AT the Court at St. James's, the 14th Day of July, 1762,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of May last. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been continued and extended to the 31st of this Instant July; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this Instant July, to the 30th Day of September next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Petersburg, July 20. The Body of the late Emperor has been brought to the Newsky Monastery, where it lies exposed to Publick View; and it is said will be interred To-morrow, or next Day.

Prince Galitzin, Vice-Chancellor, entered upon the Functions of his Office on Saturday last, by conferring with the Foreign Ministers along with the Great Chancellor.

Her Imperial Majesty proposes to set out for Moscow some Time next Month; and has fixed her Coronation to be in that Capital in September next.

M. Bestucheff is expected in Town this Evening.

Breslaw, August 6. The Trenches before Schweidnitz will be opened on Sunday or Monday next. There are 22 Battalions of Infantry destined to form the Siege; the Whole to be commanded by Lieutenant General Tauenfin, who has under him Major General Thaddin; and M. de Fevre, as chief Engineer.

The Garrison of Schweidnitz consists of about 9000 Men: M. de Guasco the Eldest is Commandant. He has under him M. Janini; and M. de Grimbovale, an Engineer.

The Prussian Infantry are partly encamped on the Hills behind Schweidnitz. The Cavalry form a Chain in the Plain of Kuntzendorff, to Reichenbach and Frankenstein, near which last Place the Prince of Wurtemberg is encamped, as well to watch the Motions of the Enemy, in the County of Glaz, as to cover the Artillery and Military Stores, which are bringing from Neisse. His Prussian Majesty himself will command the Army that is to cover the Siege.

The successful Attack made upon Barchin on the 21st of July, was executed entirely by Prussian Troops: The Russians were mere Spectators, and remained quiet in their Camp; and they separated that Evening from the Prussian Army, and marched the next Day towards the Oder.

Dusseldorff, August 4. The First Division of the Prince of Condé's Army arrived at Hachenbourg the 1st of this Month; the others follow with one Day's Interval. M. d'Affry has received Orders to march with the greatest Precaution, as it is apprehended the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick will endeavour, by forced Marches, to get between him and Gießen.

It is probable the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick is marched with all the Troops under his Command, as the Piquets left here do not exceed Six Hundred Men, which are not sufficient to defend this City Forty-eight Hours.

Cologne, August 5. The Prince of Condé has left Four Hundred Men of Boisgelin, Two Hundred of Orleans, and two Companies of Cambis, to guard the Fortifications of Deutz.

The four Companies of the Guards du Corps, and the Horse Grenadiers, are still here waiting for Orders.

Coblentz, August 6. The Army of the Prince of Condé being assembled the 1st at Hachenbourg; they marched the 2d to Hain; the 3d to Rode; the 4th they passed the Dille at Herborn, and camped at Hoen Solms, having detached four Regiments to Gladenback, and pushed some Detachments between Marbourg and Gießen: The Baggage and the Equipages of the Army were sent here, with three Battalions to guard them.

Wesel, August 7. The greatest Part of this Garrison, with some Piquets of the Troops in Duffeldorff, Cleves, &c. form a flying Camp of 6500 Men, which are ready to oppose any Motion the Allied Troops may make, and to guard the Dutchy of Berg. M. Muret, with 500 Light Troops, is near Solingen, to gain Intelligence of the Enemy's Designs.

The City of Cologne has near 1000 Men in Garrison; and the Cannon of that Arsenal is put in Readiness to defend the Ramparts on the Approach of the Enemy.

At Duffeldorff there are 400 Men of Piemont; 200 of Orleans; four Piquets and two Companies of d'Ailly Royal Grenadiers.

Brunswick, August 10. Advices were received here Yesterday, that the Corps commanded by Prince Frederick of Brunswick, had, by four forced Marches, reached on the 8th the Upper Werra, having occupied Eschwege, Wanfried, and Mulhausen, and had by this Position cut off the only Communication the Enemy had left open through Thuringia.

Hague, August 13. We expect to receive News from the Army every Hour. Our last Accounts from Gudensberg are of the 8th Instant in the Afternoon: Prince Ferdinand was then in March to attack the French Army, and had thrown eight Bridges over the Fulda: We don't hear that the Prince of Condé was advanced farther than Hohenfolms.

By a late Decree of the Parliament of Paris, the Jesuits are totally annihilated, and rendered incapable of being re-established.

St. James's, August 17.

On Saturday last Lieutenant Colonel Ligonier, Aide de Camp to his Serene Highness Prince Ferdinand arrived here with the Trophies taken from the French at Lutterberg, and brings the following Particulars relative to the Action: That in Consequence of his Serene Highness's Orders, the Generals Zastrow and Gilsa, with their respective Corps, passed the Fulda the 23d at break of Day, and attacked the Right of the French Army, composed chiefly of Saxons, under the Command of Prince Xavier. General Waldhausen took Post at Bonnefort, by which Position, he not only kept in Check the Garrison of Munden, but was ready to fall upon the Enemy's Rear, when Occasion offered. Our Troops passed the Fulda, under a heavy Fire from the Enemy, which they sustained with the greatest Intrepidity; and soon got Possession of a Wood which covered the Enemy's Right: Prince Xavier finding his Flank gained, after an obstinate Resistance, began to give Way, which General Waldhausen perceived, and, by immediately attacking with his Cavalry, completed the Defeat. We took thirteen Pieces of Cannon in the Pursuit, two Standards, and Eleven Hundred Prisoners, amongst whom is the Prince of Isenbourg. Lieutenant General Stainville, who occupied the intrenched Camp upon the Kratzenberg, with a Corps of 10000 Men, quitted his Intrenchments with an Intention of covering Prince Xavier's Retreat. The Intrenchments were immediately occupied by Prince Frederick of Brunswick; and all the Works, Redoubts, &c. upon the Kratzenberg, totally demolished. By the present Position of the Allied Army, the French are so surrounded, and their Communication with Franckfort, &c. &c. so entirely cut off, that they must soon either retire, or endeavour to disengage themselves by a General Action.

The King has been pleased to order Letters Patent to pass under the Great Seal of Great Britain, for creating His Royal Highness the Prince of Great Britain, (Electoral Prince of Brunswick-Lunenburgh, Duke of Cornwall and Rothsay, Earl of Carrick, Baron of Renfrew, Lord of the Isles, and Great Steward of Scotland,) Prince of Wales, and Earl of Chester.
