

We received Yesterday the News from Berlin, that the King of Prussia had, by his Motions, without Effusion of Blood, obliged Marshal Daun to abandon his strong Camp of Kuntzendorff.

Brunswick, July 20. The Enemy evacuated Gotingen the 15th in the Evening, after blowing up, as it is reported, one of the Bastions; but the next Morning they returned again, and are now encamped close to the Town. The Desertion from their Army is very great.

Hague, July 23. By Letters received this Day from the Army under the Command of Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, dated the 20th, we are informed, That his Serene Highness marched on the 15th from Wilhelmstahl to Hoff; and that, on the same Day, all the Enemy's Posts along the Fulda were attacked as far as Melsungen. The French, uncertain what might be the Intention of the Combined Army, struck their Tents, and Lieutenant-General Chevert was recalled from his Post at Dianfeld, to join the main Body of their Army. The French Marshals have since abandoned their Camp of Landwehshagen, and have marched to Melsungen, and that Neighbourhood; so that, except the Garrison of Gotingen, they have nothing upon the Right of the Werra, or in the Elestorate of Hanover. The Garrison of Gotingen likewise took the Alarm on the 15th, and abandoned the Town in the Afternoon, but returned the 16th in the Morning. Six Thousand of the French were encamped at Lutterberg; and another Body, of the same Force, remained in the intrenched Camp before Cassel.

The Prince of Condé has suddenly quitted Coefeld, crossed the Lippe at Halteren, and seems to be marching towards Hesse. The Hereditary Prince, who had obliged the French Detachments to retire from about Osnabruck, being informed of the Prince of Condé's March, quitted his Camp at Wollbeck on the 18th, and marched to Amecke; and we hear that his Serene Highness was to march, on the 21st, to cross the Lippe at Ham. In order to follow and observe the Motions of the French, who have left nothing in the Bishoprick of Munster, except the Light Troops of Cambfort.

The Letters of the 5th from Madrid give no particular Accounts from Portugal. It is said, that Count d'Aranda will command the Spanish Army, in the room of the Marquis de Saria; and that the Troops are to keep the Field, instead of going into Quarters of Refreshment, as is usual in those Climates. The Works of Miranda and Braganza have been demolished; but those of Chaves are preserved, in order, as is said, to make a Place of Arms of that Town, for the Sake of facilitating the Siege of Valentia, which was to be undertaken by Don Sebastian de la Croix, Commandant in Galicia, as soon as the French Succours should arrive; the last Division of which was to be at Valladolid on the 13th Instant.
