## PROCLAMATION.

Appointing the Distribution of Prizes taken, and the Bounty for Taking or Destroying Ships of War or Priviateers of the Enemy, from the Time of His Majesty's Declaration of War against Spain.

HEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the last Sessions of Parliament, intituled, An Act for the Encouragement of Seamen, and the more speedy and effectual manning His Majesty's Navy; it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That the Flag Officers, Commanders, and other Officers, Seamen, Marines, and Soldiers, on board every Ship and Veffel of War in Our Pay, shall have the fole In-terest and Property of and in all and every Ship, Veffel, Goods and Meichandizes, which they shall take from and after the Second Day of January, in the Year of Our Lord One Thouland Seven Hundred and Sixty Two, during the Continuance of this War against Spain, (being first adjudged lawful Prize in any of Our Courts of Admiralty in Great Britain, or in Our Plant tions in America, or elfewhere) to be divided in fuch Proportions, and after fuch Manner, as We: Our Heirs and Succeffors, shall think fit to order and direct by Proclamation or Procla-mations, to be iffued for those Purposes. And whereas by the faid Act, the Provisions and Regulations eftablished by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth-Year of the Reign of Our late Royal Grandfather, for better carrying on the falutary Purpofes intended in the Profecution of the War against France, as explained and amended by another Act paffed in the Thirty Second Year of the Reign of Our late Royal Grandfather, respecting the granting Com-millions or Letters of Marque, the Persons acting, and Captures made under the Authority thereof, and alfo all other Claufes and Provifos, contained in the faid Acts, are extended to the Granting of Commiffions or Letters of Marque, and all other Matters and Things whatfover in refpect of the fame, during the Continuance of the prefent War with Spain, as rully, amply, and effectually, as if the faid Regulations and Provisions had been particularly repeated and re-enacted in the faid Act of the laft Semon of Parliament, And whereas by the faid Act, the Regulations refpecting Prize or Bounty Monies contained in an Act passed in the Thirty Third Year of the Reign of Our late Royal Grandfather, are also enacted to be in Force with regard to any Prizes to be made during the Continuance of the faid War with Spain : And whereas it is enacted, by Vistue of the Provisions herein before recited or referred to, That there shall be paid by the Treafurer of Our Navy, upon Bills to be made forth by the Commissioners of the Navy, to be paid according to the Courfe thereof, without Fee or Reward, unto the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, or others, that have been actually on board any of our Ship or Ships of War, or Privateer or Privateers, in any Action where any Ship or Ships of War, or Privateers, shall have been taken from the Enemy, funk, burnt, or otherwife destroyed, fince Our Declaration of War against Spain, dated the faid Second Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Two, Five Pounds for every Man which was living on board any Ship or Ships fo taken, suck, burnt, or otherwife destroyed, at the Beginning of the Engagement between them ;

