hess of the Roads, occasioned by violent Rains, every Thing arrived in Order in the Camp of Kirchayn, except a few Pontoon Carriages, and fome Waggons, which broke down, and were or-

dered to be burnt.

The Defign of the French appeared to be to get tound the Right of Prince Ferdinand, through the Country of Waldeck; for which Purpose the Prince of Condé had been employed to open March Routes towards Frankenberg upon the Eder, which served for the March of the Confederate Army instead of thens. Prince Ferdinand having marched on the 16th, by those Routes to Wetter, where the French had a Garrison, which was driven out, and the Prince of Condé obliged to repass the Lahne. His Serene Highness encamped at Wetter the same Day, and his Head Quarters were still there on the 17th. A large Detachment which the Enemy had pushed forward from their Right, between Ziegenhayn and Neustad, had been likewise repulsed.

Our Letters from Munster inform us, that the Elector of Cologn was unanimously elected Bishop of that See on the 16th Instant.
