

**Hamburgh, Sept. 17.** It's said that the Danish Fleet which Cruises on the Coasts of *Pomeran*, hath made a descent, and taken a small Isle called *Pöhl*, which lies near *Wisnar*, by means of which that place is blocked up on the side of the Sea. The 14 instant, the King of *Denmark* and the Elector of *Brandenburgh* met at *Gadebusch*, and took their final resolutions concerning the motions of the several Armies that will be employed against the *Suedes*. We are now told for certain, That the Duke of *Hanouer* has quitted his engagements with *France* and *Sueden*; and some are so particular, as to tell us, That on the seventh instant, his Highness signed the Treaty with the King of *Denmark*, &c. by which he obliges himself to employ his Forces for the service of the Emperor and the Empire in conjunction with the other Confederates, the truth of which we shall quickly know. The *Munster* Forces consisting in 2000 Horse, and 4000 Foot; have already possessed themselves of *Wildhausen*, which was in the hands of the *Suedes*: And we may now in few dayes expect to hear likewise of the march of the *Danes* and *Brandenburgh* Army. This afternoon is arrived here a Captain of Horse in the service of *Denmark*, who reports, That *Wisnar* is besieged both by Sea and Land. Our Letters by the last Post from *Poland*, say, That 5000 Tartars being on their march towards *Lepol*, to attack the King there; his Majesty advanced with his Forces to meet them, fought them; and totally routed them.

**Liege, Sept. 17.** The Governor of the Citadel being informed, that the Prince of *Orange*, in all likelihood, designs to make some attempt upon it, hath laid up great stores of Provisions, and, among other things, 2000 Tun of Beer: He hath received a reinforcement of two Companies of Musketeers from *Maestricht*.

**Hanouer, Sept. 18.** The most considerable news we have at present here, is, what is said of our Dukes having quitted the Guaranty of *Bremen*, and the recalling his Troops from *Ferdin*; and we are likewise told, that his Highness has promised the Ambassador of *Denmark*, that within three or four dayes he will farther declare himself. The Troops of the Bishop of *Munster* are on their march, and we expect our next Letters will tell us of their having entred the Dutchy of *Bremen*. On the other hand we hear, That the *Suedes* are making great Levies all that Kingdom over, to be transported into their Territories here in *Germany*, which are like to be attacked by many Enemies.

**Brisac, Sept. 19.** All the account we have of the Imperial Army, is, that it marches towards *Spire*, with intention, as is said, to pass the *Rhine* there, and to go and besiege *Philipsburgh*: though some think that the design of General *Montecuculi* in taking this march, is to draw the Prince of *Conde* from his Post at *Kastenholtz*; where several recruits have already joined him, and more are expected. Our next will, doubtless, be able to inform you farther, for, at present, we only make conjectures concerning the designs of the Imperialists.

**Hague, Sept. 21.** The States of *Holland* are at present assembled, and the only business before them, will be the letting of some Farms. The Heer *de Mare*, Marshal and Superintendent of the house of the late Princess Dowager of *Orange*, has orders to pass over into *England*, to notify to His Majesty, the death of the said Princess. Yesterday the Troops which lay in the Neighborhood of *Ruremond*, were, as we are told, to march from thence, to join the Prince of *Oranges* Army. From *Ruremond* they write, That 1500 French Horse of the Garrison of *Maestricht*, had been within half a league of that place, to see what booty they could make; that they had taken about 40 Horses, and so returned.

**Metz, Sept. 18.** The Regiment of the Crown marched from hence this week towards *Alsace*, and most Troops will be daily sent thither to reinforce the Prince of *Conde*, who hitherto continues at *Kastenholtz*. The eighth instant, the Troops of the Duke of *Lorraine*, and 1200 *Munster* Foot, decamped from *Treves*, and marched towards *Berkenfeld*, where they remained till the 14. The *Lunenburgh* Troops passed the *Moselle* the ninth near *Treves*, and took their way towards the *Meuse*.

**Versailles, Sept. 20.** The Assembly of the Clergy is finished, they having agreed about the way of raising the four and a half Millions, which they present to the King. The 15 and 16 instant, the Baron de *Perlaw*, Envoy from the Elector of *Cologne*, and the Envoy from *Sueden* had Audience of his Majesty. The King has made the Marquis the *Bourlemons*, Mestre du Camp of the Regiment of *Piedray* and the Sieur de *Poisdauid* of the Regiment of *Champagne*; the Government of *Philipville*, the King has given to the Sieur de *Madaillan*, who was his Lieutenant there.

**Paris, Sept. 23.** We have certain advice of the death of the old Duke of *Lorraine*, who dyed at *Bernanstein* not far from *Gbleux*. Our Letters from *Alsace*, confirm what we said in our last; of the Imperial Armies having left the siege of *Saverne*, and its being marched towards *Hagenau*, though they cannot tell us what General *Montecuculi's* design hath been therein, farther than that he will pass the *Rhin*, and besiege *Uttin*; but that is looked upon as an enterprise of great difficulty, the Winter season coming on so fast, and the place being as strongly fortified as any can be; and besides, provided with a good Garrison, and all things necessary for its defence. Others say, that the chief reason which made General *Montecuculi* leave *Saverne*, was the want of Forage for the subsistence of his Cavalry, which for several miles round had been destroyed by the French. The Prince of *Conde* continues in his Camp at *Kastenholtz* near *Schlusstadt*, and will, as is said, not move from thence, till he hath received such supplies as may enable him to make head against the Enemy. Most of the Officers that were at *Treves*, are cashiered; and some will be more severely proceeded against, for their disobedience to the Marshal de *Craqui*: and the Troops that came from *Treves* to *Metz*, are incorporated into other Regiments. Our Letters from *Flanders* bring nothing considerable; the Armies have of late made several motions, without any action that passes between them; the Prince of *Orange* seems to bend towards *Liege*, and hath received his Cannon from *Brussels*.
