia, give Us just Reafon, to hope, that | the other Belligerant Powers may be induced to; eutertain the fame pacifick Dispositions. On the other Hand, Our Rupture with Spain, notwithftanding my utmost Endeavours to prevent it, and the violent and unprovoked Attack with which the Dominions of My ancient Ally, the King of Portugal, are threatened, fufficiently evince the Wildom and Necessity of that Firmnels and Resolution in My Parliament, which have enabled Me to continue Our Military Operations without the leaft Interruption or Delay; and confiderably to augment My Fleets and Armies in those Parts, in which Our Enemies can be most fensibly distrcifed. The fignal Success of My Arms in the Conquest of Martinico, The fignal and the Acquisition of many other valuable Settlements in the Weft Indies, have, under the Bleffing of God, been the happy Confequences of these Mea-fures. I truft in the Divine Providence that they will be attended with still farther Advantages, until the Powers at War with Us shall be disposed to such Terms of Accommodation, as the Dignity and juft Rights of My Crown, the future Security and commercial Interefts of My Subjects, will permit Me to accept.

### Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

When I confider the ample Supplies which you have granted, I cannot but lament the heavy Burdens, which the Neceffities of the Publick Service have obliged you to impose upon My People. From this Confideration, I have endeavoured, in every Instance, to restrain My Demands within as narrow Bounds, as the Difficulties, in which I found Myself involved, would allow. From the fame Motive, My utmost Care shall be employed to exert the most exact Oeconomy, confistent with the Safety of My Kingdoms, and the good Faith and Honour of My Crown.

L return you My particular Thanks, for the Proof which you have given of your Regard to Me and to My Family, in the ample Provision you have made for the Queen; whole Virtues, and Affection to this Country, will, I am confident, be found to deferve it.

### My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I have the fulleft Perfuation, that you will continue to diffufe in your feveral Counties that Spirit of Concord, which you have yourfelves fo fteadily exerted in Parliament: And you may be affured, that I will, on My Part, return your Zeal and Affection for My Perfon and Government, by a con-Rant Attention to whatever may contribute to the Eafe of My Subjects; and that it is My ardent With, to found the Glories of My Reign on the Union of My People, and on the Welfare and Profperity of thefe My Kingdoms.

Declaring His Majesty's Pleasure for continuing Officers, not already removed or discharged, in Great Britain, Ireland, and the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of Our late Royal Predecetfor Queen Anne (incituled, An Act for the Security of Her Majefty's Perfon and Govern-

