had been sent for receiving his Excellency with the greatest Marks of Distinction.

Hambourg, October 15. The Day before Yesterday M. de Hecht, the Prussian Minister here, received, by Estaffette from the King his Master, the News of Schweidnitz having capitulated on the 9th Instant; and that the Austrian Garrison had been made Prisoners of War. We are yet without any farther Particulars of the Capitulation.

Brunswick, October 15. The Landgrave of Hesse set out last Wednesday with his Court for Rintelen.

The Duke of Brunswick went from hence at Two o'Clock Yesterday Morning for Munden, to visit the Hereditary Prince, who has had a Fever for some Days, occasioned, as supposed, by the working of a Splinter in the Wound, which was perceived to be coming away. Last Night the Dutchess had a more favourable Account, the Physicians giving great Hopes on the 13th, that the Fever was going off. Dr. Worloff, the King's Physician at Hanover, was expected at Munden every Moment.

M. Diesbach, the French Commandant at Cassel, having rejected all the Terms offered him, and persisted in holding the Place, though the only Subsistence left for the Garrison was Bread made of Oats, and no great Quantity of that Grain neither remained, the heavy battering Cannon is again returning before the Town, and the Trenches were intended to be opened before it, as we hear, on the 16th Instant.

Hague, October 19. According to the last Letters from the Army, Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were still at Kirkhayn the 14th Instant, and nothing material had passed.

The French Household Troops were on their March Home; and the Prince of Condé was going to Dusseldorff, where he was to have his Head Quarters.
