AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 28th of *May*, 1762,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is near expiring; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this Instant May, to the 31st Day of July next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Breslau, June 6. The King of Prussia still continues at *Bettlern*; and *Marshal Daun* has yet made no Movement. There are daily Skirmishes between the Light Troops on both Sides, but of little Importance. Lieutenant General *Verner*, who continues in the Higher *Silesia*, has been in the County of *Tetschen*, and is returned again to *Ratibor*.

Brunswick, June 8. According to Advices received here Yesterday from *Prince Henry's Camp* in *Saxony*, dated the 4th, the *Prussian* advanced Posts had been attacked on the 2d, all at the same Time, by the *Austrian* Army, which had been reinforced the Day before, by Seven Battalions. *Prince Henry* had succeeded in repulsing the *Austrians* every where, with the small Loss of 200 Men.

Hamburg, June 15. The 12th *Infant*, his *Swedish* Majesty's Ratification of the Treaty of Peace concluded here the 22d past, arrived by a *Courier* to *M. Zoge de Manteuffel*, Minister from that Court in this Residence; and the Day following the Exchange was made, at *M. Manteuffel's* House, with *M. de Hecht*, the *Prussian* Minister. The same Day *Te Deum* was sung at the *French* Reformed Chapel, which is at *M. de Hecht's* Hotel, upon the King of *Prussia's* Peace with the Emperor of *Russia*, and the King of *Sweden*, at which were present, their respective Ministers: And in the Evening the *Prussian* Minister gave an Entertainment to both these Gentlemen.

The King of *Denmark* is ill of a Fever and Cough at *Sleswick*, which will retard the Review of the Cavalry, which his Majesty had fixed for the 18th Instant, upon the Heath of *Pinneberg*, at a German Mile Distance from *Hamburg*.

Hague, June 18. We hear from *Cassel*, that 14 Battalions have been ordered from the *Lower Rhine*, to reinforce the Army in *Hesse*.

The Letters from *Madrid* of the 31st past pretend, that the whole Province of *Tras-os Montes* had been evacuated by the *Portuguese*; and add, that a Body of *Spanish* Troops was in March from *Galicia* to invest *Almeida*.

The Junction of the Corps, commanded by the *Russian* General, with the King of *Prussia*, is not to take Place, as now hear, till the 24th Instant.