ment, and of the Succeffion to the Crown of Great Britain in the Protestant Line) it was enacted (amonght other Things) That no Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Ifles of Jerfey, Guernfey, Alderney, and Sark, fhould become void by Reafon of the Demile of Her faid late Majesty, Her Heirs, or Successors, Kings or Queens of this Realm, but that all and every Perfon and Perfons, in any of the Offices, Places, and Employments aforefaid, fhould continue in their respective Offices, Places, and Employments, for the Space of Six Months next after fuch Death or Demife, unless fooner removed or discharged by the next in Succession, to whom the Imperial Crown of this Realm, was limited and ap-pointed to remain and defcend: And whereas the Space of Six Months from the Demife of Our Royal Grandfather, of Glorious Memory, was found not fufficient for paffing and compleating new Grants, Commiffions, and Appointments, for all the faid Offices, Places, and Employments; We, for pre-venting the Inconveniencies that might have hap-pened by the fame becoming void, out of Our Royal Wifdom and Care of the State (referving to Our Judgement thereafter, the Reformation and Redrefs of any Milbehaviours or Abules, upon due Knowledge and Examination thereof) were pleafed, and did, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twentieth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and fixty one, Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Perfons who, at the Time of the Demife of Our faid Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully poffelfed of, or invefted in, any Office, Place, or Emment, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Ifles of Jerfey, Guernfey, Alderney, or Sark, and had not been removed or difcharged from fuch their Offices, Places, or Employments, should be adjudged and taken to be continued in, and hold and execute, fuch their re-fpective Offices, Places, and Employments, in like Manner as, at the Time of the Demife of Our faid Royal Grandfather, they held, enjoyed, and executed the fame, for the Space of Four Months from the Date of Our faid Royal Proclamation, unlefs fooner removed and difcharged by Us : And whereas by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-fifth Day of June last, We were pleafed to Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Perfons who, at the Time of the Demife of Our faid Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully pof-feffed of, or invested in, any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Ifles of Jerfey, Guernfey, Alderney, or Sark, and had not been re-moved or difcharged from fuch their Offices, Places, or Employments, should be adjudged and taken to be continued in, and hold and execute fuch their respective Offices, Places, or Employments, in like Manner as, at the Time of the Demile of Our faid Royal Grandfather, they held, enjoyed, and executed the fame, for the Space of Four Months from the faid Twenty-fifth Day of June last, unless soonerremoved and discharged by Us: And whereas by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of October laft, We did in like Manner Order. Places, and Employments, in like Manner as, at the Time of the faid Demife, for the Space of Four Months from the faid Twelfth Day of October last, unless fooner removed and discharged by Us : And whereas by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Eleventh Day of February laft, We were allo pleafed to Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Perfons who, at the Time of the faid Demife of Our Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully poffeffed of, or invefted in, any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our King-doms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Ifles of Guernfey, Jerfey, Alderney, or Sark, and had not been removed or discharged, should be adjudged and taken to be continued in, and hold and execute fuch their refpective Offices, Places, and Employments, in like Manner as, at the Time of the faid Demife, for the Space of Four Months from the faid Eleventh Day of February last, unless sooner removed and discharged by Us: And, in regard that the faid further Space of Four Months, by Our faid last-mentioned Royal Proclamation granted, hath been found not fufficient for paffing and compleating new Grants, Commiffions, and Appointments, for all the faid Offices, Places, and Employments ; We, for preventing the Inconveniencies that might happen by the fame hecoming void, out of Our Royal Wifdom and Care of the State (referving to Our Judgement hereafter, the Reformation and Redrefs of any Mifbehaviours or Abuses, upon due Knowledge and Examination thereof) are pleased, and do hereby, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Perfons who, at the Time of the Demife of Our faid Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully poffeffed of, or invefted in, any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Ifles of Jerfey, Guernfey, Alderney, or Sark, and have not fince been removed or difcharged from fuch their Offices, Places, or Employments, fhall be, and shall be adjudged and taken to be, continued in, and hold and execute fuch their respective Offices, Places, and Employments, in the like Man-ner as, at the Time of the Demife of Our faid Royal Grandfather, they held, enjoyed, and executed the fame, for the Space of Four Months from the Date hereof, unlefs fooner removed and discharged by Us: And in the mean Time, for the Prefervation of the Peace, and neceffary Proceedings in Matters of Juf-tice, and for the Safety and Welfare of the State, We do hereby thicity Command all the faid Perfons, of whatloever Degree or Condition, That they do not fail, every One feverally, according to his Place, Office, and Charge, to proceed in the Performance and Execution of all Duties thercunto belonging, as formerly appertained onto them, and every One of them, while Our faid Royal Grandfather was living, And further, We do hereby Will and Command all and fingular Our loving Subjects, of what Effate or Degree they, or any of them, be, to be aiding and affiling, at the Commandment of the faid Officers, in the Performance and Execution of the faid Offices, Places, and Employments, as they tender Our Difpleasure, and will answer the Contrary at their utmost Perils.

Given at Our Court at Saint James's, the Twenty-Eighth Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and fixty two, in the Second Year of Our Reign.

# RESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS His Majefty was pleafed by His Order in Council of the 2d of April laft, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every fuch able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of this Inftant, voluntarily enter themfelves to ferve in His Majefty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majefty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as should be employed for railing Men for the Service of His Majefty's Royal Navy : And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings fhould be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who fhould, on or before the faid 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themfelves in like Manner to ferve in His Majefty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Perfon who thould difcover any Seaman or Seamen who may fecret themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen fliould be taken for His Majefty's faid Service, on or before the faid Thirty-first Day of this Instant. - And whereas the Time limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards is near explring; And it being judged expedient for His Majelty's Service, that the fame should be continued for some Time longer; His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewards, be pro-longed and extended from the faid 31ft Day of this Inftant May, to the 31ft Day of July next. And that the faid Bounties and Rewards he paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's afore-mentioned Order in Council of the 2d of April laft. Petersbourg, May 8. On Wednesday last the Treaty of Peace, between the Emperor of Ruffia and his Pruffian Majefly, was figned by the Chan-cellor and Baron Goltze, Plenipotentiarics named by the two Courts for that Purpofe.

Venice, May 21. On the 19th Instant died, after a long Illnefs, in the 77th Year of his Age, the most Serene Prince Francesco Lauredano, Doge of Venice, much regretted by this Republick for his Virtues and good Qualities. Duffeldorff, May 28. The Regiment of Alface quitted Cologne the 26th, and were followed Yefterday by Roial Suedois and Orleans: They have Orders to march to Marbourg by Sybourg. Anhalt, Royal Bavaria, and the Reft of the German Regi-ments in the French Service, are to take the fame Road: 'Tis faid they will be replaced by Five French Regiments that are in March from Heffe

It is faid that it will be the 15th of June before the Gendarmerie can march forward, as there is a Want of Forage on the Lower Rhine.
