AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 17th Day of September, 1762,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 9th of April last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of October next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of October next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Ma-

jefty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of May last. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been continued and extended to the 30th of this Instant September; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 30th Day of this Instant September, to the 30th Day of November next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor and Commonalty of the City of Canterbury, in Burgmote assembled.

*Most gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E your Majesty's ever dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor and Commonalty of your City of Canterbury, humbly beseech your Majesty to receive our sincere Congratulations on the Birth of a Prince, and the Recovery of our gracious Queen your most amiable Consort.

So early an Instance of the Divine Goodness, in promoting your Majesty's domestick Happiness, diffuses an universal Joy through the Minds of your Subjects ; and presents them with the most pleasing Prospect, that the Blessings they already experience under your Majesty's auspicious Government, will, by this happy Event, be continued to Posterity.

It is our Interest, as well as Duty, to wish, that your Majesty's Reign may be long and glorious ; but, when the destined Period arrives, that your Royal Son shall sway the British Sceptre, may he, by imitating your Majesty's Virtues, have learned to rule a Free and Loyal People, and become for a Series of Years, the Guardian of those Liberties, which the Precepts and Example of his Illustrious Father will have taught him to protect and defend.

*Dantzic, September 22.* In this Country we are at present very quiet, the Russians having already disposed of all their Magazines, &c. and being pretty far advanced on their March homewards ; so that the Prussian Majesty is again in full Possession of all

his Territories in Pomerania, as well as Polish Prussia, and already receives from the latter a considerable Number of Recruits.

*Breslaw, September 22.* It is confidently reported, but we have no Certainty of it, that the Commandant of Schweidnitz is now actually treating, and has offered to surrender himself and the Garrison Prisoners of War, with this Condition, That they should not be sent into Prussia, but immediately exchanged against an equal Number of Prussian Prisoners.

We are informed that Major General Schmettau, who was detached towards Hirschberg, has taken Possession of Zittau and Gorlitz. And some Letters received here say, that the Austrians have occupied Budissin.

*Head Quarters at Kirchayn, September 30.*

*September 22.* This Morning, at Day-Light, we saw that the Enemy had worked hard in Repairing their Redoubt, and had added considerably to their Trench of Communication. We had likewise wrought all Night to put our Redoubt in a State of Defence, and to make an Intrenchment about 100 Paces in the Rear of it. We had heard the Enemy drawing off their Cannon in the Night, and we saw only three Pieces remaining in the Morning, to which we opposed the like Number. As there was not a Shot fired on either Side, we both continued the Works that had been begun in the Night, and we traced out a large Redoubt upon a Hill, within Reach of Grape-Shot of the Bridge, as the Enemy did a Battery on their Side. Our advanced Centinels were not ten Yards from each other. We observed that all was quiet at Amonebourg, and that our People were on the Walls ; upon which the Duke returned to his Quarters now changed to Kirchayn. The Avenue to this Town, on the Enemy's Side, is by a Causeway through a Morass : A little Rivulet, which runs close by the Town, falls into the Ohme at a small Distance from it. A Battery has been made on this Causeway to keep the Enemy at a Distance ; and in the Church-yard, which is the highest Part of the Town, we have a heavy Cannon. But as they may throw Shells in here, all our Carriages are ordered to remain out of the Town. From the Church-yard we this Day saw the Enemy in the Road leading to the Gate of Amonebourg, and no Opposition made from within. Soon after their Centinels appeared on the Walls, which showed us they were Masters of the Place, but whether by Capitulation, or Surprize, we are not yet informed.

The Enemy's Grand Army having moved to the Right, General Conway was ordered to quit the Heights of Wetter, and to fall back to Those of Melnau. Our Grand Army likewise made a Movement, and encamped with the Right at Schonstadt, and the Left at Staulzenbach. Lord Granby's Reserve occupied the Ground before Nieder Klein, to be at Hand to defend the Passage of the Brugge Muhl, and General Wangenheim remained on the Heights by Danrot, to face the Saxons. Luckner occupied the Gorge of Nieder Aspe on the Right of General Conway.

By the Returns of this Day, the Number of our Killed and Wounded, in the Affair of Brugge Muhl, do not amount to Eight Hundred. Twelve Officers, and about 150 Men, remained on the Spot.

*September 23.* Capt. Cruze, who had commanded at Amonebourg, was this Day sent back with his Garrison, as Prisoners of War ; and he gave such Reasons for Capitulating, as satisfied the Duke. A large Breach had been made in the Wall of the Castle, where he was posted, (the Detachment from the Army being charged with the Defence of the Town) by which an Officer and 50 Men had got into the Court Yard of the Castle, and others were following them, when they were so much galled by the

Fire of our People, that several of them were killed there, and the rest, in endeavouring to get back, were taken Prisoners. This was the brisk Firing we heard the Night of the 21st. The Morning of the 22d they made a Shew of storming again with many Batteries; but first summoned the Place. The Commandant, on such a formidable Apparatus, having no Provisions, and very little Ammunition, capitulated.