Oaths of Three or more of the Chief Officers, or Men, which were belonging to the faid Ship or Ships of War, or Privateers of the Enemy, or belonging to any of them, at the Time of her being taken as Prize, funk, burnt, or otherwife deftroyed, before the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate of the Port, within any of Our Dominions, whereunto any Prize, or Officers, or Men, of fuch Ships as were funk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, shall be brought, or before the British Consul, or Vice Consul, refiding at any Neutral Port to which fuch Prize, or Officers or Men, shall be brought; which Oaths the faid Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate of any such Port, or Conful, or Vice Conful, are thereby respectively impowered and required to administer; and shall forthwith grant a Certificate thereof, without Fee or Reward, directed to the Commissioners of the Navy ; upon producing which Certificate to the Commit-fioners of Our Navy, together with an authentick Copy of the Condemnation of fuch Ship to taken : or if fuch Ship be funk, burnt, or otherwife destroyed, on producing only a Certificate from the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate, or Conful, or Vice Conful, as aforefaid, the faid Commissioners of Our Navy, or fuch Perfon or Perfons as they fhall appoint for that Purpofe, fhall, according to the Course of the Navy, within Fifteen Days, make out Bills for the Amount of fuch Bounty, directed to the Treasurer of the Navy, payable to, and to be divided amongst the Officers, Seamen, Marines and Soldiers, on board Our Ships of War, in Manner, Form, and Proportion, as by Our Procla ation to be issued for that Purpose shall be directed and appointed ; and amongst the Owners, Officers, and Seamen, of any private Vessel or Ship of War, in such Manner and Proportion, as, by any Agreement in Writing they shall have entered into for that Purpose, shall be directed : But it is nevertheles provided by the faid Act, That in all Cafes where fuch Oath and Certificate cannot be administered and granted at the first Port whereunto any Prize, or Officers, or Men, of such Ships as shall be taken, lunk, burnt, or otherwife deftroyed, shall be brought, fuch Oath or Oaths relating to any Prize or Prizes that fhall be taken, or to any Ships of Our Enemies that shall be funk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, as aforefaid, fhall and may be administered and taken by and before the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate of any Port within any of Our Dominions, or by or before the British Conful, or Vice Conful, refiding at any Neutral Port whereunto any Prize, or Prizes, or Officers, or Men, of any Ships belonging to Our Enemies, as shall be taken, funk, burnt or otherwife deftroyed, fhall at any Time af-terwards be brought, (Proof being first made, by Affidavit before such Person or Persons, of the Inability of making fuch Oath or Oaths, and obtaining such Certificate at the faid first Port) and the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate, Conful, or Vice Conful, shall thereupon grant such Certificate and Certificates as are therein before directed ; which Certificate and Certificates shall be good and effec-tual, to all Intents and Purposes, as if the fame were granted by the Mayor, or other Chief Magi-Conful, or Vice Conful, of the Port to which ftrate, fuch Prize or Prizes, Officers or Men, as aforefaid, shall be first brought; any Thing in the faid Acts contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithitanding: We taking the Premission into Confideration, do, pursuant to the faid Acts of Parliament (with the Advice of Our Privy Council)

the Numbers of fuch Men to be proved by the

by this Our Proclamation, örder, direct, and appoint, That the neat Produce of all Prizes taken by Our Ships of War, and Bounty Money for the taking, finking, burning, or otherwife deftroying the Enemies Ships of War, or Privateers, be divided into Eight equal Parts, and be distributed in Manner following; that is to fay, To the Captain or Cap. tains of any of Our Ships of War, who shall be actually on board at the taking of any Prize, or at the taking, finking, burning, or deftroying any of the Enemies Ships of War, or Privateers, Three Eighth.Parts; but in Cafe any fuch Prize shall be taken, or Ship of War, or Privateer, of the Enemy, be taken, funk, burnt, or deflroyed, by any of Our Ship or Ships of War, under the Command of a Flag or Flags, the Flag Officer or Officers being actually on board, or directing and affifting in the Capture, to have one of the faid Three Eighth Parts; the faid One Eighth Part to be to fuch Flag Officer or Flag Officers in fuch Proportions, and subject to such Regulations, as are herein after for that Purpose mentioned : To the Cap-tains of Marines and Land Forces, Sea Lieutenants and Mafter, on Board any fuch Ships, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them : To the Lieutenants and Quarter Master of Marines, and Lieutenants, Enfigns, and Quarter-Matter of Land Forces, Boatiwain, Gunner, Purfer, Carpenter, Master's Mate, Chirurgeon, Pilot, and Chaplain, on board any fuch Ship, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them : To the Midshipmen, Secretary to Flag-Officers, Captain's Clerk, Mafter Sail maker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Corporals, Ycomen of the Sheets, Iviaiter at Arms, Corporals, Ycomen of the Sheets, Coxfwain, Quarter-mafters, Quarter-mafters Mates, Chirurgeon's Mates, Yeo-men of the Powder-Room, and Serjeants of Ma-rines, or Land Forces, on board any fach Ships, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amonght tham - To she are supersonal and the second them : To the l'rumpeters, Quarter-Gunners, Car-penter's Crew, Steward, Cook Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunfmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine, or other Soldiers, and all other Perfons doing Duty, or affifting on board any fuch Ships, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them : And in Case any Sea Captain, inferior Committion or Warrant Sea-Officers, belong-ing to any Ship of War, for whom any Shares of Prizes, or of the Bounty-Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or deslroyed, are hereby allowed, be absent at the Time of the Capture of any Prize, or at the Capture, Burning, Sinking, or Deffroying, any Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, the Share of such Sea-Captain, inferior Commission or Warrant Sea-Officer, shall be cast into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter-Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunfmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine, or other Soldiers, and other Perfons doing Duty, or affifting on board any fuch Ships, to be equally divided amongst Provided, that if any Officer or Officers on hem. board any of Our Ships of War, at the Time of Taking any fuch Prizes, or at the Taking, Sink-ing, Burning, or Deftroying, any Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, thall have more Commiffions or Officers than one, he or they shall be intitled only to the Share or Shares of the faid Prizes, and of the Bounty-Money for the Enemy's Ships of War, or Privateers, taken, funk, burnt, or deftroyed, which, according to the above-mentioned Distribution, shall belong to his or their respective su-perior Commissions or Offices. And We do hereby fightly enjoin all and every Commander and Com-manders of any Ships of War, taking any Prize, or Taking, Sinking, Burning, or Deftroying, any of the Enemy's Ships of War, or Privateers, as foon as may be, to transmit, or cause to be transmitted, to the Commissioners of Our Navy, a true Lift of the Names of all the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers,

