P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for railing Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shilling for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of May last. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been continued and extended to the 30th of this Instant September; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 30th Day of this Instant September, to the 30th Day of November next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the City of Exeter, in Chamber assembled.

*May it please your Majesty,*

YOUR Majesty's ever faithful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council, of your City of Exeter, full of those Sentiments of Joy and Admiration, with which the continually increasing Glories of your Majesty's auspicious and victorious Reign, cannot fail to warm every truly British Breast, humbly beg Leave to pour them forth before your Throne, in our most dutiful Congratulations on the signal Success with which it hath pleased the Divine Providence to crown your Majesty's

Jeffy's Arms, in the Reduction of the most important Fortres and Port of the Havannah.

A Conquest, attended with every Circumstance that can do Honour to the Counsels which planned, and to the distinguished Conduct and Valour which executed it. A Conquest made on an Enemy, which had wantonly insulted us by a sudden and unprovoked Declaration of War; and of a Fortres, which, under the deceitful Colour of an apparent pacifick Disposition, that Enemy had been, for a long Time, providing with every Advantage which might render any Attempt upon it impracticable. By the mighty Maritime Force assembled there, it was even made a Place of Arms, from whence it appeared easy to seize a favourable Opportunity of over-running your Majesty's Colonies, and destroying the Trade and Navigation of your Subjects in the American Seas. By your Majesty's consummate Wisdom all these haughty Schemes and vain Designs are at once disappointed. That Navy, which was intended for the Terror of your People, now makes a Part of their Security and Protection. The Communication of our Enemies with their American Treasures is effectually interrupted, which lie open and defenceless to the further Impression of your Arms, if their Obstinacy and Infatuation should make it necessary for your Majesty to prosecute the Advantages of your Victory.

But we would rather hope, that the Divine Goodness, in Compassion to the Sufferings of Mankind, so long exposed to all the Ravages and Desolations of a cruel War, will, at Length, inspire our Enemies with more equitable Sentiments, and dispose them to acquiesce in the Terms of a reasonable Peace. Such Terms your Majesty's known Moderation will ever be ready to grant them; and we are assured, by too constant and too convincing an Experience of your Majesty's zealous and invariable Regard to the true Interests of your People, to entertain the least Doubt, that they will be such as are safe and honourable to this Nation, and in some Measure proportioned to the unparalleled Successes with which it hath pleased Almighty God to avow the Justice of your Cause, and to the great Effusion of Blood and Treasure with which they have been purchased.

*Hague, October 15.* Several Regiments of the Prince de Condé's Corps are moving toward the Lower Rhine. The Situation of the Armies in other Respects continued the same.
