## PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every fuch able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who fhould, on or before the 31ft Day of May laft, voluntarily enter themfelves to ferve in His Majefty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majefty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majefty's Royal Navy : And alio that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the faid 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themfelves in like Manner to ferve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Perfon who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may scoret themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majefty's faid Service, on or before the faid Thirty-first Day of May last. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards hath been continued and extended to the 30th of this Instant September; And it being judged expedient for His Majelly's Service, that the fame should be continued for fome Time longer; His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the faid 30th Day of this Instant September, to the 30th Day of November next. And that the faid Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majefty's aforementioned Order in Council of the zd of April last. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.