or others, who were actually on board Our Thips of War, under his or their Command, at the Taking fuch Frize, or at the Taking, Burning, Sinking, or Destroying, any such Ships of War, of Privateers, of the Enemy : Which Lift shall contain the Quality of the Service of each Perfon on board, and be fubfcribed by the Captain or Commanding Officer, and three or more of the Chief Officers on board. And We do hereby require and direct the Commissioners of Our Navy, or any three or more of them, to examine, or caule to be examined, fuch Lists by the Muster-Books of fuch Ships of War, and Lists an-nexed thereto, to see that such Lists doth agree with the faid Muffer Book and annexed Lifts, as to the Names, Qualities, or Ratings of the Officers, Sca-men, Marines, Soldiers, and others, belonging to fuch Ships of War; and, upon Requeft, forthwith to grant a Certificate of the Truth of any Lift transmitted to them, to the Agents nominated and appointed by the Captors, pursuant to the faid Acts, to take Care or dispose of fuch Prize, or of such Bounty Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or de-ftroyed; and alfo, upon Application to them, to give, or caufe to be given, unto the Agents who shall, at any Time or Times, be appointed as aforefaid by the Captors, all fuch Lifts from the Mufter-Book of any fuch Ships of War, and annexed Lifts, as the faid Agent shall find requisite for their Direction, to pay the Produce of fuch Prizes, or the Bounty, in Cafe any Bounty shall be due for taking the same, and to be otherwise aiding and affifting to the faid Agents, as shall be necessary. And as touching the said One Eighth Part, herein before-mentioned, to be granted to the Flag or Flag.Officers, who shall be actually on board at the Taking of any Prize, or at the Taking, Sinking, Burning, or Deftroying, any Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, or shall be directing and affifting therein, We have thought fit, and do, by these Presents, publish, order, and declare, that the following Regulations be observed : First, That a Flag-Officer, commanding in Chief, where there is but one Flag Officer upon Service, shall have to his own Use the faid One Eighth Part of the Prize taken, and Bounty-Money for the Ene-my's Ships taken, funk, burnt, or otherwife de-firoyed, by Ships under his Command. Secondly, That a Flag-Officer, fent to command at Jamaica. or elsewhere, shall have no Right to any Share of Prizes taken, or Bounty-Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or otherwife deitroyed, by Ships employed there, before he arrives at the Place to which he is fent, and actually takes upon him the Com-mand. Thirdly, That when an inferior Flag-Officer, or private Ships, are fent out to reinforce a fuperior Flag-Officer at Jamaica, or elsewhere, the faid superior Flag-Officer shall have no Right 10 any Share in the Prizes taken, or Bounty-Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or destroyed, by them, before they arrive within the Limits of his Command, and actually receive fome Orders from him. Fourthly, That a Chief Flag-Officer, returning home from Jamaica, or elsewhere, shall have no Share of the Prizes taken, or Bounty-Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or destroyed, by the Ships left behind to act under another Command. Fifthly, That if a Flag-Officer is fent to command in the Out-Ports of this Kingdom, he shall have no Share of the Prizes taken, or Bounty-Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or destroyed, by Ships that failed from that Port by Orders from the Admiralty. Sixthly, That when more Flag Officers than one ferve together, the Eighth Part of the Prizes taken, and Bounty-Money for the Taking, Sinking, Burning, or Destroying, Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, by any Ships of the Fleet or Squadron, thall be divided in the following Proportions, videlicet : If there be but two Flag. Officers, the Chief fhall have two Third Parts of the faid One Eighth Part, and the other fhall have the remaining Third Part; but if the Number of Flag-Officers be more than Two, the Chief shall have only One man, and the other Flag-shall be divided equally among the other Flag-Officered

Officers. Seventhly, That Commodore:, with Captains under them, shall be effeemed as Flag Officers, with respect to their Right to an Eighth Part of Prize- taken, and Bounty-Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or destroyed, whether commanding ia Chief, or ferving under Command.

