AT the Court at St. James's, the 14th Day of July, 1762,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should on or before the 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may desert themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of May last. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been continued and extended to the 31st of this Instant July; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this Instant July, to the 30th Day of September next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Breslaw, July 11. General Ziethen, on the 7th in the Morning, perceiving Marshal Daun had in the Night quitted the strong Camp of Kuntzendorff immediately took Possession of the same. The Marshal has made a Movement with his Left Wing towards the Konisberg, but his Right is still posted near Schweidnitz; so that his Communication with that Fortrefs is open; and, by his present Position, he covers the County of Glatz, where his principal Magazines are. The King of Prussia is encamped between Gotesberg and Seifersdorff, having the Village of Ditmansdorff between him and the Enemy. His Head Quarter is at Seitendorff. Lieutenant General Neuweidt, whom his Prussian Majesty had detached towards Friedland, fell in, on his March, with the Rear of General Bréntano's Corps, which he attacked, and made about Four Hundred Prisoners. We hear that General Neuweidt has pursued his March towards Braunau in Bohemia. A Body of Light Troops, composed of Cossacks, Husars, &c. have penetrated into that Kingdom on the Side of Trautenau. Lieutenant General Neuweidt, on the 5th or 6th Instant, made an Attack on the Austrian Post of Engelsberg, from which he was repulsed, with the Loss of upwards of Five Hundred Men. The Cannonade lasted from Three o'Clock till past Eight in the Morning. His Prussian Majesty was present, and much exposed during the whole Attack.

Hamburgb, July 16. The King of Denmark set out the Day before Yesterday from Travendahl, on his Return to Copenhagen.

The Danish Troops, who are entered into the Dutchy of Mecklenburgh, are said to occupy Scheverin and Domitz.

We received Yesterday the News from Berlin, that the King of Prussia had, by his Motions, without Effusion of Blood, obliged Marshal Daun to abandon his strong Camp of Kuntzendorff.

Brunswick, July 20. The Enemy evacuated Gotingen the 15th in the Evening, after blowing up, as it is reported, one of the Bastions; but the next Morning they returned again, and are now encamped close to the Town. The Desertion from their Army is very great.

Hague, July 23. By Letters received this Day from the Army under the Command of Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, dated the 20th, we are informed, That his Serene Highness marched on the 15th from Wilhelmstahl to Hoff; and that, on the same Day, all the Enemy's Posts along the Fulda were attacked as far as Melsungen. The French, uncertain what might be the Intention of the Combined Army, struck their Tents, and Lieutenant-General Chevert was recalled from his Post at Dianfeld, to join the main Body of their Army. The French Marshals have since abandoned their Camp of Landwehshagen, and have marched to Melsungen, and that Neighbourhood; so that, except the Garrison of Gotingen, they have nothing upon the Right of the Werra, or in the Elestorate of Hanover. The Garrison of Gotingen likewise took the Alarm on the 15th, and abandoned the Town in the Afternoon, but returned the 16th in the Morning. Six Thousand of the French were encamped at Lutterberg; and another Body, of the same Force, remained in the intrenched Camp before Cassel.

The Prince of Condé has suddenly quitted Coefeld, crossed the Lippe at Halteren, and seems to be marching towards Hesse. The Hereditary Prince, who had obliged the French Detachments to retire from about Osnabruck, being informed of the Prince of Condé's March, quitted his Camp at Wollbeck on the 18th, and marched to Amecke; and we hear that his Serene Highness was to march, on the 21st, to cross the Lippe at Ham. In order to follow and observe the Motions of the French, who have left nothing in the Bishoprick of Munster, except the Light Troops of Cambfort.

The Letters of the 5th from Madrid give no particular Accounts from Portugal. It is said, that Count d'Aranda will command the Spanish Army, in the room of the Marquis de Saria; and that the Troops are to keep the Field, instead of going into Quarters of Refreshment, as is usual in those Climates. The Works of Miranda and Braganza have been demolished; but those of Chaves are preserved, in order, as is said, to make a Place of Arms of that Town, for the Sake of facilitating the Siege of Valentia, which was to be undertaken by Don Sebastian de la Croix, Commandant in Galicia, as soon as the French Succours should arrive; the last Division of which was to be at Valladolid on the 13th Instant.