We observed, that the greatest Part of the Enemy's Army was, since the Taking of Amonebourg, encamped in the Plain behind it.

*September 24.* The Enemy made a Feu de Joye for the Taking of Almeida in Portugal.

*September 25.* The Enemy has made a regular Communication on the other Side of their Redoubt, by which they can come into it by the Hill of Amonebourg under Cover. Our Redoubt by the Gallows was almost finished, and others on the Right and Left begun. The Ohme being now fordable in many Places, we have collected all the Harrows we could find in the adjacent Villages, and placed them in the most practicable Fords.

*September 26.* The Duke having Intelligence that the Enemy had detached a Corps towards Alsfeldt, ordered Lord Granby to march in the Evening with 17 Squadrons, a Brigade of Infantry, and some heavy Cannon, to attack them. General Wangenheim, whose Corps was Part of the Troops that were under Lord Granby's Orders, on this Occasion, marched with them. Beckwith's Brigade replaced Wangenheim's Infantry on the Heights of Danrot. Some other Movements were made on our Right, but of no Consequence; one Brigade only taking up the Ground, which another was ordered to leave, for preserving the Communication.

*September 27.* The Duke having had Intelligence last Night, that the Prince of Condé's Corps was to march to Siegen, his Serene Highness ordered General Conway to occupy the Heights of Wetter, and General Gillze to replace him on those of Melinau. Luckner's Corps was at the same Time to march to Wattenbach, to prevent the Enemy coming by the Gorge of Culmbach into General Conway's Rear. The Enemy's Main Army continued in the same Position they have been in for some Time past. Their Grand Guards were posted on the Hills above Wetter, but fell back upon the Approach of our Troops.

*September 28.* Deserters, who came in last Night, affirm, that it was intended to attack our Left this Morning; and the Story was so probable, that the Duke ordered three Battalions from the Right to reinforce our Left, and his Serene Highness went at Day-break to Neider-Offeiden; but finding every Thing quiet, he returned hither, and ordered the three Battalions, which we met on their March, and who had left their Tents standing, to return to their former Position.

Three Battalions marched Yesterday to reinforce Lord Granby.

*September 29.* Lord Granby returned to his former Position, as did the other Troops. His Lordship arrived at Romrod the 26th at Midnight. The 27th he had an Account that the Enemy had pushed on towards Ziegenhayn, and that they had fallen back to Eysa in the Evening; upon which he marched to Alsfeldt. They retired in the Night, and he had Orders to return.

They had pushed a considerable Detachment of Cavalry to escort Waggons to Ziegenhayn, and thought themselves strong enough to force Major General Freytag; but he attacked them, and pursued them to Alsfeldt, killing, wounding, and taking 400 Men. It is supposed that their Intention was to load their Waggons with Meal, of which

they have great Quantities at Ziegenhayn; and to endeavour to supply the Garrison of Cassel, which is said to be in great Distress. M. de Poyanne commanded this Corps.

*September 30.* There being Intelligence, that Part of this Corps was still in the Neighbourhood of Erlickstein, Major General Alfeldt was detached, at Two this Morning, with two Battalions and eight Squadrons, and some Pieces of Cannon from General Wangenheim's Corps, to attack them.

The Enemy having likewise occupied Bergemunden, Major General Freytag, whose Corps was at Mulbach, since his Pursuit of the 27th, was ordered to attack that Post this Morning. We attended the Duke to the Heights of Hombourg before Noon, and heard some Cannonading in our Way there; but it ceased before our Arrival; and an Officer was sent to inform his Serene Highness, that the Enemy was dislodged, but that a considerable Corps was then encamping by Neider-Ohm. We saw some Cannon-Shot fired not far from Erlickstein, which must be by General Alfeldt; but the Duke had not a Report from thence at Eight this Morning.

*Hague, October 5.* Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were still at Kirchayn on the 1st Instant. The Army under his Command extends from behind Merlan on the Left, as far as Wattenbach on the Right. The French from Merlan on their Right, to Caldern on their Left.

The two Marshals had, since the Affair of the 21st past, contented themselves with making Detachments on the Right and Left of the Allied Army, in order thereby to open again their Communication with Cassel, and facilitate the Means of throwing Provisions into the Place, which began to be in very great Distress for Want of them.

It is confessed by their own Accounts, that their Loss in the Cannonade of the 21st, greatly exceeded that of the Allies. And we hear from Francfort, that Eighteen Hundred wounded Men had been sent to the Hospital there, besides a great many, who not being able to support the Journey thither, were carried to Marbourg, Giessen, and other Places nearer at Hand.

We are likewise informed, that the Foreign Regiments in the French Service have suffered greatly this Campaign by Desertion and Sickness; and their Army in general is represented to be in a bad State, and in Want of Provisions and Forage.
