AT the Court at St. James's, the 17th Day of September, 1762,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of May last. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been continued and extended to the 30th of this Instant September; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 30th Day of this Instant September, to the 30th Day of November next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Warsaw, October 9. The Member who had given in a Manifest against the Continuance of the Diet, being departed for the Country; as he could not be found, and that Manifest consequently could not be retraced, the Assembly was broken up of course the next Day.

Breslaw, October 10. Yesterday the Town of Schweidnitz surrendered by Capitulation, which was notified here in the Evening by the Arrival of a Number of Postmasters, and Postillions blowing their Horns.

The Garrison are made Prisoners of War, and will march out this Day. There is no distinct Account yet received here of what preceded this Surrender: Only it is said, that on the 8th, about Two in the Afternoon, a Bomb accidentally fell into the Casemate of the Fort N^o 2, where there was a Quantity of Gun-

powder; the Blowing up of which filled the Ditch, on the Side next the Town, and killed a Major, Seven other Officers, and Two Hundred Men.

This Accident, joined to the Prussians springing a Mine in the Night between the 8th and 9th, which totally ruined the Covered Way, is imagined to have induced the Commandant to capitulate.

We hear from Saxony, that on the 27th and 28th of September, the advanced Posts of his Royal Highness Prince Henry were vigorously attacked and obliged to retire; that on the 29th, General Haddick attacked the Prince's Left Wing, and the Landsberg, situated in the Front of Lieutenant General Hulsens's Right. The Fire of the Artillery and Small Arms lasted upwards of Six Hours; and the Austrians were at last repulsed with a considerable Loss of killed and wounded, besides Three Hundred Prisoners. His Royal Highness, seeing the Danger he was exposed to from the vast Superiority of the Austrians, decamped from Pretschendorf on the 30th, at Three in the Morning, and retired to Freyberg, without the Enemy's perceiving his Retreat. General Hulsens likewise quitted his Position, and occupied the Camp of Katzenhausen.

Breslaw, October 13. Yesterday the first Transport of Prisoners, (consisting of 1200 Croates) from Schweidnitz, arrived here about Noon; and the second Transport, composed of 2000 Regulars, is expected To-day.

It is reported, that Marshal Daun has sent a Detachment into the Higher Silesia, to cover the Frontiers of Moravia, whilst he remained, with the Gros of his Army, near Glatz, to watch the King of Prussia's Motions.

Major General Schmettau, who was some Time ago detached towards Hirschberg, and afterwards into Lusatia, thought proper, upon the Approach of General Beck, to retire, and has since joined the King of Prussia's Army, after raising considerable Contributions on the Towns of Lauban, Gorlitz, and Zittau.

Breslaw, October 17. The Prisoners from Schweidnitz have been brought in daily, in different Convoys. They amount, in all, to between Six and Seven Thousand Men, besides the Sick and Wounded, who could not be transported, and are said to be about Seventeen Hundred. Among the Prisoners are 130 Officers, one Lieutenant General, and two Major Generals. There were killed of the Garrison, during the Siege, near Thirteen Hundred Men; so that their whole Number may be fairly reckoned to have been Ten Thousand, besides 150 Dragoons and Hussars.

The Loss of the Besiegers is not known here with Certainty; but is reckoned at about Three Thousand killed and wounded.

The following is the Capitulation granted to the Garrison by his Prussian Majesty.

Points of Capitulation proposed by the Imperial Royal Garrison of Schweidnitz.

The Garrison demands to Capitulate on the following Conditions.

I. THE Garrison shall go out of the Place with Drums beating, and all the Honours of War; shall lay down their Arms, and render themselves Prisoners of War. The Officers to keep their Swords, and the Warrant Officers their Sabres.

I. Granted.

II. The

II. The Garrison, and those belonging to it, shall keep their Equipages, and every Thing belonging to them in Property.

II. *Granted.*

III. The Garrison shall be distributed by Battalions, as they are now formed in Silesia. The Officers to remain with their Detachments.

III. *The Places of Detention shall be assigned both to the Officers and private Men.*

IV. The Soldiers shall not be lodged in the Casemates, but in convenient Quarters, where, besides the ordinary Allowance, Wood and Straw shall be delivered to them, and necessary Cloathing, upon the Officers Receipts.

IV. *The Allowance to the Prisoners rests as has been regulated by the Cartel.*

V. His Prussian Majesty is desired, in Case of Exchange, to give the Preference to the Officers and private Men of this Garrison.

V. *Granted.*

VI. The Commandant shall be permitted to send two Officers of his own Choice to his Excellency Field Marshal Count Daun, and even to Vienna, to solicit this Exchange; and he shall be at Liberty to send a Copy of this Capitulation.

VI. *Refused. All this may be facilitated by Letters; but it is granted that he may send an Officer with the Capitulation.*

VII. His Prussian Majesty is prayed to grant a Pardon to all the Deserters from his Army, who may be found in the Place; but those in the Imperial Royal Service, who, during their being Prisoners of War, have entered into the Prussian Service, shall not be looked upon as Deserters, and shall remain in Prison till they are ransomed.

VII. *The Deserters shall be retaken, and remitted to the Regiments in which they were before: It shall depend on the King's Clemency to punish them or not.*

VIII. Relays of Horses shall be given to the Officers both for themselves and their Equipages, gratis, to the Place of their Destination; and they shall be permitted to send back to the Dominions of her Imperial Royal Majesty, their Horses, Equipages, and Domesticks, or to send for them from thence; to which End the necessary Passports and Escorts shall be given to them; but those Equipages shall not be visited. Moreover, Relays of Horses shall be given them gratis in this Case also.

