Most gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Nobility, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders, of the County of Cambridge, beg Leave to lay before your Majesty our sincerest Congratulations on an Event which so nearly concerns the whole Nation, as well as your Majesty, the happy Delivery of the Queen, and the Birth of a Prince, Heir to the Crown of these Kingdoms; on a Day distinguished before in our Annals by the Accession of your Illustrious House to the Throne, under whose most just and legal Government we have en-

joyed all the Advantages of that excellent Constitution, which they were called in to preserve.
