Hamburgh, Sept. 17. It's faid that the Danish Fleet which Cruiles on the Coasts of Pomeren , hath made a descent, and taken a small ssle called Pobl, which lies near Wifmar, by means of which that place is blocked up on the fide of the Sea. The 14 instant, the King of Denmark and the Blector of Brandenburgh met at Gadebusch, and took their final resolutions concerning the motions of the feveral Armies that will be employed against the Suedes. We are now told for certain, That the Duke of Hinouer has quitted his engagements with France and Sueden; and some are so particular, as to tell us, Thac on the leventh instant, his Highness signed the Treaty with the King of Denmark, &c. by which he obliges himself to employ his Forces for the service of the Emperor and the Empire in conjunction with the other Confederates, the truth of which we shall quickly know. The Munster Forces confishing in 2000 Horse, and 4000 Foot, have already possessed themselves of Wildhaufen, which was in the hands of the Snedes: And we may now in few dayes expect to hear likewise of the march of the Danes and Brandenburgh Army. This afternoon is arrived here a Captain of Horse in the service of Denmark, who reports, That Wifmar is belieged both by Sea and Land. Our Letters by the last Post from to land, fay, That 50000 Tartars being on their march towards Eropol, to attack the Kingahere; his Majesty advanced with his Forces to meet them, fought them; and totally routed them.

Liege, Sept. 17. The Governor of the Cittadel being informed, that the Prince of Orange, in all likelithood, deligns to make fome attemptupon it, hash laid up great flores of Provisions, and, among other things, 2000 Tunof Beer. He hach received a reinforcement of two

Companies of Musketeers from Macstrivht.

Masouer, Sept. 18. The most considerable news we have at present here, is, what is said of our Dukes having quitted the Guaranty of Bremen, and the recalling his Troops from Ferden; and we are likewise told, that his Highness has promised the Ambassador of Denmark, that within three or four dayes he will farther declare himself. The Troops of the Bishop of Munster are on their march, and we expect our next Lerters will tell us of their staving entred the Dutchy of Bremen. On the other hand we hear, That the Suedes are making great Leviesall that Kingdom over, to be transported into their Territories here in Germany, which are like to be attacked by many Enemies.

Brifac, Sept. 19. All the account we have of the Imperial Army, is, that it marches towards Spire, with intention, as is faid, to pass the Rhine there, and to go and beliege Philipsburgh: though some think that the design of General Montecuculi in taking this march, is to draw the Prince of Conde from his Post ark assembling; where several recruits have already joined him, and more are expected. Our next will, doubtles, be able to inform you farther, for, at present, we only make conjectures concerning the designs of the Imperialists.

Hisque, Sept. 21. The States of Holland are at present affembled, and the only business before them, will be the letting of some Farms. The Heer le Mure, Marefchal and Superintendent of the house of the late Princess Dowager of Orange, has orders to pass over into England, to notifie to His Majesty, the death of the said Princess. Yesterday the Troops which lay in the Neighborhood of Ruremond, were, as we are sold, to march from thence, to join the Prince of Oranges Army. From Ruremond they write, That 1500 French Horse of the Garison of Maestricht, had been within half a league of that place, to see what booty they could make; that they had taken about 40 Horses, and so returned.

Mctz, Sept. 18. The Regiment of the Crown mark ched from hence this week towards Aljace, and more Troops will be drily lent thither to reinforce the Prince of Condes, who hitherto continues at Kaftenholiq. The eighth inflant, the Troops of the Duke of Lerrain, and 1200 Munster Foot, decamped from Trevers and marched towards Berkenfeld, where they remained till the 14. The Lunenburgh Troops passed the Moselle the ninth near Treves, and took their way towards the Meuse.

Verfailles, Sept. 20. The Assembly of the Clergy is sinished, they having agreed about the way of raising the four and a half Millions, which they present to the King. The 13 and 16 instant, the Baron de Perlaw; Envoy from the Elector of Cologne, and the Envoy from Sueden had Audience of his Majesty. The King has made the Marquis the Bourlement, Mestre du Camp of the Regiment of Piesray, and the Sieur de Evisdavid of the Regiment of Champagne; the Government of Philipville, the King has given to the Sieur de Madaillan, who was his Lieutemant there.

Paris, Sepa. 23. We have certain advice of the death of the old Duke of Lorrain, who dyed at Hispanshim not far from Gblenia. Our Letters from adifation between the we faid in our lait; of the Imperial Armies having left the fiege of Saverne, and its being marched towards Hagineraw, though they cannot tell us what General beome curve's cefign hath been therein, farther than that it's believed that he will pass the Rhim, and bestege thispinash; but that is looked upon as an enterprize of great difficulty, the Winter season coming on so fait, and the place being as though fortified a any can be: and besides, provided with a good Garrion, and all things neschary for its defence. Others say, that the chief reason which made General Momentuin leave Saverne, was the want of Forage for the subsidience of his lavalry, which for several miles round had been destroyed by the French. The Prince of Conde continues in his Camp as Rastrib us near Schlistads, and will as is said, nor move from thence, till he hath received such supplies as may enable him to make head against the Engand some will be more severely proceeded against, for their disobedience to the Marchelal de Cequi: and the Troops that came from Treves to Merz, are incorporated into other Regionents. Our Letters from Flanders bring nothing considerable; the Armies have of late made several motions, without any action that passes between them; the Prince of Orange feems to bend towards Liege, and hat received his Cannon from Brussis.
