GEORGE R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands Prorogued to Thursday the Ninth Day of this Instant September; We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby Publish and Declare, That the said Parliament shall be further Prorogued, on the said Ninth Day of September, to Tuesday the Ninth Day of November next; And We have given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain to prepare a Commission for Proroguing the same accordingly. And We do hereby further Declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Ninth Day of November next, be held and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said Ninth Day of November next.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the First Day of September, 1762, in the Second Year of Our Reign.

Hague, August 27. The Letters from Hesse of the 21st past, confirm the Evacuation of Gottingen by the French, which they made with so much Precipitation, that they left behind them Three Pieces of Brass Cannon, 12 Pounders, and a great Quantity of Ammunition of all Kinds.

They add, that the Honover Dominions were now entirely recovered from the Enemy; who has left in Cassel a Garrison of 11 Battalions, and some Cavalry, under the Orders of M. Diebach; and that Prince Ferdinand had blockaded the Place.

The main Body under the two French Marshals was encamped near Hirschfeld, covered by the Fulda; and the Hereditary Prince was marched, to prevent their Junction with the Prince of Condé, who was encamped in the Neighbourhood of Grunberg.

Colonel Reidesel had dislodged M. Contars from Padberg, and had taken a Captain and 70 Men, with a Number of Horses.

Hague, August 31. We have an Account from the Army, that Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were on the 26th past at Mahr. The French continue to retire. His Serene Highness was to march that Day to Ulrichstein, between the Fulda and the Lahn. The two Marshals had passed the Town of Fulda, and were approaching the Mein, without having yet been able to join the Prince of Condé, whom the Hereditary Prince continues to follow, having

having successively obliged him to decamp with Loss from Grunberg, and other Places.

On the 25th past, that Prince being upon the March with some Light Troops, with a View to attack the Rear Guard of the French Army, fell in with the Main Body, and was received with a violent Cannonade, by which he lost 30 Men, and was obliged to leave three Field Pieces behind him upon his Retreat.

Prince Frederick of Brunswick had invested the Town of Cassel, which is said to be in great Distress for Provisions.

Lieutenant General Dauvet had bombarded the Town of Hamm, and ruined a few Houses there; but was since retired again to the Rhine.

Since the ill Success of General Laudohn's Attack upon the Duke of Bevern on the 16th, in Silesia, Marshal Daun was retired into the County of Glatz.