St. James's, July 27. The following Address of the Council and General Affembly of Antigua, baving been transmitted to the Earl of Egremont, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been prefented to His Majeily : Which Address His Majefty was pleafed to receive very gracioully.

The humble Address of the Council and General Affembly of Antigua, to His most Excellent Majefty.

Most Gracious Sovereign, JE your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Council and Affembly of this your Majesty's Island Antigua after having folemnly of-fe ed up our Publick Acknowledgments to the Divice Majesty, for His repeated Bleffings upon your Majefty's Arms, beg Leave to join with all your faithful Subjects, in a joyful Congratulation on the Conqueit or all the French Windward Islands, and more especially of Martinico, and the rich and fer-tile Island of Guadaloupe; Islands of the utwost Importance to the Prefervation of your Majesty's Sugar Colonies, and to the Security of the extensive Trade and Navigation depending upon them, as they have received more Injury and Interruption from these two Islands, while in the Hands of the Every, than from any other of the French Domi-nions. The Favour of the Almighty has most eminearly appeared in the Rapidity of these your Majesty's late Conquests, won by the Conduct and un-para'leled Bravery of your Majesty's Commanders, Soldiers, and Seamen, with so little Effusion of Blood. As it has pleafed the Giver of all Victory to make these Conquests fo highly conducive to your Glory, and reduced, under your Dominions, Islands almost impregnable by Nature, and bleffed with fruitful Seafons, abundantly beyond your Majesty's former weak, and near exhausted Sugar Colonies; your Majefty's Royal Wildom will belt difcover, how to derive a just Compensation from them to our Mother Country, for the immense Treasures expended in the Profecution of this just and necessary War.

Having thus early, in your Majefty's Keign, al-ready felt the happy Effects of your Paternal Care, ermit us to hope for a lafting Extension of your Southern, in Proportion to your Majefly's Northern Colonies, without which we fear, that the Enlargement of the latter may redound more to the Benefit and Advantage of the French, than to the British Sugar Islands, whole future Existence seems to depend, in a great Measure, upon an efficitual Ex-tinction of that Superiority, which the French have always maintained in these Islands, until this glorious

Æra of your Majesty's most auspicious Reiga. May the God of Hosts continue to bles your Majefty's Arms with uninterrupted Success, as we may humbly hope from the Juffice of your Majefty's Caule, and the Uprightness of your Intentions, till this destructive War shall end in a Peace, honourable and advantageous to great Britain, and happy for the general Repole of every Quarter of the Globe.

Admiralty Office, July 24. Captain Penny, of His Majetty's Ship the Looe, is arrived at Cork with the Maria and Joseph, a Spanish Privateer of Four Carriage Guns, and Thirty Men, which he took the 23th of last Month off Cape Finisterre.

General Post Office, July 24, 1762. Whereas the Post Boy bringing the Mail from Bathe was, on the 22d Instant, between the Hours of Irn and Eleven o'Clock at Night, attacked in his Way is Pent France in Gloucestersbire, and robbed by three Four Pads in Sailors Habus, of the Mail containing the following Bags, viz. The Bag from Bath for Los don, and also the Bye Bag from Bath for Teabury, Cireacefter, Farringdon, and Oxford.

This is to give Notice, that whoever shall apprebend and convict, or cauje to be apprehended and conwilled, the Perfons conterned in committing the faid Robbery, of whom no particular Descriptions are as yet come to hand, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by AA of Parliament : Or if any Perfont or Perfent, whether an Accomplice in the faid Robbery, or knowing thereof, Shali make Discovery whereby any of the Perfons concerned in the fame may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers shall, upon Conviction of any of the Parties, be initiled to the fame Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and aljo His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
