HIS Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable George Dunk, Earl of Halifax, to be one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, his Lordship was this Day, by His Majesty's Command, sworn one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of May last. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been continued and extended to the 30th of this Instant September; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council; doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 30th Day of this Instant September, to the 30th Day of November next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concern'd are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Petersbourg, September 17. On Sunday last in the Forenoon the Empress left this City, and went that Evening to Caerkazelo, where she remained till Tuesday Morning, when she continued her Journey to Moscow, proposing to make her Entry into that Capital about the 12th or 13th of the Month; and her Imperial Majesty's Coronation is said to be fixed for the 22d.

This Morning the two Chancellors set out for Moscow; and Count Bestucheff is to follow in a Day or two. The ordinary Affairs of the Government of this Capital are left in the Hands of a Committee of the Senate, of which M. Neplueff is declared Chief, who, some Days before the Empress left this Place, was honoured with the Order of St. Andrew.

Breslau, September 27. His Prussian Majesty has established a Battery on the other Side of Schweidnitz, at or near the Village of Pultzen, which, as is said, greatly annoys the Town; but we do not hear that the Commandant has made any new Propositions for surrendering.

Hague, October 12. Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were still at Kirchayn upon the Ohme, on the 7th Instant, which is the freshest Date from

those Parts, to which Time the French had made no new Attempt of any Consequence to dislodge the Allies. As to the Town of Cassel, it was reported to be reduced to so great Extremities for Want of Provisions, that the Garrison must very soon be obliged to quit it, either by Capitulation, or otherwise.

In Silesia and Saxony Things remained, by the last Accounts, in pretty near the same Situation; and Schweidnitz had not yet, on the 3d Instant, surrendered.

Whitehall, October 16.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable George Grenville, George Hay, Doctor of Laws, Thomas Orby Hunter, Esq; the Honourable John Forbes, Hans Stanley, Esq; the Right Honourable George Bussy Villiers, commonly called Lord Viscount Villiers, and Thomas Pelham, Esq; to be His Majesty's Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the Dominions, Islands and Territories thereunto respectively belonging.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Exeter, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Death of Doctor George Lavington, late Bishop thereof. And likewise a Letter, for His Majesty's Royal Signature, recommending to the said Dean and Chapter, the Honourable and Reverend Frederick Keppel, Prebendary of His Majesty's Free Chapel of St. George in the Castle of Windsor, and one of His Chaplains in Ordinary, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See.

General Post Office, July 24, 1762.

Whereas the Post Boy bringing the Mail from Bath, was, on the 22d Instant, between the Hours of Ten and Eleven o'Clock at Night, attacked in his Way to Petty France in Gloucestershire, and robbed by three Foot Pads in Sailors Habits, of the Mail containing the following Bags, viz. The Bag from Bath for London, and also the Bye Bag from Bath for Tedbury, Cirencester, Farringdon, and Oxford.
