WHEREAS His Majesty hath signified unto us His Royal Pleasure, That the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands Prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty-ninth Day of June Instant, be further Prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty-fourth Day of August next; we do therefore publish and declare, That the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is hereby further Prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty-fourth Day of August next, whereof the Lord Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice accordingly.

GOD Save the KING.

Warsaw, May 29. Prince Radzivil, Great General of Lithuania, died last Week.

Sixteen Thousand Russians, under the Command of M. Czernichew, are in full March for Silesia, where they are to act under the King of Prussia's Orders.

Venice, June 2. On the 24th past, the Death of the Doge was published by the Ringing of Bell in this City, and his Figure in Wax was laid in State in the Ducal Palace, the Corpse having been interred privately on the 20th, in the Vault of the Lauzedano Family, in the Church of the Dominicans. On the 27th his Obsequies were performed according to Custom, by solemn Processions of the Monks and Fryars, secular Clergy, and religious Fraternities; and the Figure representing the Corpse was followed by the Relations, in the deepest Mourning, to the Church of the Dominican Fryars, and there reposed in a great Mausoleum erected and illuminated for that Purpose. The Patriarch officiated in the Funeral Service, and an Oration was made in Latin in Praise of the deceased Prince.

On the 31st past, Procuratore Marco Foscarini was elected Doge in the Form established by the Laws of this Republic; and the publick Festivals are held for three Days, as usual on that Occasion.

The Duke of Wurtemberg, who has been here some Time incognito, has declared himself, and is received with the Honours shewn by this Republic to Sovereign Princes.

Copenhagen, June 5. The 2d Instant, about Eight o'Clock in the Morning, his Danish Majesty set out from hence on his Progress, and was attended only by the Ministers of the Privy Council, the Grand Marshal, and five or six other Persons of Distinction. The next Morning, in about two Hours Time, he happily passed the Great Belt. He is expected at Gottenburg on the 7th in the Evening, and to continue there till the 11th.

Brunswick, June 8. Letters from Stettin mention, that the Prince of Bevern had collected all the Troops that could be spared from thence, and was marched to join the King of Prussia in Silesia. The Peace with the Swedes was to be declared last Sunday at Magdeburg, without any Ceremony whatever.

Cologne, May 9. The Prince of Condé is expected here the 11th, and will set out the next Day for the Army.

Juliers, June 10. The French are forming a very great Magazine of Hay, Oats, Straw, Flour, Rye, Rice, &c. at Dalen, between this Town and Ruremond: All the Provisions that were sent from Liege to Urmund, as well as the Forage, &c. that has been furnished by the Duchy of Juliers, have been carried into this Magazine; and it is said it will soon be so much increased, that it will be sufficient to subsist the Army several Weeks, should they be obliged to quit the Banks of the Rhine and retire towards the Maese.

Lige, June 11. The Gendarmerie, that were quartered here, at Vifet and in the Neighbourhood, are all marched by Henry Chapelle and Aix to join the Army on the Lower Rhine, and only small Detachments of some Regiments are left in this State.

Hamburg, June 11. We received Advice Yesterday, that the King of Prussia is encamped with seven Battalions only, at Three German Miles Distance from the Austrian Army, and Five from Breslaw.

General Czernichew's Corps of Troops, consisting of sixteen Thousand Men, is expected to join, the 15th Instant, his Prussian Majesty's Army in Silesia.

The Prussian Royal Family, and the Ministry, who have resided at Magdebourg, are expected back at Berlin the 20th Instant.

Lague, June 11. The News of the Spaniards having taken Possession of the Castle of Braganza, is confirmed by the Letters from Madrid of the 22d past, and that they intended next to lay siege to Almeida and Chiaves.

It seems still uncertain when the Campaign will open on this Side. It is said, that the Armies cannot begin their Operations for Want of Green Forage. The Lower Rhine Army was still encamped, in three separate Corps, at Duffeldorff, Weisel, and Rees.

The Prussians continued in the same Position in Saxony, where Marshal Serbelloni had received some Reinforcements, to enable him to stop the Progress of Prince Henry.

The Name or Names, and Place or Places of Abode, of the Owner or Owners, to be marked on each Inside of the Boat, upon the upper Strake, as near the Middle as may be, the Letters composing such Name or Names, and Place or Places of Abode, to be not less than two Inches in Height, and in every other Respect proportionable thereto.
- III. The said Numbers, Names, and Places of Abode, to be marked with Paint made of White Lead and Oil, upon a black Ground of Paint.
- IV. That so often as such Numbers, Names, and Places of Abode, or any of the Figure or Figures, or Letters composing the same, are defaced, the same shall be renewed, and kept fair and legible, by marking such Boats again, in like Manner as is herein before directed concerning the First Marking of such Boat.
