The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is near expiring; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this Instant May, to the 31st Day of July next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Breslaw, June 20.* His Prussian Majesty still continues his Head Quarter at Bettlern, and the Troops remain in their Cantonments in that Neighbourhood. The Austrian Army have yet made no Movement; but it is confirmed, that they have sent back their heavy Artillery and Baggage towards the Mountains.

The Corps under General Czernichew begin their March this Day from Posen, distant Twenty-four German Miles from hence. They are to march on the Right of the Oder; to pass that River at Auras on the 30th; and the next Day to encamp at Lissa, two Miles from hence.

Last Friday the Duke of Bevern was detached with Fifteen Battalions of Infantry, and one Regiment of Horse and Hussars. He marches towards Kosel, where it is said he will be joined by the Corps under General Werner, and begin to act offensively against

the Body of Austrians in the Higher Silesia, which are reckoned to be about Twenty Thousand strong, under the Command of General Beck.

A Courier, which arrived here some Days ago from Peterburgh, brought the News that his Imperial Majesty had accepted of a Regiment of Infantry in the King of Prussia's Service; and accordingly it was given out in the Orders of Yesterday, that the Regiment of Seybourg, formerly Itzenplitz, should for the future be named the Emperor's Regiment.

From Saxony we hear, that his Royal Highness Prince Henry expected to be joined by Colonel Belling, with his Corps of Hussars, on the 15th; after which, it was expected he would immediately prosecute his Operations against the Army of the Empire.

*Breslaw, June 23.* Lieutenant General Tautensien, Commandant of Breslaw, has received Orders to lay a Bridge of Boats over the Oder at Auras, where, it is said, the Cossacks, belonging to the Russian Auxiliaries, will pass on the 25th; but the Infantry, under General Czernichew, will not arrive till the 30th Instant.

Yesterday Morning Margrave Charles of Brandenburg, General of Infantry, and Grand Master of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, died here after a very tedious Illness.

*Hambourg, July 2.* We hear, that a Congress is to be held at Berlin, under his Prussian Majesty's Mediation, for adjusting the Differences between Denmark and Russia; and that the Conferences are to be opened the 12th Instant.

An English Jagger arrived this Morning from the Free British Herring Fishery, with One Hundred and Five Barrels of Herrings, and are the first come.

*Hague, July 6.* By the freshest Accounts from Pomerania, we are informed, that the Russian Army, under Count Romanzow, had entered the Duchy of Mecklenburg.

Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were still at Wilhelmstahl on the 2d Instant. His Serene Highness had, since the Action of the 24th, occupied Fritziar, Feltzberg, Lohr, and Gudensberg.

The French Marshals have transferred their Head Quarters to Landwehrhagen; and have made Prince Xavier of Saxony join them with his Reserve.

The Prince of Condé was at Dulmen by the last Accounts.

By Accounts from the French Army, we hear, that the Chevalier de Narbonne, Lieutenant Colonel of the Royal Grenadiers of Lispinassa, was killed, and that the Marquesses of Peyre, and la Roche Lambert, were wounded, in the Action of the 24th.

All that we learn, by the last Letters from Madrid is, that the Spaniards have put a strong Garrison into Chaves; that they have abandoned Moncorvo; and were destroying the Fortifications of Miranda and Braganza; and that they found it difficult to subsist their Army in Portugal: That the Spanish Troops, designed to bessege Almeida, were to march through the Province of Leon; and that by the latest Accounts, six Battalions, and five Regiments of Horse, making the Van-Guard of the Army, were already arrived within a small Distance of that Place.
