AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 28th of *May*, 1762,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is near expiring; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this Instant May, to the 31st Day of July next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Petersburg, May 14. Prince Repnin, a Major General, is named to go as the Emperor's Minister to the Court of Prussia.

Copenhagen, June 1. The King of Denmark sets out To-morrow Morning upon his intended Progress.

Hamburg, June 4. Syndic Amfinck and Senator Riecke, appointed Deputies from this Republick, to compliment the King of Great Britain upon his Accession to the Throne, set out this Day S'ennight for England, by the Way of Holland.

Liege, June 6. The French Commissary here has demanded of this State a Number of Carts to carry the Baggage of the Gendarmerie to Aix la Chapelle, which have been granted to him; and To-morrow

they begin their March to join the Army on the Lower Rhine.

It is said here, the French Army in Hesse, as well as that on the Lower Rhine, are to be assembled and incamp the 8th Instant.

Hague, June 8. We hear from Sillesia, that the Austrian Army, under Marshal Daun, had altered its Position, and was posted at Kratschaw, between the Schweidnitz Wasser and the Zobtenberg, with two Corps of Reserve upon the Flanks; one at Mittelberg, upon the Right; the other upon the Left, at Hohenpofenitz. The Prussians, in the mean while, kept their Position at Bettlern near Breslau.

There is nothing new from Saxony, nor do the Armies in Westphalia or Hesse furnish any Thing important, as yet. The French, upon the Lower Rhine, are actually encamped in three Corps, near Duffeldorff, Wesel, and Rees, and talk of making a Motion forward. The Hereditary Prince is still at Horn; and the British, Hessian, and Hanoverian Troops, were to encamp near Bela, on the 4th Instant. The French in Hesse were to encamp on that Day, or the Day before.

His Majesty's Ship the *Venus*, commanded by Captain Thomas Harrison, being on a Cruise, on the 1st of May fell in with two Privateers, to which he gave Chace, being in the Latitude 47° 30' the Lizard N. E. 75 Leagues: One of which he took, and proved to be the *Micollet* of Bayonne, of 14 Guns and 136 Men. And on the 4th Instant the *Venus* came up with and took the *Noitra Segnora de Begonia*, a Spanish Privateer belonging to Bilbao, of 16 Six-pounders and 20 Swivel Guns, and 155 Men.
