A T the Court at St. James's, the 14th Day of July, 1762,

PRESĖNT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS His Majefty was pleafed, by His Order in Council of the 2d of April laft, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every fuch able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majefty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majefty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as should be employed for raifing Men for the Service of His Majefty's Royal Navy : And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings fhould be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the faid 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majefly's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may fecret themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's faid Service, on or before the faid Thirty-firft Day of May laft. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards hath been continued and extended to the 31ft of this Inftant July; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the fame should be continued for fome Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewards, be pro-longed and extended from the faid 31ft Day of this Instant July, to the 30th Day of September next. And that the faid Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majefty's afore-mentioned Order in Council of the 2d of April laft. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Peterfourg July 10. Yesterday Her Imperial Majesty the Empress of Russian and Sovereign of this Empire, by the Name of Catharine the Second, and immediately thereupon, the several Orders Ecclesiastical, Civil, and Military, took the Oaths of Fidelity to her Imperial Majesty, and to her Son the Great Duke Paul, as her lawful Heir.

Briflaw, July 14. The lateft Accounts from the Upper Silefia fay, that the Duke of Bevern was near Troppau, General Verner at Fulneck, and General Beck at Bohrn, between Hoff and Sternberg, ftill keeping open his Communication with the County of Glatz.

Nothing has happened worth writing, between the two Armies in the Neighbourhood of Schweidnitz.

Breflaw, July 23. On the 21ft, in the Morning; the King of Prufia attacked the Right of Marfhal Daun's Army, pofted upon the Heights near the Village of Buckerfdorff, which were carried by the Pruflians. An Attack was then ordered to be made upon the Villages Ludwigfdorff and Leuthmanfdorff, from which the Auftrians were likewife driven; and, by these Succeffes, their Communication with Schweidnitz was entirely cut off. It was refolved the next Day to have attacked the Poft of Barfdorff, towards the Left of Marfhal Daun's Army, near Tanhaufen, where the Head Quarter was; but, by Accounts received laft Night, Marfhal Daun was retired, with Part of his Army, towards Braunau, in Bohemia; and the other Part had withdrawn into the County of Glatz.

It is not yet known here, with Certainty, what Lofs may have been fuffained on either Side ; but the Reports are, that the Pruffians tock 14 Pieces of Cannon, and made upwards of 1000 Prifoners; that the Defertion in the Auftrian Army was very great; and that the Lofs of the Pruffians did not exceed 300 Men.

not exceed 300 Men. Hague, July 27. All our Advices from the Rhine agree in the March of the Prince of Condé from Coesfeldt by Dulmen to Bockum, where he halted the 22d, intending to detach a great Part of his Troops to reinforce the other Army, and to fix his own Head Quarters at Dulleldo:ff, in order to guard the Rhine. In his March, the Light Troops and Detachments from the Hereditary Prince's Corps harrafied him extremely, and took a great deal of his Baggage. Some of our Accounts fay, that the Prince of Condé was actually arrived at Duffeldorff on the 24th. The Hereditary Prince was, on the 24th, encamped at Marck near Ham.

The King of Prufia is faid to be at Landihut, and General de Wied advanced into Bohemia towards Konigfgratz. There had been a fmatt Action at Brauhau, where the Prufian Colonel Lofficw is faid to have been killed. Colonel Kleift of the Pruffians, who had made an Incurfion into Bohemia on the Side of Saxony, is returned to Prince Henry's Army, the Prince of Stolberg, with the Army of the Empire, having marched forward again towards the Prufian Chain commanded by Major General Belling.

Hague July 30. Nothing is come from the Allied Army fince Captain Cunning am went thro' this place, though further Accounts are hourly expected. We are informed, that the Prince of Condé's Army has paffed the Heights of Cologne by Divifions, directing its March towards Siegen. Sixteen Battalions have remained for the Guard of Rees, Wefel, Duffeldorff, and Cologne, with a few Squadrons.

St. James's, August 2.

Captain Cunningham, who is juft arrived, being difpatched the 24th paft by Prince Ferdinand to His Majefty, brings Word, That the Day before, he had caufed an Attack to be made, by a Detachment of the Allied Army, confifting of fome Hanoverian and Heffian Troops, under the Command of General Gilfae, upon Part of the Enemy's Right Wing, compoled chiefly of the Saxon Troops, under Count de Luface, in their intrenched Camp of Lutternberg: That the Allied Troops marched through the Fulde

up to their Waills ; and, after having clambered up the Mountain; took four Palifaded Redoubts, one after the other, and drove the Enemy from all their Intrenchments. That during the Action, Major General Walthaufen gained the Rear of their Right Flank, charged their Cavalry, routed them, took and destroyed a whole Regiment of Saxon Horse. That the Allies in this Attack had taken above 1000 Prisoners, 13 Pieces of Cannon, and 3 Standards, with a Lofs, on their Part, not exceeding 200 Men.

Captain Cunningham likewise gives an Account, That during the faid Attack, Prince Frederick of Brunswick had marched towards the Kratzberg, a very strong high Ground, which covers Cassel, and cannonaded the French Lines, where Count Stain-ville was encamped with about 10,000 Men; who, hearing of the Defeat of the Saxons, quitted those Lines, to go to their Affiftance, whereupon Prince Frederick got Poffeffion of them without Oppofition.

Admirally Office August 2. Captain Knight, of His Majefty's Ship Liverpoole, has taken, and fent into Plymouth, the Skuer Lugfail Privatier, of two Carriage, Six Swivel Guns, and Forty-fix Men, which he took the 27th paft off the Ramhcad.
