Breflaav, July 11. General Ziethen, on the 7th in the Morning, perceiving Mathal Daun had in the Night quittes the firong Camp of Kuntzendorff immediately took Poffelion of the fame. The Marthal has made a Movement with his Left Wing towards the Konisberg, but his Right is still posted near Schweidnitz i fo that his Communication with that Fortrels is open; and, by his prefent Politions he covers the County of Glatz, where his principal Magazines are. The King of Prufia is encamped between Gottesberg and Seiferfdorff, having the Village of Ditmansdorff between him and the Enemy. His Head Quarter is at Seitendorff. Lieutenant General Neuweidt, whom his Pruffian Majefty had detached towards Friedland, fell in, on his March, with the Rear of General Brentano's Corps, which he attacked, and made about Four Hundred Pris foners. We hear that General Neuweidt has putfued his March towards Braunau in Bohemia. Body of Light Troops, composed of Coffacks, Hulfars, &c. have penetrated into that Kingdoin on the Side of Trautenau. Lieutenant General Neuweidt, on the 5th or 6th Instant, made an Attack on the Auftrian Post of Engelsberg, from which he was re-pulsed, with the Lois of upwards of Five Hundred Men. The Cannonade lasted from Three o'Clock till paft Eight in the Morning. His Pruffian Ma-jefty was prefent, and much exposed floring the whole Attack.

Hamburgh, July 16. The King of Denmark fet out the Day before Yeslerday from Travendahl, on

his Return to Copenhagen, The Danish Troops, who are entered into the Dutchy of Mecklenburgh, are faid to occupy Scheverin and Domitz.

We received Yefferday the News from Berlin, that the King of Prussia had, by his Motions, with-out Effusion of Blood, obliged Marshal Daun to

abandon his firong Camp of Kuntzendorff. Branf-wick, July 20. The Enemy evacuated Got-tingen the 15th in the Evening, after blowing up, Morning they returned again, and are now en-camped close to the Town. The Defertion from

their Army is very great. Hague, July 23. By Letters received this Day from the Army under the Command of Prince Ferdinand of Brunfwick, dated the 20th, we are informed, That his Serene Highness marched on the 15th from Wilhelmstahl to Hoff; and that, on the fame Day, all the Enemy's Pofts along the Fulda were attacked as far as Melfungen. The French, uncertain what might be the Intention of the Combined Army, ftruck their Tents, and Lieutenant-General Chevert was recalled from his Poft at Dranffeld, to join the main Body of their Army. The French Marshals have fince abandoned their Camp of Landwehrhagen, and have marched to Melful-gen, and that Neighbourhood; fo that, except the Garrifon of Gottingen, they have nothing upon the Right of the Werra, or in the Electorate of Hanover. The Garrison of Gottingen likewife took the Alarm on the 15th, and abandoned the Town in the Afternoon, but returned the 16th in the Morning. Six Thousand of the French were encamped at Lutterberg; and another Body, of the fame Force, remained in the intrenched Camp before Caffel.

The Prince of Condé has fuddenly quitted Coef-feld, croffed the Lippe at Halteren, and feems to be marching towards Heffe. The Hereditary Prince, who had obliged the French Detachments to retire from about Ofnabruck, being informed of the Prince of Condé's March, quitted his Camp at Wollbeck on the 18th, and marched to Amecke; and we hear that his Serene Highness was to march, on the ziff, to crois the Lippe at Ham. in order to follow and observe the Motions of the French, who have left nothing in the Bithoprick of Munfor, except

the Light Troops of Cambfort. The Letters of the 5th from Madrid give no particular Accounts from Portugal. It is faid, that Count d'Aranda will command the Spanish Army, in the room of the Marquis de Saria; and that the Troops are to keep the Field, inflead of going into Quarters of Reirefhment, as is usual in those Cli-mates. The Works of Miranda and Braganza have been demolished ; but those of Chaves are preferved, in order, as is faid, to make a Place of Arms of that Town, for the Sake of facilitating the Siege of Valentia, which was to be undertaken by Don Sebaltian de la Croix, Commandant in Galicia, as foon as the French Succours should arrive; the last Division of which was to be at Valladolid on the 13th Inftant.
