HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Ast for better securing the Payment of the Sums of Money, directed by an AE, made in the Thirty-second Year of the Reign of His late Majefty King George the Second, to be applied in Augmentation of the Salaries of the puisne Judges in the Court of King's Bench, the Judges in the Court of Common Picas, the Barons of the Coif in the Court of Exchequer, at Westminster, and the Justices of Chester, and the Great Sessions for the Counties in Wales, for the Time being.

An All to indemnify such as home entitled to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments; and to indeminify Justices of the Peace, Deputy Lieutenants, and Officers of the Militia, or others, who have omitted to register, or deliver in their Qualifications, within the Time limited by Law; and for giving further Time for those Purposes; and for the making and siting of Affidaviti of Arieles of Clerks. by Judges of the Court of Scalland, to make an Adjournment of the

Said Cours, for such Time, between the Townstieth Day of December and the Fifteenth Day of January yearly, as they shall judge most convenient, not exceeding Twenty