VIII. *Granted, for their Persons, and for whatever they shall take with them to the Place of their Destination; but whatever they shall send or fetch, shall be at their own Charges.*

IX. Whatever belongs to the Commissariat of War and Provisions, the Physicians, Surgeons, Clerks of the Fortifications and Artillery, shall not be reputed Prisoners of War, but they shall be permitted to return with their Effects, and Books of Accounts, into her Imperial Majesty's Dominions.

IX. *The Physicians and Surgeons are not accounted Prisoners of War. All the others shall be released, but shall be reputed Prisoners of War, and shall give their Acknowledgment as such, till such Time as they are made good to us.*

X. It shall be in like Manner permitted to all the Sutlers, Tradesmen, and all who have followed the Garrison hither, to return into the said Dominions of her Imperial Royal Majesty, with all their Effects and Commodities.

X. *Granted.*

XI. All possible Care shall be taken of the Sick and Wounded of the Garrison; for which Purpose the Officers, Physicians, Surgeons, and necessary Nurses, shall be permitted to remain with them. The Maimed shall be free, and shall have Liberty to return, after they are perfectly healed, into the Dominions of her Imperial Royal Majesty, in order to receive the Assistance necessary to their Condition.

XI. *The former is granted.*

The latter is limited; they may return after their Recovery, but it must be partly made good on the Exchange.

XII. The Officers shall be permitted, on the Demand of the Commandant, to go to attend their Affairs, and their Health, either in the Hereditary Dominions, or elsewhere.

XII. *This will depend on a special Permission of his Majesty.*

XIII. The Debts of the Military Chest, contracted with the Inhabitants, shall be liquidated, in order to be made good afterwards by her Imperial Royal Majesty.

XIII. *Agreed; but the Officers shall be obliged also to liquidate their Debts, or to give sufficient Security.*

XIV. The Town, the Magistracy, the Burghers, Convents, and Churches, shall be preserved in the Enjoyment of their Rights, Privileges, Immunities, and free Exercise of their Religion.

XIV. *That goes of Course.*

XV. As soon as the present Capitulation is signed, Hostages shall be given, and all Hostilities shall cease, and the Fort of Jauernick, la Fleche, and the Barrier of Strigaw, shall be delivered to the Troops of his Prussian Majesty.

XV. *Agreed.*

XVI. As soon as the Relays shall be all ready, and Four and Twenty Hours after the Signing the present Capitulation, the Garrison shall march out, as demanded above by the 1st Article, to be removed to the Places intended; but it shall not be allowed, until the entire Evacuation, to the Troops of His Prussian Majesty to enter either into the Town, or into the other Posts occupied by the Garrison, excepting only the Commissaries and Officers, who shall be appointed to take Custody of the Arsenal, the Magazines, and the Provisions, and those, who shall come to receive the Prisoners made by the Garrison during the Siege; and that, in order to avoid the Disorders that might arise between the Troops of the two Powers.

XVI. *Agreed; but the Garrison shall march out at Eight o'Clock To-morrow Morning.*

XVII. If it should happen that Difficulties should arise in the Execution of the present Capitulation, they shall be decided in Favour of the Garrison.

XVII. *That shall be according to the Exigence of the Case.*

Addition.

It is not possible to go out To-morrow Morning by Eight o'Clock; and the Garrison shall not go out till the next Day at the same Hour.

Hambourg, October 26. Advice was received here last Night from Berlin, that on the 15th Instant, General Haddick's Army, with That of the Empire, gained a considerable Advantage over Prince Henry near Freyberg, in which the Prussians had lost near a Thousand Men Killed and Wounded, besides Eight Pieces of Cannon: Upon which Prince Henry retreated with his Army, during the Night, to Siebenlehn, which his Royal Highness effected in the greatest Order. However, the Day following he approached again within a German Mile of Freyberg, and hoped to recover soon that Place. Before this Affair happened, his Prussian Majesty detached from the Army under his Command, Twenty six Battalions and Seventy Squadrons, to reinforce That under his Brother Prince Henry; which Reinforcement, it was hoped, would oblige the Enemy to quit their present Position, and enable his Royal Highness to regain the Superiority he has had during the Campaign.

Hague, October 26. Nothing is come in from the Army since the last Post; but we are informed from other Places, that the Siege of Cassel is carried on with great Vivacity; and it was expected the first Parallel would be completed on the 22d. The Fire of the Besieged, has hitherto done no Mischief; and as there is not much Artillery in the Place, it is expected,

pected, when the Batteries are ready to open, that the Fire of the Enemy will soon diminish. The Sallies hitherto made have likewise been unsuccessful. The Besiegers had lost only one Officer and 20 Men down to the 22d of this Month. During this Operation, the French Marshals attempt nothing; and our Advices say, that the Equipages of their Army are in March for Frankfort. In Saxony the Austrians have have again attempted to dislodge Prince Henry of Prussia the 14th; but His Royal Highness had the good Fortune to repulse them, and still maintained the Post of Freyberg. The King of Prussia had detached 10,000 Men to reinforce his Brother, under General Neuwied, who was already in Lusatia, on his Way to Saxony. The Hereditary Prince continues to mend daily: His Serene Highness sits up every Day several Hours.

Hague, October 29. General Dießbach, the Commandant of Cassel, made a Sally on the 22d Instant, at the Head of the whole Garrison, and obliged the Ordinary Guard to abandon the Trenches; but Prince Frederick of Brunswick, at the Head of Four Battalions, coming quickly to their Support, drove the Enemy back into Cassel with great Loss, before they had Time to do any Damage to the Works.
